Put it all together. Then add features such as support of hard disk drives and a standard DOS text file format compatible with spellers and communications programs, and it's not hard to see why Format-II has earned the number one rating.

The words of the Peelings II reviewer sum it up: *"I cannot think of another word processor that would be better overall for business use."*

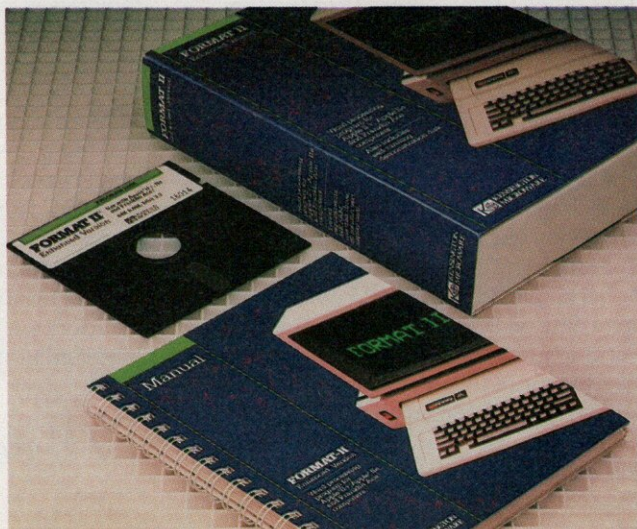

Congratulations on the timeliness of your music article "Sounds" by Freff (October 1984). The popularity of music devices for the Apple is increasing rapidly now, and your article helped to introduce this complex and sometimes confusing field.

The article is absolutely correct in stating that if you are at all serious about having fun with Apple music, you need a hardware music card like ours or the others mentioned. Software-only systems quickly become limiting as you grow in your own talent and abilities. Our Music Card MC1 not only allows more simultaneous notes and control over timbre (as detailed in the article), but also allows exploration of volume, stereo position, and white noise.

The article is also right in praising the method Music Construction Set uses to enter music. Since 1979 ALF has been using game paddles (we support the KoalaPad and joysticks, too) for music entry, and Apple Computer has cited our Music Entry program as one of two examples of good "human engineering." Paddle entry is also great for those of us who don't play the piano.

When the article says you should "take one more step" to upgrade from a music card to a keyboard system, it should have been pointed out that the step is from \$169 for our MC1 to more than \$1400 for the keyboard systems mentioned. Quite a step!

► NOVEL, NOT CLASSIC

Laugh now, but the day is drawing near when you may be seeing not just *Jungle Lust* and *Love's Savage, Wild Passion* on the paperback racks at 7-Eleven, but also *Hot Chips* and *The Computer That Loved Me*.

No, it's not Compu-Sex, exactly—it's the dawn of the computer-written novel. The first mass-market computer novel was recently published by Warner Software/Warner Books. It's the first big-publicity publication of prose and poetry composed by a computer. Called *The Policeman's Beard Is Half Constructed*, the novel isn't exactly great art, but it's a fascinating read.

Here's one excerpt: "Bill sings to Sarah. Sarah sings to Bill. Perhaps they will do other dangerous things together. . . . They have love but they also have typewriters. That is interesting." Programmer William Chamberlain filled the memory of the author/computer, called Racter, with rules on English grammar, an appropriate vocabulary, and syntax directives to help Racter construct plausible English sentences. The computer simulated thought and plot by randomly generating phrases (sounds like some people we

know). The text is illustrated by artist Joan Hall.

Chamberlain doesn't claim Racter's work has the depth of Dostoyevski, but he's still aware of the commercial possibilities: "Right now it would be rather difficult to get a book that would be indistinguishable from a human author's work, but it is certainly within the capability of the computer to produce a good junk novel."

Harold Robbins, watch out!

► TECH TALK FOR NONTECHIES

You can admit it; we won't put any guilt trips on you here. Yes, even though you read this magazine diligently, aren't there a few items in its pages you can't quite make heads or tails of?

One possible supplement to our extremely helpful magazine might be a new newsletter, called *The TechnoLetter*, designed strictly for nontechnical microcomputer users.

This newsletter aims to let you know that you're not alone in not knowing how to use Lotus 1-2-3 and that other people have horror stories to tell that are even more bloodcurdling than yours. Aimed at people with

"I know stuff that hasn't been written down," says Guthrie. ► LEADERS OF THE PACK

Apple Computer's business position is secure for next year, even if it's in second place, according to a survey of 92 newspaper editors conducted by the Griggs-Anderson firm in San Francisco.

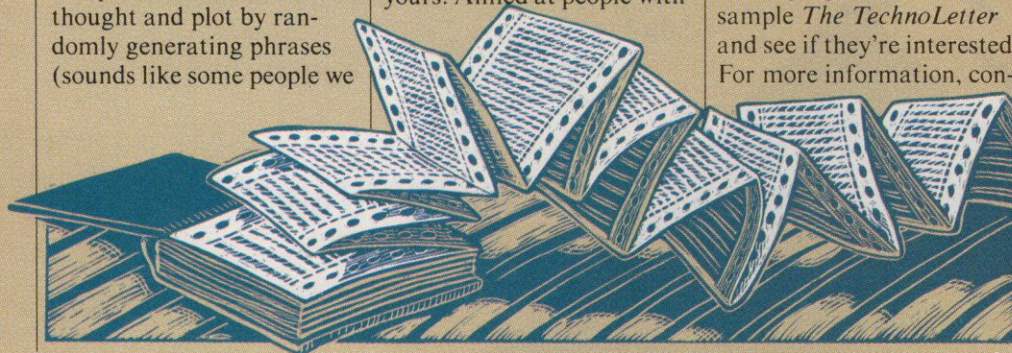
The surveyors asked the editors which company they thought would be the personal-computer-industry leader by this spring. Not surprisingly, 63% chose IBM, but 25% selected Apple as the next frontrunner. Strangely enough, when asked which company came to mind first, the editors cited IBM, then Apple, followed distantly by Tandy, Commodore, and Hewlett-Packard.

We're not sure how much this survey served as a name-recognition test rather than as an informed guess about the personal-computer industry. Apple can be comforted by the fact that, whatever the publicity, at least the editors can spell its name right.

► THEY GAMBLLED ON APPLES

Late in 1984, New York city and New Jersey state police unearthed one of the first in what will undoubtedly be a long line of personal-computer-aided crimes, a computer-managed gambling ring.

Captain Brian F. Hillen says, "This is the first time

COMPUTER GUIDANCE

Personal computers unquestionably can assist the mind and the body, but can they help the soul? Some people find ridiculous the whole notion that a personal computer can help us deal with emotions, teach skills, or facilitate insights. Yet, even though an Apple or similar machine has no personal identity of its own, with the right hardware or software it can be a teacher, adviser, and trainer. In fact, some people say the computer can at times be a better counselor, friend, or instructor than another human can.

Of these roles, that of instructor is the most firmly established. Personal computers have clearly made a place for themselves in formal education. Most schools now offer students a chance to have time working with computers (a majority of which are Apples), and a growing number of colleges

regard the use of a personal computer as a necessary part of becoming an educated person.

The Problems of Daily Life

Now you can choose from a growing

number of software packages that claim to provide similar utility in showing you how to deal more effectively with the problems of everyday life. Some of the programs are definitely of value, some are questionable, and many

are good mostly for a laugh. Just as when you tell your problems to other people, you have to discover whose advice is worthwhile and when to accept or ignore it.

At one end of the spectrum of self-help aids on a disk, you'll find a number of programs that deal primarily with numbers and, at least statistically, deal strictly with the facts.

For example, Life-Style Analyzer, from Eagle Software (Wayne, PA), compares your habits against those in a database collected by the U.S. Public Health Service. Based on your health habits, medical history, and family background, the program tells you what that profile indicates about your future health.

In this case, the statistical correlations the program relies on are a matter of public record, representing the best

evidence of a large number of epidemiologists over a number of years. Some of the ways the program combines figures are open to question, but in general the connections between habits and disease the program uses are as well established as any part of statistical medicine.

The advice you'll get is much like what you'd get from most Sunday newspaper supplements on how to lead a healthier life. The program's main service is to make the computations for you personally and to produce the results, complete with graphs and charts.

Other similarly noncontroversial programs help balance your diet or help you lose weight by counting calories. Again, the knowledge base embodied in the programs is widely available, and the computer is merely helping you deal with the numbers.

Stark facts don't always provide much guidance for many of the more crucial personal decisions, however. There's more to life, we all know, than just numbers.

The unconscious, for example, has its own irrational tale to tell. Long before the existence of computers, psychologists probed the psyche with questions that, on the surface, did not

always seem connected or relevant. Although all or some questions may be meaningless, the pattern of the elicited answers is useful as a guide to hidden levels of inner mental dialogue.

Many programs simply put existing tests up on the screen. Tests designed for mass screening are generally multiple-choice rather than free-form exams, so the programming to computerize the process is almost trivial. With a personal computer, though, instead of waiting days or weeks for a service bureau to process mark-sense papers, or trying to match up a stencil with the answers, you can have the computer keep track of your selections and add up the score.

Of course, scoring tests has always been the easiest part. Assessing the significance of the results is much harder. Whether a program that gives standardized advice on the basis of standardized tests is worthwhile is a matter of debate. On the other hand, if the test is indeed valid, it may be easier for many people to tell their secrets to, and get advice from, a machine—especially if they know that they can turn it off or erase the disks any time they choose.

Only the Body Knows

Our bodies, though, have their secret

whisperings that even our unconscious may not be aware of. Consequently, a few products omit the on-screen questionnaires and go directly to the source.

Relax, from Synapse Software (Richmond, CA), and Calmpute, from Human Engineered Software (Palo Alto, CA), are both biofeedback products that combine software with hardware add-ons for your Apple. Relax uses an electromyograph sensor to translate the nerve impulses going to your skeletal muscles into inputs for an Apple II. Calmpute uses a galvanic-skin-response sensor that responds to the electrical resistance of the skin.

In both cases, the theory is that reactions monitored by these inputs represent tension. Excess tension is harmful, and reducing stress level is worthwhile. Decreasing tension is easier, these two firms say, if we can get direct feedback on how tense we really are.

These programs don't just confront you with your stress levels and see if you'll change them. Along with the hardware and software, you get a guide to stress reduction and, if that proves too abstract, a game you can run using your stress levels like a joystick.

If you find games a painless path to self-knowledge, there are plenty of oth-

er possibilities. I've only seen the ad and not the software, so far, but Millenium claims that its package called The Brain Game lets you find out "how smart your computer thinks you are . . . and get smarter while you do it." The purpose of the program, the company points out, is to test "your hardware and software," meaning your own mental capabilities, not your computer's.

Enlightenment (or at least self-improvement) may be worthwhile for its own sake, but many of us want more direct help in order to get by in this world. Another whole class of programs promises to improve your life by improving your work habits.

Human Edge Software has an extensive set of these attitude-honing programs for the work environment, all of which the company is now also releasing in Macintosh versions (see page 24 for more details).

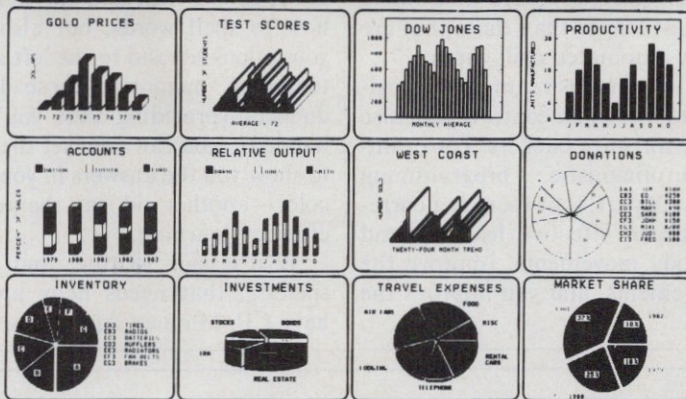
Some people swear by these programs. The analyses and strategies that are produced in response to your inputs are far beyond the fortune-cookie level—they do take into account a great deal of experience in applied psychology. Other people find that the suggestions they get are often obvious, and the program merely rephrases the conventional advice you might get a lot more cheaply from any of dozens of popular books on business practices.

Human Edge Software also has a program for use at home, called Mind Prober, that promises to tell you about the inner thoughts of your personal acquaintances. Some people feel that using such a program is a violation of personal privacy, and well it might be. I'm boycotting it anyway, though, because the advertising campaign appeals to the sleazier side of human nature.

Taking more of the high road, other firms are applying psychological theories to help accelerate skills training. Every other educational software package for kids, it seems, has a psychologist listed among the developers and includes an explanation of how the program uses such knowledge to make the teaching process faster and more effective.

Whether it's Stickybear Shapes or Run for the Money, programs for kids provide reinforcement for right answers with musical hurrahs and on-screen fireworks. If mastery of the skill at hand proves insufficient as a motivator, providing a little excitement and motion at least keeps you awake. And if you've watched kids use programs such

as these (or if you're enough of a kid to try them yourself), you know that programs with good graphics and sound hold interest longer than those that are essentially automated drill cards.

Along with mainstream psychological theories, the more controversial also have their software backers. For example, neurolinguistic programming maintains, in part, that there is a correlation between effective learning and certain body movements. Improve the body movements, and you improve the learning.

If you want to see for yourself, try Spelling Strategy. This program for grade-school learners not only shows how to spell words, but also reminds you to look up and to the left as you attempt to memorize those letter sequences (providing that you're right-handed). You can even set the program to show you the answers in your favorite color—another aid, say the authors, to effective learning.

If it's your writing, and not your spelling, that needs help, and if you have CP/M on an Apple, you can have

Punctuation and Style or Grammatik check out your work. These programs are grammar and phrase checkers that look through text files to find such problems as punctuation errors, trite phrases, and sexist terms. The idea behind the programs is that running these programs doesn't only help you spot problems, but also gradually teaches you to make fewer errors.

One of the big attractions of the programs, most people say, is the fact that they are just programs—many people find themselves to be more comfortable having their computer check through their work, rather than having a co-worker or family member do it.

That feeling of privacy of exchange between you and your computer is one of the main attractions psychological programs hold for most people.

It's a definite factor in the popularity of the Eliza program and its descendants. This program simulates the questioning of a nondirective therapist, using words and phrases from your answers in its subsequent questions. Joseph Weizenbaum originally wrote Eliza as an exercise to show how computers could *not* do the job of human therapists. As he reports in his book *Computer Power and Human Reason*, he was astonished to find that some people actually preferred interacting with the machine, even to the point of treating their dialogues with it as private and confidential.

The power of a computer to draw in those individuals who have trouble talking with other people is one of the unanticipated side-benefits of the whole personal-computer phenomenon. Even when it's running software that has nothing explicitly to do with psychological well-being, the computer, because of its interactive nature, can help bring out a reaction in people who would otherwise feel cut off from the world. Unfortunately, the process also works the other way around—some people use the computer as an escape that frees them from the necessity of dealing with people, who can be less predictable than software or hardware.

Truth and wisdom, it appears, still remain elusive. The tool can be used for both good and evil. Isn't that, after all, the lesson we were supposed to learn from the original apple? **+**

SELF-HELP

A short glossary

ASSESS

To gather evidence about the current state of a person or situation. Many self-help programs attempt to assess characteristics of the user or another person who is the object of inquiry. Most state laws, however, permit only licensed medical personnel to diagnose (state the cause of a problem).

AUTONOMIC NERVOUS SYSTEM

The part of our nervous system that regulates bodily processes beyond normal conscious control, such as heartbeat, blood pressure, and so on. Clear evidence shows that, with the proper training, people can bring many of these processes under conscious control.

CONFIDENCE LEVEL

The chance that a result may be due to random fluctuation rather than due to a significant difference. The value is usually expressed either as a percentage or as a decimal fraction. In many psychological tests, a value of less than 5% is considered significant, meaning that there may be as much as 1 chance in 20 that the results are due merely to random variations.

CORRELATION

The likelihood of one particular event or state, given the occurrence of a second. Correlation between two or more events does not necessarily imply causation. Sometimes, known or unknown external factors may be the cause of all the observed events. For example, the fact that most computer users are male

does not mean that computers cause people to become male or that being male causes people to spend time with computers. Most present psychological software attempts to find factors known to be correlated with other states, but does not have the depth or ability to figure out causation.

ELECTROMYOGRAPH

An instrument that records electrical impulses in muscles, or the record produced by such an instrument. It is useful in studies of specific muscles, but it can also measure general tension levels.

FACE VALIDITY

The extent to which a test or assessment seems to directly relate to the skill or state it claims to measure. For example, a questionnaire on caloric intake and exercise would have high face validity for predicting body weight. Because of the complexity of the human psyche, a test or question that asks about one subject may prove to be a good predictor of some seemingly unrelated topic, thus having high accuracy and validity but low face validity.

GALVANIC SKIN RESPONSE (GSR)

The change in electrical characteristics of the skin due to stress or other internal changes. The GSR is one of the principal items some tests of relaxation—and lie-detector tests—measure. Another term for the same phenomenon is the electrodermal response.

ISOLATED

Said of electrodes for measuring physiological responses: hooked up so no path exists between the electrical supply and the

electrode. Electrodes hooked to humans and a computer should always be isolated. One common method is to use a battery-powered circuit for the electrode, connecting it to the Apple with an optoisolator, which transmits the signal from the electrode to the Apple via a beam of light but blocks any current flow the other way.

ITEM ANALYSIS

Picking out which questions or tests in a larger set are most useful for indicating the property of interest. Most standardized tests are the result of a process of winnowing out a small number of effective questions from a much larger set of initial candidates.

Various statistical programs, some of which are available for the Apple, can aid in this procedure.

NONDIRECTIVE

Questioning that does not define the expected answer as part of the question. The Eliza psychological program, for example, attempts to be as nondirective as possible, letting users determine the content and tone of the discussion.

OPERANT

CONDITIONING

A training method based on the supposition that responses that are directly rewarded will increase in frequency and that those that are not rewarded or are punished will become more rare. In its primitive form, this method is widely used to train animals, but its effectiveness for teaching complex concepts to humans is in question. Some simple educational software uses principles of operant conditioning, rewarding each correct answer with praise, a tune, or a flashy picture.

PRECISION

The sharpness of the distinctions expressed in a particular value or classification. For example, 1.05 is a more precise value than 1, since the first value implies that the results are known to the nearest hundredth.

RELIABILITY

Said of a psychological or physiological test or assessment tool: the extent to which it consistently produces the correct indications (or at least consistent indications—a test can be reliable but inaccurate).

SYNESTHESIA

A combining of perceptions from various senses. One of the goals of many newer software packages is to combine graphics, text, and sometimes music to involve users more fully than would be possible in a less interactive medium.

VALIDITY

The extent to which results or conclusions are true indicators of the quality they claim to predict. For example, if a self-assessment package claims to tell whether you're outgoing, it is highly valid if its result agrees with what an impartial observer would conclude. A test can be reliable (producing the same conclusion for the same inputs) but still not valid.

WIN-WIN

Situations in which both (or all) parties gain.

ZERO-SUM

Said of situations where one party must lose if another is to win. The object of many psychological and management programs is to help you find ways to turn apparent zero-sum situations into win-win situations. +

THE APPLE Cons

Within ten years the new personnel consultant at your company may be a computer.

Today's crop of business software can set up accounts for everything, spread magnificent spreadsheets, crack the communications barrier, and process more words than you can shake a chip at. Until recently, though, relatively little software helped managers grapple with the really tough aspect of their jobs—managing people. That idea's time has almost come.

Software for managers is still mighty thin on the ground. This situation is partly a result of the youth of the microcomputer industry as a whole. It's also a sign that software houses are reluctant to tackle problems more difficult than number crunching, for which computers are ideal. Now that the market is glutted with spreadsheets and database managers, however, firms are turning to the ripening field of computerized training and adult-education packages.

A study conducted by Wilson Learning Corporation in New York showed that of an estimated \$1 billion spent on management training every year in the United States, only 5% goes for self-instruction courses, reports the *Wall Street Journal*. But that same study indicated that within five years, that 5% will balloon to 50%, and most of that increase will come from courses that use computers. (Coincidentally, Wilson Learning is now developing a computer-based management-training package.)

At this writing, only a handful of companies are producing management self-help software. These programs differ widely in purpose and tone, and

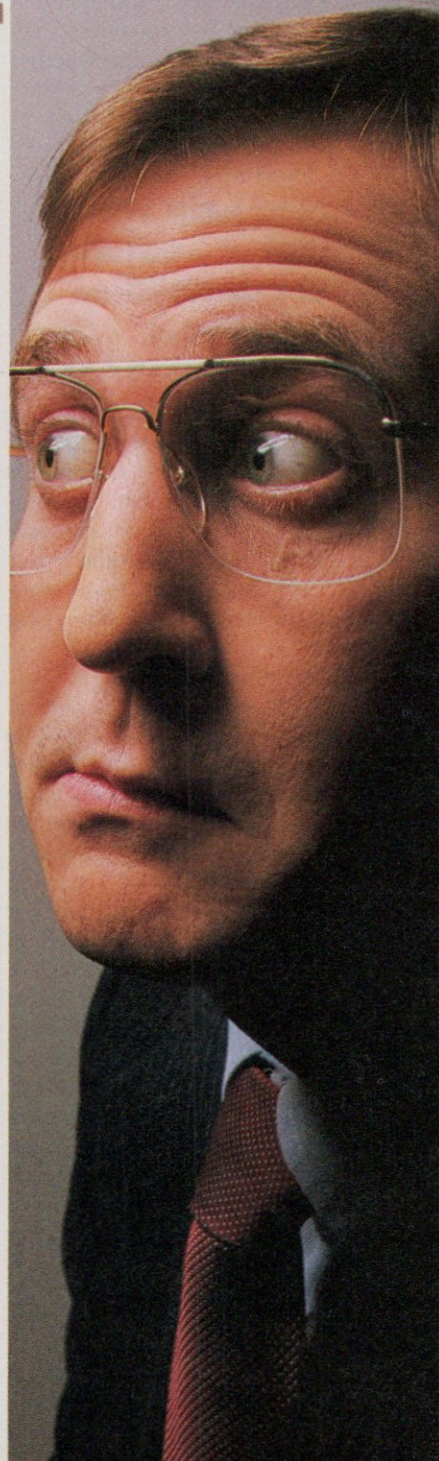
their authors hail from widely different backgrounds. Some are offshoots of preexisting management-training seminars, choreographed to fit on a floppy disk. Others derive from the desire of experts to translate the wisdom of their field into a marketable package. Some programs are innovative; others are rehashes. All of them stand to do well in the market, though, simply because so little is available now.

Low-Cost Consultant

The chief advantage of computer-aided self-help programs is their cost, when compared with having to learn similar material from a consultant or seminar. Many of you readers will have noted the \$800-and-above price tag on two- and three-day seminars. Contrast the typical cost of a computerized self-help program, which ranges between \$200 and \$500. Along with the lower cost, buyers receive an infinitely patient instructor, learning that students can personally pace, and the potential to tailor the learning to their particular situations.

Apple computers retain a slight edge over the IBM Personal Computer in this market because of Apple's overwhelming share of the education field. This lead will continue for some time, especially as companies write programs for the Macintosh.

The programs currently available for Apple computers divide into two basic types (with some overlap between them): expert systems, in which the user enters data and gets results or direction without much interaction—a kind of received wisdom; and expert processes, where the user is led down a path that may have been carved out by experts but whose ultimate goal is de-



finied by the individual at the keyboard.

Human Edge Software

One of the first firms to enter the field of self-help software for managers was the Human Edge Software Corporation in Palo Alto, California. Its founder, Jim Johnson, possesses a set of qualifications that prepared him perfectly to push computerized self-help—a doctorate in clinical psychology and a stint as a computer salesman. Before founding Human Edge, Johnson had created another company, called Psych Systems, which specialized in computer test interpretations for psychiatrists.

Human Edge publishes a series of managerial software: The Sales Edge, The Communication Edge, The Negotiation Edge, and The Management Edge. All of these programs rely on how users (managers, negotiators, or salespeople) rank others (employees, other

negotiators, or sales prospects) on a list of personality descriptors. Depending on how the users characterize other people they work with, the program emits a set of instructions for dealing with particular individuals.

Users get a chance to rank themselves, too, though with a series of statements about themselves rather than single-word descriptions. This is not an interactive method of looking at the situation (a partial relief to those of us who would be quite happy never to see or hear the buzzword *interactive* again), but a prescriptive method—an expert system, if you will.

Experience in Software

Another approach to managers' self-help exists in a program called The Art of Negotiation, by Experience in Software, Berkeley, California. Unlike the Human Edge programs, The Art of Negotiation does not give users hard-and-fast answers—users must find those answers by themselves. This program was designed to be used in any kind of negotiation—from asking for a

raise, to settling a corporate merger, to negotiating who will do the housework.

Instead of presenting you with ready-made answers to negotiating questions, this package makes you work for them through the lengthy but crucial process of stating your issues and objectives and then clarifying and rephrasing them in more neutral language. Eventually you understand better what your "opponent" might think, as well as being clearer about your own position. The program works toward a situation where, with luck, both sides of a negotiation can somehow win.

Company president Roy Nierenberg says of The Art of Negotiation, "It's a framework to focus your thoughts and help you attack a specific problem. I dreamt of software that could help you ponder . . . extend your capabilities and your imagination."

Thoughtware

Thoughtware is the other old-timer in the self-help field. This company (based in Coconut Grove, Florida), capitalizing on experience in conducting management-training seminars, has produced 11 self-help packages. At first, says president Jack Levine, Thoughtware was content to produce software that resembled classroom material. Eventually, though, as the company became more comfortable with computer-aided training, it became more innovative, reorienting its work toward helping managers put together a "script" (i.e., pattern or template) that, with the input different situations require, helps them work through a variety of problems.

Thoughtware's array of products—Assessing Personal Management Skills, Evaluating Organizational Effectiveness, Understanding Personal Interactive Style, Leading Effectively, Managing Time Effectively, and Motivating to Achieve Results—covers a broad range of management skills. A new offering, Managing by Exception, leaves managers alone except when the natural flow of things—the number of sales calls or the time spent dealing with cases—is somehow disrupted; then the system is triggered to send a memo or otherwise alert you that everything is not as it should be.

Thoughtware's primary targets are first-time managers, supervisors without experience who want to get their feet wet without dousing the employees. Levine says his company's products place a higher value on graphics than

many others do, in order to focus users' attention on the material, rather than on the computer.

Concourse

This firm, a spinoff from Control Data that used to be a custom-software house for the PLATO system, has come up with a special program to teach participative management skills.

"The old authoritarian method is not the best way to manage people anymore," says Maureen Pittman, Concourse's vice president of sales and marketing.

The Participative Management Skills program has five modules: a diagnostic module to determine whether

your company already has some form of participative management; an analysis of your personal power within the company and a question-and-answer section to help you determine your strengths; and modules on team communication, consensus, and managing conflict.

Helping Yourself to Self-Help

We got a chance to peek at two of the products mentioned above, The Management Edge and The Art of Negotiation. Both come in handy for managers, although your personal preference would undoubtedly hinge on your management style. If you envision yourself as either a wheeler-dealer or a peacemaker, The Art of Negotiation would probably suit you. This program bends over backwards to ensure that you understand what the other side wants; in fact, both parties in a negotiation can use it at once. Lawyers, real-estate agents, educators, and insurance agents can gain invaluable practice listening to the other side of the story as, simultaneously, they bring their own goals forward. This program, clearly documented and easy for novices to operate, works equally well in solving interpersonal disputes. (The author attests to its facility in ironing out a major dispute over household chores.)

For managers who work with many people or have to do a great deal of

"psyching out" of employees or coworkers, The Management Edge offers hours of fascination. Be sure you understand the meaning of all the one-word personality descriptors before you make your final decision—*sensitive*, for instance, may mean "sensitive of surroundings" or "aesthetically aware" to you, but to the program it means "touchy, sensitive to criticism." The program has several internal modules on subjects ranging from how to improve communications to firing recalcitrant employees. You receive a series of paragraphs via your printer (unfortunately, via your printer only, not on the screen) explaining how you as a manager can best deal with the employee whose qualities you have painstakingly entered.

An instructive exercise is to rate yourself as an employee—you may not be the same affable old soul you thought you were! The *Wall Street Journal* quotes Victor Sloan, president of Victor Aviation Services in Palo Alto, California, who used this program to decide how to motivate an employee he thought needed to work more with others. No, admonished the program, let him work alone. When Sloan followed that advice, the employee's productivity rose 30%.

Why So Few?

Many of the companies I contacted for this article expressed mild surprise that so few firms had entered the market. Some attributed the gap to suspicion of computer-based training when compared to seminars and in-person instruction. "Ideally, of course, training should have some of both (computerized courses and personal instruction) for maximum effectiveness," says Pittman. Some in-house trainers may discourage computer-based training on the grounds that it could eventually ease them out of their jobs.

"Inspiration comes better from humans," admits Thoughtware's Levine, although he adds that these computerized self-help packages are still exciting on their own because of their novelty.

Another more down-to-earth reason for the small number of firms in this market is the lack, until recently, of a widespread installed base for such programs. It comes as no surprise that the oldest of the self-help-software firms started business in early 1983. As programs to help managers help themselves begin to be in demand, companies may appear as though out of thin air.

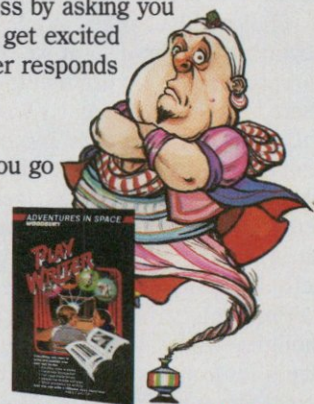

Stress—it affects virtually everyone to some extent. Left unattended, stress can lead to a plethora of ailments, both emotional and physical. In fact, one American Medical Association report estimates that more than 75% of doctors' visits involve stress-related disorders of one sort or another.

What Is Stress?

Any demand imposed on us, either physically or mentally, constitutes a stress. The manner in which we respond to the stressful situation, however, is what is important. We can either respond creatively and defuse the stress, or we can fall into a cycle of increasing tension and cause a dangerous physiological spiral to develop.

This latter series of events arises from the body's natural, internal response system, designed millions of years ago to help protect us from the hazards of primitive life. Often referred to as the fight-or-flight response, it is actually a series of physiological and psychological changes, some of which occur almost the instant we sense some threat in our environment. Actually, there is nothing inherently wrong about this response, and it is sometimes appropriate—as those who have had to physically protect themselves can attest. The instant infusion of adrenaline during moments of physical danger is actually positive and adaptive behavior.

Problems arise in modern society, though, when this ancient physical stress response is activated at inappropriate times. The solutions to most daily problems hinge on clear verbal negotiation and forethought rather than on muscle tension, sweaty palms, and high blood pressure. If the fight-or-

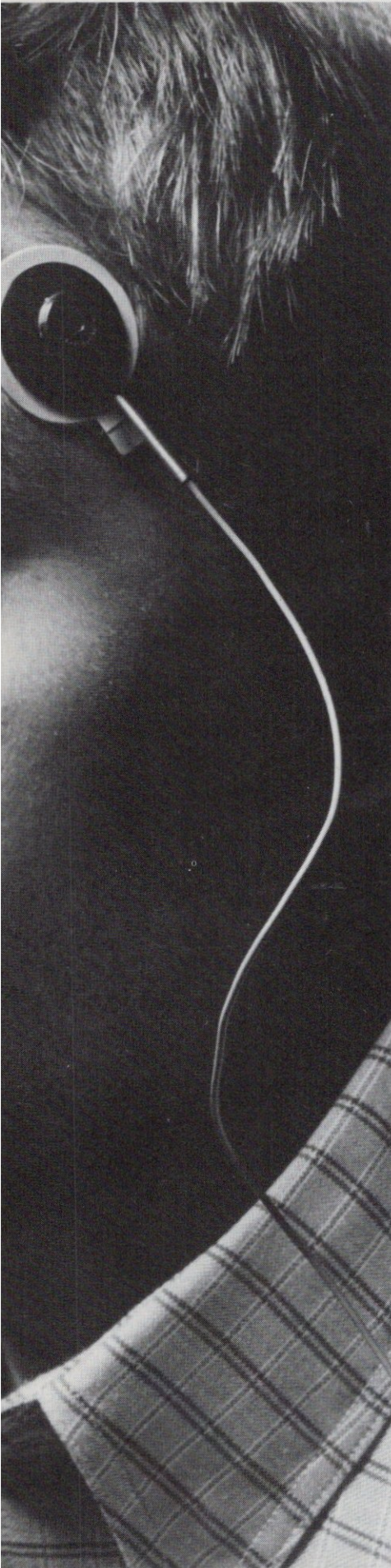
flight response to life continues unabated for any length of time, because of emotional problems or other stresses, undesirable effects often appear. Symptoms can run the gamut from relatively innocuous problems such as nocturnal tooth-grinding (bruxism) to certain forms of fatal cancer, if stress is left unattended.

Concern over the serious nature of many stress-related ailments has led to the acceptance of less-traditional techniques of stress management (such as medication and self-hypnosis) as well as to the development of new modalities for stress control and reduction. Any of the alternatives, if used successfully, are preferable to the use of the typically used prescription drugs, since most of these have undesirable side effects.

Biofeedback is one of the more effective new weapons in the war on stress and one that has gained acceptance throughout the medical community. Recently, this technique has been combined with the power and flexibility of the Apple computer, resulting in a new generation of equipment and software that can help treat and prevent a variety of ailments, from migraine headaches, to anxiety, to gastric ulcers. In addition, these same techniques are proving effective in the treatment of neuromuscular disorders and in the rehabilitation of accident and stroke victims.

Until recently, biofeedback equipment was too complicated and expensive to use at home. Typically, to be trained in the use of the equipment, a patient would visit a biofeedback clinic on a regular basis. Now, low-cost (less than \$150) biofeedback systems that





work with the Apple computer are becoming available as well. These systems allow you to benefit from biofeedback techniques in your home as part of an overall stress-management program.

What Is Biofeedback?

Put simply, biofeedback is a method of monitoring and reporting activity in your body that is sometimes too subtle to detect without aid. For example, a person experiencing a headache may be unconsciously tensing neck, jaw, and head muscles. This tension may actually be causing the headache, although the person is not aware of the cause-and-effect relationship and may think the tension is only the result.

A series of sensors placed on the surface of a patient's skin near the muscles in question can trigger either a light or sound reaction from the biofeedback equipment, alerting the patient to moments of tension or relaxation. With practice, the subject begins to see the cause-and-effect relationship between body activities and these reactions and can begin to control them consciously by learning to relax the associated muscles—thus gradually transforming the fight-or-flight response into its opposite, stay-and-play.

Whether your goal is increased relaxation, lower blood pressure, or improved circulation, biofeedback helps you learn the techniques that will help you reach it.

The most common use for biofeedback is in stress management. An effective plan of stress management consists of many elements—counseling, nutrition, and exercise—but a very necessary part of any program is learning to relax. Enter biofeedback.

Patients who have experienced biofeedback therapy often report great progress in a very short time. In the words of one such patient, "Before using biofeedback, I literally didn't know *how* to relax. In just a couple of sessions I learned what would make me calmer, and soon was able to do it without the feedback." People are surprised at how easy it is to relax and control stress once they have a way to monitor their progress.

Types of Biofeedback

The most popular instrument in biofeedback training today is the electromyograph or EMG. This device monitors the minute changes in electrical activity that accompany muscle contraction.

The same system can be used with almost any skeletal muscle,

but it is most commonly used with those in the forehead. Not only are the forehead (frontalis) muscles a good barometer of overall body tension, but they are also very close to the skin's surface, making them easy to monitor. A headband equipped with small electrodes detects electrical impulses and feeds them into the EMG device.

In addition to stress and tension-headache management, an EMG is also useful in treating muscle disorders and disorders of the nervous system. A sensor placed against a weak or convulsive muscle can help a patient gain—or regain—control over that area. The system has proved to be a great aid to the recovery of stroke and paralysis victims.

Another popular biofeedback system measures the conductivity of skin—galvanic skin response (GSR)—usually taking the readings from the palm of the hand. As emotional stress increases, so does perspiration, with skin conductivity increasing accordingly. Monitor-

ing the amount of change gives you an accurate indication of emotional state. In fact, polygraph (lie-detector) equipment relies primarily on this system.

A third technique measures blood flow and dilation of blood vessels, until recently by monitoring temperature at the extremities—easy to do, but difficult to control. A newer, more sophisticated system, called a photoplethsmograph (PPG) uses a small light source and photodetector mounted together. Light shines through the skin and reflects back when it strikes the darker tissue below. The darker the tissue, the more blood it contains and the more light it will reflect. Not only is this device more accurate and easier to use than earlier systems, but it also affords a simple way to measure pulse rate from a fingertip sensor.

This technique has proved very effective in treating and preventing certain types of migraine headaches. Since these headaches are often a result of disturbances in small arteries leading

to the brain, any program that teaches control over the vascular system is a great help. Many patients who have suffered for years from migraines have found relief for the first time, thanks to biofeedback training.

The Apple Connection

Although biofeedback techniques have been in use for more than a decade, they have only recently begun to blossom. Part of the reason is the availability of low-cost, highly flexible computer systems such as the Apple.

The staff at Davicon-Enting, of Brookline, Massachusetts, are pioneers in the field of biofeedback technology and strong supporters of the Apple computer as a part of the complete system. According to company president Kevin Connolly, "The Apple was there from the start, and it remains the most flexible machine on the market for this

application. It's inexpensive, very reliable, and easy to use with a variety of input/output devices. In all, [it is] a serious tool that is ideal for our purposes."

Connolly goes on, "Designing medical equipment for use in hospitals entails a number of safety considerations as well. The Apple's fully insulated plastic case and switching power supply make it much less of a shock hazard than any other machine."

The complete Medac 2002 system from Davicon-Enting contains two EMG monitors, a GSR monitor, and a PPG unit, along with the necessary sensors and electrodes. The package also includes an Apple IIe computer with a clock card, two disk drives, a color monitor, a graphics printer, and custom-designed software. The entire system is priced in the \$10,000 range—no casual investment, but quite reasonable when compared to most medical instruments.

Although Davicon-Enting's system is available only to licensed health-care professionals, several devices exist for using biofeedback in the home. One such system, Relax, from Synapse Software Corporation, retails for \$139.95. The Relax system consists of a headband to monitor muscle activity, plus a battery-powered EMG unit that amplifies the signal and feeds it into an Apple II-series computer. The package also includes software routines to convert the signal into graphic images. The system does not provide a way to store these readings, nor does it accept input from muscles other than those of the forehead.

Using Relax was rather interesting and yes, relaxing. Several different graphic screen displays, along with a 25-minute relaxation exercise on cassette tape, added up to one refreshed author, ready for more writing. One of the screens in particular is very soothing, with kaleidoscopic, colored patterns emerging from the center of your monitor and moving outwards. As you relax, the patterns divide and become softer in color; tensing results in constricted, harsher effects. What could be more graphic? Another screen draws a continuous graph of your muscle tension, averaging a selected sampling rate (the number of readings being taken off the headband per second) to smooth out the peaks and valleys.

Generally, biofeedback clinics specializing in stress management work in a similar manner. During the biofeedback session, the patient sits in a comfortable chair, usually in a quiet room. The computer monitor displays a changing graph that corresponds to the patient's level of tension. Often, this graph is accompanied by an audio tone. As the patient relaxes, the tone and graph show the result. If muscles begin to tense, the graph reflects this too—long before it could be detected without the aid of feedback. The results of the session are recorded to disk, creating a record of the patient's progress.

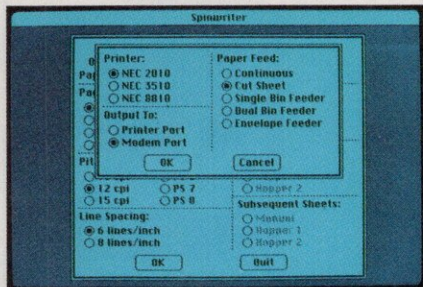
Other treatment programs require a slightly different approach. When biofeedback is used to help stroke and accident victims, sensors are attached directly to the affected area. One successful program has used biofeedback to treat "foot drop," a common aftereffect of a stroke. When sensors are placed on the muscles of a patient's lower leg, the faint electrical impulses still present in that area create a graphic image. By watching the graph, the

► A PROFESSIONAL VIEW

Professionals who use biofeedback therapy are among the most progressive and open-minded individuals you will find in any health-care field. One such person is Dr. Harold Musiker, head of the Department of Behavioral Medicine at Rhode Island Hospital. Dr. Musiker has been using biofeedback in his practice for more than 12 years and is one of the leading authorities in the field.

According to Dr. Musiker, biofeedback has not completely replaced any forms of therapy, but it does allow patients to achieve their goals in a much shorter time and with less need for medication. He has used it to treat anxiety, stress, headaches, vascular problems, and many types of neuromuscular disorders.

Adding an Apple computer to his treatment program has had a very positive influence. "Patients love it," says Musiker, "and the graphics make it much easier for them to see their progress." He adds, "The automatic data storage, sampling, and hard copy provided by the Apple has turned biofeed-

back into a research-grade process."

Although an avid supporter of biofeedback, Musiker is less than excited about many of the products currently available for use in the home. "Even a high-quality product is relatively worthless without proper coaching and support, and most of the ones I have seen are far from high quality" he says. "Low-priced units are quite prone to false readings and interference from stray electrical signals."

One serious reservation professionals express about biofeedback products for the home is that people are prone to self-diagnosis. One puts it this way: "I would hate to see someone purchase a biofeedback monitor to relieve a headache, only to discover too late that it was caused by something much more serious than simple muscle tension."

In some situations, however, professionals feel a home biofeedback monitor can be of help. Musiker explains, "If someone is taking part in a properly designed, professionally monitored program of stress management, using a well-designed biofeedback device at

home helps reinforce the techniques learned here in the office."

What makes one system better than another? Sensitivity is one factor, as is resistance to interference. A well-designed system should also provide feedback that is not self-defeating. For example, a system that relies entirely on graphics may require you to watch the computer's monitor at all times, thus making it difficult to relax completely. The addition of an audio tone would allow you to close your eyes slightly while still receiving the feedback signal.

The open architecture of the Apple makes it the logical choice for add-on devices such as biofeedback monitors. New devices are coming on the market each day. Many are well designed, but some less-than-acceptable units are being released as well. Another point to consider is that a unit well suited to one person may not be the ideal choice for someone else. Professionals who use biofeedback therapy can help recommend the home unit that is best for your particular needs.

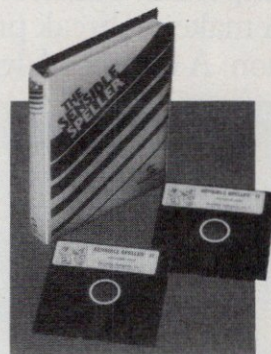

patient can exercise the weak muscles and gain control of them. The program has helped many patients walk normally again, without the need for splints or braces.

Much of the popularity of biofeedback stems from its "natural" approach. It allows, and even encourages, the body's own natural healing abilities by helping to supply the necessary rest to maintain and restore body cells. Moreover, biofeedback is free of side effects, is nonaddicting, and is less expensive than many other existing therapy programs.

New uses for biofeedback therapy are being developed every day. One of the most exciting experiments involves the treatment and control of certain types of cardiac arrhythmias, or irregular heartbeats. Research is showing that patients who suffer from this condition can learn to control their own heartbeat with the help of biofeedback training. With practice, patients have learned to produce the irregular heartbeats on command. More important, these same patients learn how to limit the event as well—sometimes eliminating it completely.

Thanks to the Apple computer's excellent graphics, even young children can now benefit from biofeedback therapy. The technique has proved to be of great value in treating a variety of conditions affecting the young, including neuromuscular disorders such as cerebral palsy.

As biofeedback becomes more accepted, the Apple will be right by its side. The next time you reach for an aspirin to relieve a headache, or an antacid to soothe your stomach, think of that old saying, "An Apple a day. . . ." It is truer now than ever before! +

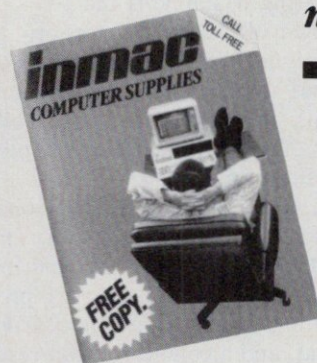

WITH YOUR APPLE

Dietitian

Remember when the word *nutrition* meant the four basic food groups and three well-balanced meals? Well, today many of you are more concerned about what you eat and its relationship to the quality of your life. You may have already made permanent changes in your eating habits (more grains, fruits, and vegetables; less salt and sugar).

Determining the nutritional value of your meals hasn't always been easy. That's where your Apple computer comes in. Because of the computer's ability to store and retrieve large amounts of information, your Apple, coupled with a nutrition-software program, can be a valuable tool in helping you analyze the nutritional content of the foods you and your family eat. Not only can your Apple help you analyze foods, but it can also help plan special diets and menus, determine activity levels for weight gain/loss, and summarize and store meal information.

We'll examine five available nutritional-analysis packages: The Eating Machine, Dietician, Nutri-Calc, Nutritionist II, and Healthaide. For those of you who subscribe to CompuServe or the Delphi information service, we'll look at what they have to offer in the way of nutrition information. Finally, we'll consider ways to select the best nutrition software.

Most of the software reviewed here was developed for the use of health professionals (dietitians, nutritionists, physicians) for analysis of past meals and planning of future ones. Thus, these programs assume that users have a broad range of knowledge about nutrition. Most home users will need to spend some time reading about basic nutrition and determining the ideal nutritional makeup of their diet. Be aware

that most programs won't tell you what to eat or make recommendations about your diet, so you're going to have to do some research to make this software truly useful (see the list of suggested reading material).

Much of the data these programs use is based on nutritional information in U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) publications, which give a comprehensive nutrient breakdown for most foods. Two well-known USDA publications are *Nutritive Value of American Foods* and its abbreviated version, *Nutritive Value of Foods*.

Before you rush to your local library or bookstore to fortify your knowledge with nutrition books, let's take a look at the five nutrition programs. We'll start with the simplest—in terms of use and required knowledge—and work to the more complex.

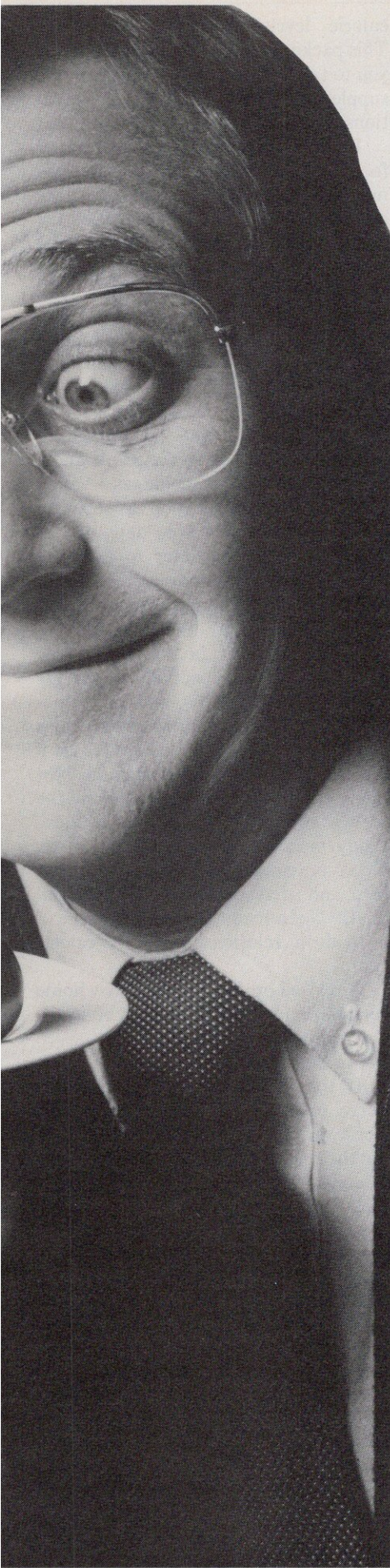
The Eating Machine

The Eating Machine is the only program of the five that was originally designed for home consumers or educational institutions. The program comes with two diskettes and a well-written manual that includes a chapter on the basics of nutrition.

You begin by entering your personal information (name, age, and sex). The Eating Machine uses this information to set your allowance for calories, protein, vitamins A and C, calcium, iron, sodium, fat, and alcohol. You can reset the limits for protein, carbohydrates, fat, and alcohol to other values, which can be important for people on special diets.

The program then prompts you to enter the foods you've eaten or plan to eat (by meal). You enter the foods by choosing the food group (such as fruit and fruit juices), and then choosing the





appropriate food (such as orange juice). For planning purposes, you can view the composition of individual foods before entering them, and you can store standard meals (such as a turkey sandwich and milk for lunch) as a single food, which expedites meal entry. The program comes with 500 foods, including fast foods and alcohol, and you can enter approximately 200 additional foods. You can also analyze your favorite recipes and change the nutritional data of foods that are already on your list.

Once you've entered all the foods, The Eating Machine can display your "nutritional score" as a bar graph or as a summary. The bar graph shows how close you've come to meeting your daily nutritional needs or goals, on the basis of the USRDA, the recommended daily allowance (see box, page 42, for explanation). Depending on whether you meet your calorie, vitamin, or protein allowance, the program gives you a "happy" face or a "sad" face with an obnoxious beep. The program gives you recommendations on foods to eat to correct any deficiencies. You also get the value of the percentage of your calories from fat and alcohol.

By creating a personal file, you can save your daily totals and get a summary (historical average) of your nutritional scores. If you want to save nutritional information, you have to do it this way, since the program cannot save lists of foods you eat or their nutritional information.

Dietician

Dietician is an easy-to-use analysis program with some limitations. The program determines only the calorie, carbohydrate, protein, fat, cholesterol, and sodium values of foods. This amount of information is probably sufficient for most users, but if you need to plan special diets (to keep track of calcium, for example), this program may not be complete enough. The program also doesn't help users decide on acceptable nutrient levels.

Dietician comes with a list of 700 foods. You can add other foods by creating additional data diskettes (each can hold 500 foods). Most users will want to add foods to this program, since the foods it lists are generic (no fast or processed foods, or alcohol).

You enter foods by choosing a food group and then selecting a food from the list. Rather than entering the foods by meal, you must enter them for the whole day. You can check individual foods before adding them to your diet,

and you can easily add or delete them. You can also analyze recipes and save diets to diskette and later retrieve, change, and print them.

A Macintosh version of this program, geared toward home consumers, became available in October 1984.

Nutri-Calc

Nutri-Calc was originally designed as an aid for health professionals. The software consists of two programs: Nutri-Calc, for nutritional analysis, and Calorie-Magic for calculating a weight gain/loss program. Nutri-Calc comes with 730 foods, including 90 brand-name items and 53 formulas (baby and special dietary). The program determines food composition in terms of 18 nutrients as well as fluids, calories, and total food weight. If you have special

needs or want a particularly thorough analysis, this complete nutrient breakdown is important. You can define up to 20 target daily allowances to substitute for the USRDA.

You enter foods for the entire day, rather than by meal, using numbers from the USDA's *Nutritive Value of Foods*. The program helps you find these numbers if you enter food-group names, but entering your daily food intake is still a tedious process.

Nutri-Calc gives you a summary and graph of the totals and the percentages and compares them to the RDA. You cannot save your daily diet to diskette, but the program can give you a seven-day average of your nutritional intake. You can change the nutrient data for listed foods, add new food items, print lists of foods and their nutrient data, and analyze recipes or menus. A personal version of Nutri-Calc came out in late 1984, and a Macintosh version is expected in the first quarter of 1985.

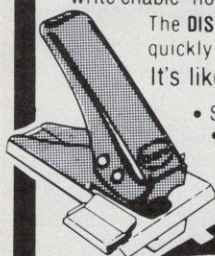
Nutritionist II

Nutritionist II is a professionally oriented program that provides a more complete analysis than what most home consumers are likely to need. The software package includes two diskettes, a

manual, a copy of the USDA bulletin *Nutritive Value of Foods*, and an exercise/weight brochure from The President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports.

The program comes with a list of 847 foods, and you can add more. Listed foods include baby food, fast food, spices, and wine. Foods are analyzed for 37 nutrients, 11 amino acids, and number of calories. What's more, you can determine the best food value based on cost, and the package contains a Fit Program (fitness/activity program).

Nutritionist II's menu-driven format does add extra steps to program use. You enter foods by number, which you can obtain from the USDA bulletin or from the program by entering the first

three letters of the desired food group. You can enter foods for the entire day or broken into meals by entering a meal code. Each menu option has additional commands at the bottom of the screen.

The analysis covers three display screens, in a bar-graph format. The program can sort a diet by a specific nutrient to determine food(s) causing an excess or deficiency. You can then use the Filter/Exchange/Substitute option to identify foods that will balance the diet. You can save up to 30 diets per diskette. Analysis of single foods and recipes is also possible.

The Food Editor program lets you add foods, list/print food lists, and change nutrient values for foods. Similarly, the RDAFile Editor lets you add RDA group (age, sex) categories and change the RDA values the program uses to analyze a diet.

Healthaide

Another professional nutritional analysis package is Healthaide. It is the most complex of all the software reviewed here, in terms of operation and features. The package includes two double-sided diskettes and a 140-page manual with a chapter on nutritional data. Healthaide includes a list of 720 foods, which it can analyze for 35 nutrients, including eight amino acids. Other parts of the package are an activity program and menus for seven different

calorie levels (1000-3000 calories). This package is the only one that allows you to take account of vitamin/mineral supplements in your daily diet calculations.

Healthaide prompts you to enter foods by meal. To enter food items, you must use the food codes listed in the manual. You can change your food list only after saving the diet to diskette and then recalling it. This requirement can make entering foods for three meals a lengthy process. A useful feature is the ability to select four nutrients whose running totals are updated and displayed as you enter foods.

The meal analysis includes a list of the total amount and percentage of each nutrient, based on the RDA, and a bar graph of the percentages. Amino acids, if any, appear on a separate screen. You can save your daily diet to diskette and use it later to generate monthly/yearly summaries.

Healthaide has many features that are standard on other nutritional-analysis programs, in that it lets you add foods, change food values, analyze single foods or recipes, and use values other than the RDA for analysis. It also has several unique features, such as a diet guide to help you determine how many calories you burn per day and the ability to set ten "personal values" (body measurements, emotional state, blood pressure), generate a shopping list, and determine the "nutritional quality" of a food (the nutrient value of a food in relationship to its calorie count).

A revised professional and new home version of Healthaide should be available in the first half of 1985.

Better Nutrition via Modem

If you subscribe to either CompuServe or the Delphi information service, you can now access (free, except for the phone charges) a new medical-reference source called Healthnet. Healthnet provides on-line information from a team of medical specialists on topics such as nutrition, fitness, diseases, drugs, and other medical concerns.

This service includes a question/answer column, a newsletter covering medical issues, and a service that allows you personally to ask for and receive information from a physician via electronic mail for \$15 per question. Addition of a reference library covering many health and medical topics was scheduled for the end of 1984. Among the nutritional topics are basic nutri-

► THE INS AND OUTS OF RDA

While reading about nutrition, shopping for food, or using any nutrition-analysis software, you are going to run into the abbreviations RDA and USRDA. Sometimes these terms are used erroneously to mean the same thing, but, in fact, they refer to two similar but different sets of nutritional recommendations.

RDA stands for recommended *dietary* allowances. These nutritional recommendations are issued by an independent, semiofficial agency called the Food and Nutrition Board. The allowances, which are given as a range, are "designed for the maintenance of good nutrition of practically all healthy people in the U.S.A." based on their age and sex. The RDA does not take into account individual factors or special nutritional requirements of some

individuals. The recommended dietary allowances cover ten vitamins, six minerals, protein, and calories.

Because the Food and Nutrition Board's recommended dietary allowances were considered too cumbersome for the public to use, the Federal Food and Drug Administration devised the USRDA—U.S. recommended *daily* allowances. This set of allowances is based on the RDA but is not broken down by age or sex. It is the basis for the nutritional information on the packages of processed foods and vitamins that show the percentage of essential nutrients per serving. Since the USRDA listings give only one value per nutrient (generally the higher value on the RDA range), food labels generally indicate larger nutrient amounts than most individuals need.

tion, vitamins and minerals, various diets, types of exercise, and holistic medicine.

So you want to eat better, and you're sold on the idea of using your Apple to help you do that? Before you buy a nutritional-analysis package, though, you need to do a little soul searching. Take a

look at your life-style and needs. Ask yourself the following questions:

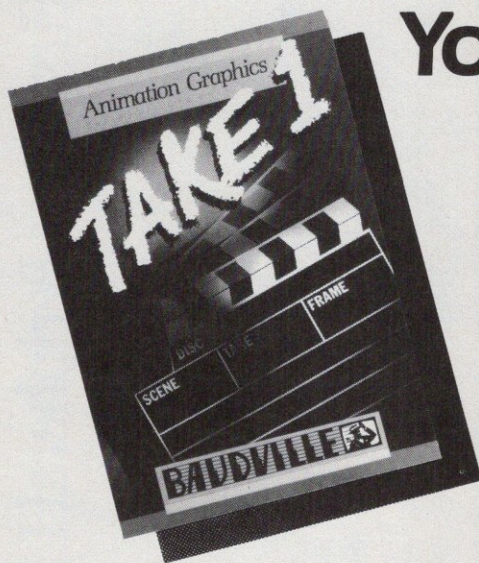
- How much do I know about nutrition? Am I willing to do additional research?
- Will I be using this program daily, or will it get only occasional use?
- Do I need to plan special menus or

diets, such as low salt or diabetic?

- How much time do I want to spend to learn to use the software and to use the program every day?
- What special features do I want, such as a fitness/activity program, weekly/monthly summaries, diet storage to diskette, or ability to use nutritional guidelines other than the RDA?

Once you have some idea about the type of software you want, you're ready to take a look at the available software at your computer store. Besides noting if the software has the features you want, look to see if the instructions and operations are easy to use, and what nutritional standard was used to develop the software. And, most important, assess how much knowledge of nutrition you need in order to use the program successfully. Remember, for a nutrition-software package to help improve your diet, it must be a tool you can enjoy using daily. To your good health! +

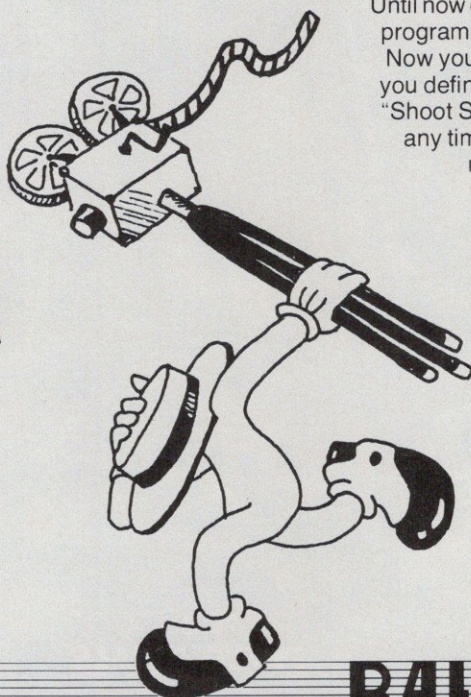

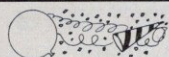

► BOOK EXCERPT/BY PAUL FREIBERGER AND MICHAEL SWAINE

This month we are finishing our two-part condensed excerpt on the history of Apple Computer that began in the December issue. The book *Fire in the Valley*, by Paul Freiberger and Michael Swaine, chronicles the development of the personal-computer industry. Freiberger and Swaine are both veteran technology writers who formerly covered the microcomputer beat for *InfoWorld*. Freiberger is now an editor of *Popular Computing*, and Swaine is editor-in-chief of *Dr. Dobbs's Journal*. Last month's installment was the modern-day Horatio Alger story about two guys named Steve who sold their VW and two calculators to start a company that was destined to become the first corporation to make the exclusive Fortune 500 list in only five years.

This month we start the story with Steve Wozniak's amazing Christmas-vacation effort that resulted in the Apple Disk II, a burst of genius that dusty. We follow the Apple story from the III fiasco, and finish with Apple's

gave Apple a real boost in the computer in-highs of Woz's Disk II to the lows of the Apple great hope, the Macintosh.

FIRE IN THE valley

Before the end of 1977 Woz had started working on his next big project. The idea arose from an executive board meeting in December 1977. Present at the meeting were Mike Markkula, Mike Scott, Rod Holt, Jobs, and Woz. Markkula stepped forward and wrote on a board a list of goals for the company. At the top of the list Woz saw the words "floppy disk."

"I don't know how floppy disks work," Woz thought.

Nevertheless he knew Markkula was right. Cassette tape storage of data was utterly unreliable. Dealers were complaining about it. Markkula had decided that the disk drive was essential. Markkula was fed up with the laborious task of reading data off cassette tapes. He told Woz that he wanted the disk ready for the Consumer Electronics Show that Apple would attend in January.

Markkula knew the effect his words would have. They would take away Woz's Christmas vacation. It was entirely unreasonable to expect anyone to

devise a functioning disk drive in a month. But that was the kind of challenge Woz thrived on. No one had to tell him to work long hours over the vacation. He drove himself.

In fact, Woz was not ignorant about disk drives. He had, until then, never read a book on the subject or worked on disk drives professionally, but while at HP he had examined a manual from Shugart, the Silicon Valley disk drive manufacturer. As an experiment Woz

had conceived a circuit that would do much of what the Shugart manual said was needed to control a disk drive. Woz didn't know how computers actually controlled drives, but his method had seemed to him particularly simple and clever. When Markkula challenged him to put a disk drive on the Apple, he recalled that circuit and began considering its feasibility. He looked at the way other computer companies—including IBM—controlled drives. He also began to examine disk drives—particularly North Star's. After read-

ing the North Star manual, Woz knew that his circuit would do what theirs did and more. He knew he really had a clever design.

But the clever circuit was only part of the disk control problem. The puzzle had other pieces—synchronization. A disk drive presents tricky problems of timing. IBM's technique involved complex circuitry, which Woz studied until he understood it. But that circuitry was unnecessary, he saw, if the way the data

were written to the disk was altered. Since this was his machine, he could re-define anything he wanted, so he eliminated the synchronization circuitry completely. The drive would synchronize itself automatically with no hardware circuitry at all, and this "self-sync" technique scored a point against IBM. Woz knew that because the mammoth corporation lacked this kind of flexibility, it *couldn't* do what he had done, and he also knew that whatever economies of scale IBM could bring to bear, no circuitry is still less expensive than some.

Wozniak could now write the software to read from and write to the disk. At this point he called in Randy Wig-

ginton to help. Woz wanted a formatter, a program that would write special non-data to the disk, essentially wiping it clean to set it up for use. Woz gave Wigginton just the essentials, such as how to make the drive motor move through software. Wigginton took it from there.

Woz and Wigginton worked day and night throughout December, even laboring for ten hours on Christmas Day. They knew they couldn't get a complete disk operating system running for the show, so they spent time developing a demo operating system. They wanted to be able to type in one-letter file names and read files stored in fixed locations on the disk. When they left for the Consumer Electronics show in Las Vegas, however, they weren't even able to do that.

Wigginton and Woz arrived in Las Vegas the night before the event. The Consumer Electronics Show was not a hobby computer show. Many of the exhibitors were established consumer electronics firms producing stereo equipment and calculators. The buyers of such items were general consumers, not electronics hobbyists. But Markkula wanted Apple to pursue a broader market, and he regarded this show as vital for Apple's growth. For Woz and Wigginton, it was an adventure outside time.

They helped set up the booth that night and went back to work on the drive, planning to have it done when the show opened in the morning even if they had to go without sleep. Staying up all night is no novelty in Las Vegas, and that's what they did, taking periodic breaks from programming to inspect the craps tables. Wigginton, 17, was elated when he won \$35 at craps, and then he accidentally erased a disk they had been working on. Woz patiently helped him reconstruct the information on the disk. They tried to take a nap at 7:30 that morning, but were both too keyed up.

After the show, Woz completed the disk drive, consulting Rod Holt on what he could really expect the drives to do. Woz himself laid out the circuit board that was to control the drive. Normally the layout work was sent to a contracting firm, but the contractor was busy and Woz wasn't. He worked on it every night until two in the morning for two weeks. When he was finished, he saw a way to cut down on feedthroughs—signal lines crossing on the board—by moving a connector. The improvement meant redoing the entire layout, but this time he completed this task in only 20 hours. He then saw a way to eliminate one more feedthrough by reversing the order of the bits of data transmitted by the board. So he laid out the board again. The final design was generally recognized by computer engineers as brilliant and was by engineering aesthetics beautiful. Woz later said, "It's something you can *only* do if you're the engineer and the PC board layout person yourself. That was an artistic layout. The board has virtually no feedthroughs."

The disk drive, which Apple began shipping in June 1978, was vital for the company, second in importance only to the computer itself. The drive made possible the development of serious software such as word processors and data base packages. Like most early successes at Apple, it represented an enormous amount of unconstrained individual effort. But the hobbyist spirit was being channeled by a few sharp executives who understood how to build a company.

The Apple III Fiasco

During Apple's third fiscal year, which ended on September 30, 1979, sales of the Apple II increased to 35,100, more than quadruple those of the previous year. Nevertheless, the company recognized a need to develop another product soon. No one believed

that the Apple II could remain a best-seller for more than another year or two.

In 1978 Apple took several steps to gear up for the challenge. Chuck Peddle was hired in the summer although his responsibilities were unclear. As the designer of both the 6502 microprocessor and Commodore's PET computer, which was competing with the Apple, he seemed like a good person to have around. Before Apple had emerged from the garage, Peddle had tried to convince Commodore to purchase the small operation. But Apple and Commodore were unable to come to terms. Peddle's PET (said to stand for Personal Electronic Transactor or Peddle's Ego Trip, but actually named after the pet rock phenomenon of the day) was introduced at the same time as the Apple II at the First West Coast Computer Faire in 1977. The PET did not greatly influence the development of the American personal computer industry because company president Jack Tramiel opted to concentrate on European sales and because Commodore was slow to provide a disk drive. Eventually, Apple executives failed to agree with Peddle on his role, and he returned to Commodore at the end of 1978.

By that time Tom Whitney, Woz's former boss at Hewlett-Packard and a student at Iowa State University, was

hired to supervise and enlarge the engineering department in order to begin designing new products.

In late 1978 several new computer projects were started. The first, an enhanced version of the Apple II with custom chips, was code-named Annie. Woz worked with another engineer on it but didn't complete the project. Moreover, he didn't pursue it with the intensity he had given his previous computer designs or the disk drive. Executives also discussed having Woz design a supercomputer utilizing bit-sliced architecture, which would spread the capabilities of the microprocessor over several identical chips. Its chief advan-

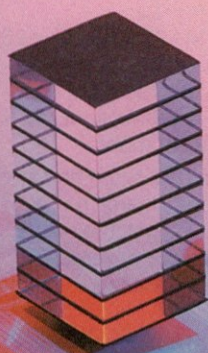

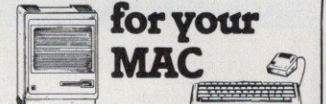

tages were speed and variable precision, that is, high precision for scientific data and low precision for integer and character data. An engineering staff was put together for this computer, code-named Lisa. The Lisa project started slowly and passed through many incarnations over several years. Eventually a former Hewlett-Packard engineer hired by Tom Whitney took over as its project director.

Meanwhile, Wendell Sander took charge of designing the next Apple computer, the Apple III. Sander, one of Apple's most trusted employees, was being asked to design a machine that would equal the success of all the other Apple products. When he commenced work, the company told him that it hoped he could finish it within a year.

Woz had designed the Apple II to be what *he* wanted in a computer. But Sander had constraints from the outset. They derived from a meeting of the executive staff that at the time still in-

cluded Chuck Peddle. The staff compiled a general and somewhat vague list of guidelines, mentioning such desiderata as enhanced graphics and more memory. There were a few detailed, specific concepts as well. For instance, executives said, the machine should be able to display 80 columns rather than 40, and it should have both upper- and lowercase characters.

Sander was told that the new machine should be able to run software designed for the Apple II. Although this compatibility was desirable considering the large pool of software being developed for the Apple II by outside programmers, it posed a problem. Designing a computer that is significantly different from another machine but that can still run the other's software is not an easy task. The hardware itself determines, at bottom, what the software must do. The microprocessor chip determines the possible machine language operations, and the disk drive determines the features of the operating system software. When this hardware differs between two machines, the

computers can only run the same applications software through an intermediate layer of software built into the machine to permit an "emulation mode." The intermediate layer intercepts commands from the applications program and translates them into corresponding commands—or sequences of commands—for the underlying hardware. The process is inherently inefficient and the inefficiency shows most in programs where timing is vital. The most critical hardware feature in the emulation problem is the microprocessor, and Apple decided to simplify this aspect of it by using the Apple II's processor, the 6502.

The emulation edict was not without controversy. Apple engineers and programmers felt that emulation would limit the capabilities of the breakthrough machine they were supposed to create. *They* wouldn't want this kind of machine, they felt. But the marketing staff saw emulation as a stimulus to sales. First, an existing body of software could run on it immediately. Second, Apple could claim it was designing a family of computers. The decree was not rescinded.

In a sense, emulation boxed Sander in, limiting his creativity. The most important decision in the design of a computer—selection of a microprocessor—had been made by others. In fact, designers of the 6502 hadn't intended it to be used as the central processor in a computer. Apple considered adding an additional processor, a second brain, with some capacity to switch from one to the other. But a dual-processor machine would have been more expensive than the company wanted. Sander wasn't a person to protest. He liked computer designing, and he took the guidelines and set out to implement them.

Woz occasionally consulted with Sander on the project but he trusted his colleague, who was "an incredible engineer." Nevertheless, Woz later complained about emulation. He would have done it differently. "Apple claims they've got it and they don't," he said.

Since no project had completely captured his attention, Woz was in a joking mood. One day he sneaked into a programmer's cubicle and placed a mouse inside his computer. When the programmer returned it took him more than a few minutes to figure out why his Apple was squeaking.

Delays in the Apple III were soon causing concern in the marketing department. The growing pains of the

young company were beginning to show at last. The Apple III was, in fact, the first computer that Apple—as a company—had built from scratch. When the company formed, the Apple II was already near completion. The III was also the first Apple not built by Steve Wozniak in pursuit of his dream machine. Instead it was an awkward col-

lage, pasted together by the many hands of a committee. Often the left hand didn't like what the right hand was doing.

Moreover, the pressure put on the Apple III project group for a swift completion probably wasn't even necessary. Although new companies were entering the personal computer market, Apple had erased the gap with Radio Shack and had become the leading personal computer company. In 1980, Apple II sales doubled to more than 78,000. Nevertheless the marketing people were worried. The Apple III must be announced.

Sander consented to introduce the new machine at the National Computer Conference in May 1980 in Anaheim, California. He felt that curtain raising was a bit premature. Nonetheless, there were a few working prototypes and the operating system software was "in workable shape." Perhaps it could be managed.

At the NCC the Apple III was well received by the industry and the press. The glamor story was continuing. In addition to unveiling the computer, Apple also announced the software it intended to have for the machine when shipping began a few months later: a word processor, a spreadsheet program, an enhanced BASIC, and a "sophisticated" operating system. The marketing plan was to portray the III as a serious computer that could be used in the office. It seemed likely to succeed.

A few months later, continuing to ride the tide of acclaim, Apple announced its first public stock offering.

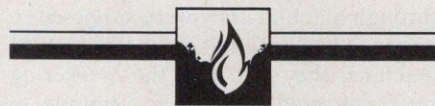

The *Wall Street Journal* wrote, "Not since Eve has an apple posed such temptation." When Apple was first formed, Mike Markkula dreamed of building the largest privately-held company in the nation, a company fully owned by its employees. But the industry was growing faster than anyone had foreseen. To keep pace, investment for research and development as well as advertising and marketing was essential. On November 7, 1980, when the company filed its registration with the Securities and Exchange Commission for an initial public offering, Apple revealed that its advertising budget for the year had doubled to \$4.5 million.

Once shipments of the Apple III commenced in the fall of 1980, it became apparent that the machines were defective. Users brought the computers

back to their dealers complaining that programs were crashing inexplicably. The dealers started complaining to Apple.

The Apple III staff began attempting to isolate the problem, carrying out the diagnostic tests they should have done before the computer was announced, or at least before it was released. As mishaps with the III became public knowledge, Apple slowed its promotion of the new computer and called a temporary halt to production. Soon the staff had identified one problem: a loose connector. While working on the Apple III, Dan Kottke had noticed that on occasion the machine would die. When he picked it up a half inch off the table and let it drop, it would turn on again. Kottke suspected a faulty connector. But he had hesitated, as a lowly technician, to broach his doubts to his superiors. And Sander, an engineer, was not involved with mechanical details like connectors. The problem had fallen through the cracks.

Another shortcoming stemmed from a bad break. Sander had counted on having a special National Semiconductor chip to use as an internal electronic clock. National finally informed him

that the chip would not be available. Apple considered other chips and finally scrapped the entire idea. But since the Apple III had been advertised as having an internal electronic clock, the price had to be lowered since a promised feature was absent.

The problems were identified by January 1981, but selling a defective computer for several months had hurt Apple's reputation. Until then the company had done no wrong, and a certain overconfidence led Jobs, Markkula, and Scott to release the computer without proper testing.

Black Wednesday

On February 7, 1981, Woz crashed his four-seater single-engine airplane at the Scotts Valley Airport, just a short drive from Apple. He had been practicing touch-and-go landings with two friends and his fiancée. Woz and his sweetheart were injured, but he was lucky not to have smashed into a skating rink just 200 feet away where hundreds of children were playing.

Woz suffered cuts on his face but was considered in good condition otherwise. No one realized, not even Woz, that he had hit his head badly enough to bring on a serious case of amnesia. Soon he found he could remember everything up to the day before the accident, but could form no new long-term memories. At the time Woz's family and friends didn't understand the problem. They just thought he seemed a bit slow.

"I didn't know I had had a crash," said Woz. "I didn't know I had been in the hospital. I didn't know I had played

games on my computer in the hospital. I thought I was just resting on a weekend and after the weekend I would go back to work at Apple."

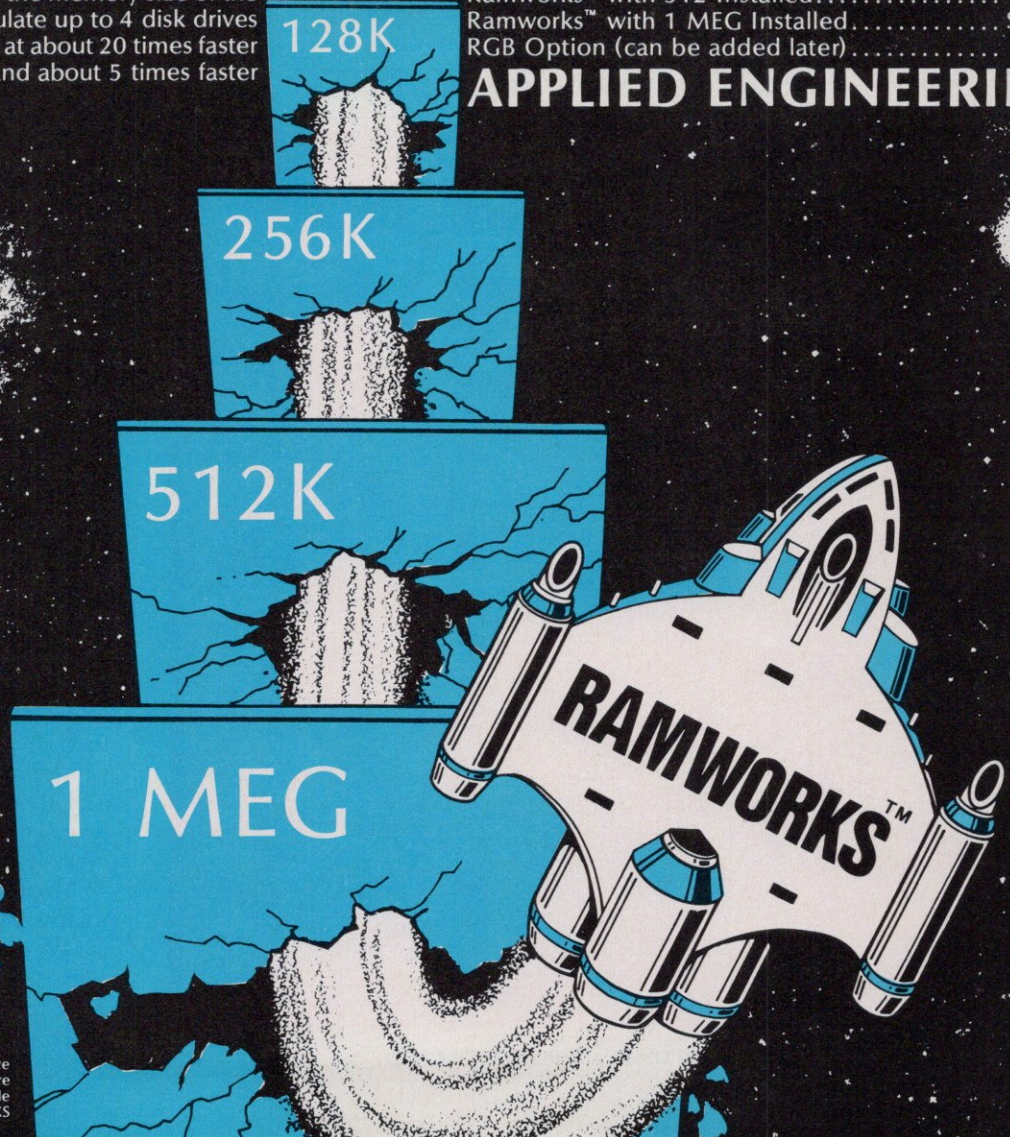

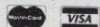

Woz didn't want to return to Apple right away. He had already gradually phased himself out of major decision-making there. He wasn't interested in it. He didn't understand business. He was an engineer and he had continued to work on the engineering projects assigned to him. "I'm not a manager type. I just love instruction sets," he said.

One of his last projects before the crash involved creating math routines for a new software program that Randy Wigginton was developing. The program itself was Mike Scott's idea. Frustrated with the long project delays at Apple, Scott had ignored the company bureaucracy and assigned Wigginton to develop a spreadsheet program similar to VisiCalc.

Wigginton worked faster than Woz had anticipated and was ready for the routines almost before Woz had begun. Mike Scott, angered by Woz's inconsistent work habits and by delays in shipping of the Apple III, began pressuring him. Woz worked night and day, suffering Scotty's daily complaints about his slow progress.

Woz still isn't sure, but he believes he may have had the final spreadsheet routines with him when he crashed the plane. But subsequent events at Apple wiped out more than this program.

Just three weeks after Woz's accident, Mike Scott decided that Apple

needed a good healthy shakeup. The ship he was trying to steer had sunk a bit in his estimation. It was time to jettison the dead weight. And so on a day referred to as Black Wednesday he fired 40 Apple employees. In addition, he terminated several hardware projects that he believed were taking too long. The move stunned the company at every level.

Mike Scott had never hidden his volatile personality. He had had a number of arguments with both Woz and Jobs. "I've never yelled with anybody more in my life," Jobs recalled. Sometimes Jobs would leave the president's office in tears after a long altercation.

Scott was known for his flamboyance. He was a familiar figure walking about the company, visiting line employees regularly to keep in touch with what was happening. Scott also knew how to promote the company's morale, as evidenced by his suggestion that the company pay for a trip to Hawaii for the entire staff.

But the Apple III exhausted Scotty's limited patience. Since the actual need for the firings was unclear, the young company was shocked. At first remaining employees wondered who would be next. Simultaneously, they mounted an

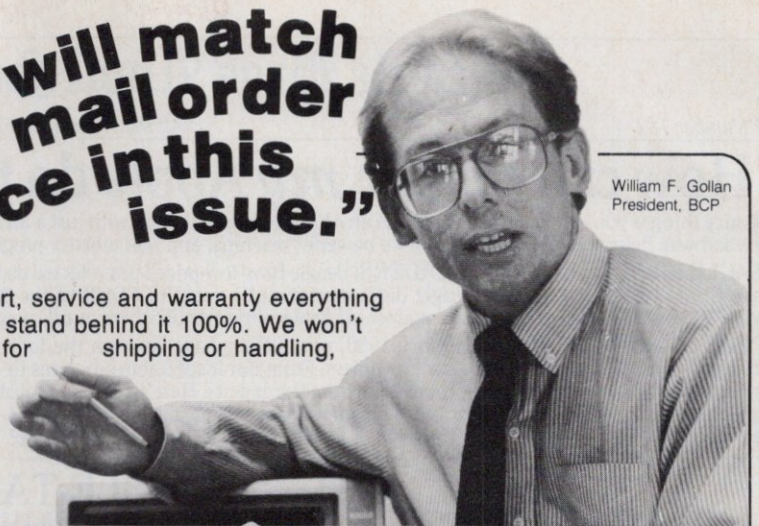
effort to hire back some of the people Scotty had fired. Even those who agreed that a shakeup was necessary felt that Scott had fired some good employees unfairly.

Chris Espinosa visited Jobs in his office the day after the firings and told him, "This is a helluva way to run a company." Jobs defended the mass ejection, but Espinosa nonetheless found him demoralized too. In fact, Scotty had acted too arbitrarily for the taste of either Jobs or Markkula. A month later, they demoted him to a lesser rank. He was no longer at the helm. By July Scott decided this state of affairs was intolerable. In his bitter letter of resignation, dated July 17, he announced that he was fed up with "hypocrisy, yes-men, foolhardy plans, a 'cover your ass' attitude and empire builders." Perhaps his most significant allegation, one which epitomized his approach to management, was that "A company's quality of life is not and cannot be set by a committee." The next day he flew to Germany to attend the Bayreuth opera festival, something he had wanted to do all his life.

Despite the problems with the Apple III, Woz's amnesia, Black Wednesday and its aftermath, and Scotty's resignation, Apple prospered. As always, Woz's labor of love, the Apple II, carried the company. Net sales of Apple IIs had more than doubled during fiscal 1980 and continued to boom through the first half of 1981. By April 1981, Apple employed more than 1500 people. The company had opened domestic

manufacturing facilities in San Jose, Los Angeles, and Dallas, in addition to Cupertino. To meet the growing demand in Europe, a facility was opened in Cork, Ireland. Worldwide sales of Apple products were increasing at a pace of 186 percent above the previous year to more than \$300 million. The number of Apple dealers had risen to 3000.

Mike Markkula took over as president of Apple, a position he believed to be a temporary one, and at age 26 Steve

Jobs became chairman of the board. Apple was investing millions of dollars in research and development to create a product that would stun the world. They wanted to prove that they had learned the lessons of the Apple III, that Apple could indeed introduce a new product successfully.

By the fall of 1981, rumors abounded in the trade journals about new products Apple was developing. Leaks about Apple's secret projects angered Jobs.

Nevertheless the continued publicity helped to promote the Apple mystique. The company commenced its first national television advertising campaign with talk show host Dick Cavett as its advocate. Jobs was becoming a Silicon Valley celebrity, and thanks in part to its advertising, the name "Apple" had become virtually synonymous with "personal computer."

The Big Leagues

In the fall of 1981 Steve Wozniak returned to school to finish his undergraduate work at UC Berkeley. He enrolled under an assumed name to avoid any special attention from students or faculty. Woz had gotten remarried in the June following his plane crash, and he wanted to take at least a year off from Apple. Although he worked late into the night finishing up his scholastic assignments, he also found time for a new project: a rock music festival called US.

Apple was taking the final steps to correct the damage from the Apple III snafu. Late in the fall Apple officially

reintroduced the Apple III. This time the machine included increased memory storage in the form of a hard disk and improved software.

But two other projects were consuming most of Steve Jobs's time. In the spring of 1979 Jobs had paid a visit to Xerox's Palo Alto Research Center (PARC), a laboratory funded by Xerox with millions of dollars to carry out high-tech experiments. PARC scientists frequently foresaw advances in computer technology years before anyone else. Jobs wanted to see what the Xerox researchers were working on now.

He was welcome. "The year before," Jobs said, "I went down to Xerox Development Corporation, which made all of Xerox's venture investments, and I said, 'Look. I will let you invest a million dollars in Apple if you will sort of open the kimono at Xerox PARC.'"

During his tour of PARC, Jobs saw a demonstration of a new computer language, Smalltalk, which emphasized graphics and a new mouse-controlled user interface. The graphics resolution was good enough to allow all sorts of tricks that Jobs knew were impossible on the Apple II or III. The mouse could be used to select options by pointing at things on the screen. It was an input device conceptually distinct from anything then in use on personal computers. The language could lead to a new kind of computer system, one much easier to use.

"I was blown away," Jobs said.

Jobs was so impressed that he decided that Apple should do a similar system. He met resistance. Many people within Apple were not enthusiastic about the idea. "They thought that whatever their own religion was was the way to go," Jobs recalled. So he began to convert people.

Jobs made a second trip to PARC, this time with Bill Atkinson. Bill had been instrumental in getting the Pascal language for the Apple and had substituted for Woz on the Lisa project. Bill was as excited as Jobs about the PARC innovation. Over a few months, Lisa had changed from Woz's multi-chip design to one based on a new, powerful microprocessor from Motorola, the 68000, and this goal in turn changed into Apple's version of the PARC system. Atkinson would create a revolutionary graphics package for it. Not everyone was happy about these transformations, but Jobs had his way.

Jobs even hired one of the principal scientists away from Xerox PARC and

assigned him to Lisa. Larry Tessler's task was to design the most advanced personal computer system available and to make Apple the technological leader in an increasingly competitive industry. Former HP engineer John Couch, hired in 1978, was in charge of Lisa. Meanwhile Jobs took control of another independent research project at Apple code-named Macintosh. The Macintosh team was also to use advanced software technology, but was to put it in an economical personal computer.

In 1981 Apple tripled its investments, spending \$21 million on new product research and development. Jobs toured the world's leading automated factories and then commissioned one for Apple in Fremont, California, to build the Macintosh. "We have designed the machine to build the machine," Jobs said. "The Apple II was designed in a garage to be built in a garage. Macintosh has been designed from Day One to be highly automated."

Jobs and others at Apple wanted to continue the company's rapid growth and to establish it as the technology leader for several reasons. One was the likelihood of a late-1981 entry into the personal computer market by a company called International Business Machines Corporation.

Apple was not surprised by rumors that IBM planned a personal computer.

The company had considered the possibility for several years. Jobs described it as a gate coming slowly down, and Apple had been running at top speed for four years to get through before it shut. In fact Apple made this concern public knowledge in its prospectus for its initial stock offering in December 1980. Apple also expected competition soon from Hewlett-Packard and various Japanese firms. But the greatest challenge by far was IBM, the chrome colossus whose name meant "real" computers to most people, a multinational corporation richer than many individual countries were. Whatever IBM had to offer, Apple would be meeting it with its Lisa and Macintosh.

There was no looking back. +

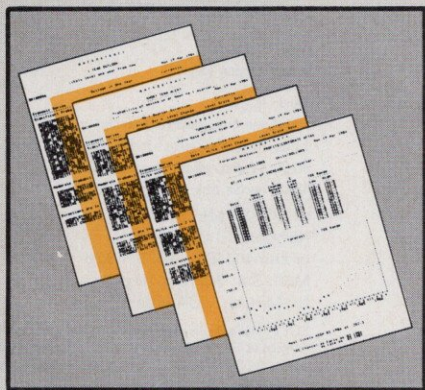

SEEING double

PART II: SIX SOFTWARE PACKAGES THAT GIVE YOU DOUBLE-HI-RES GRAPHICS ON YOUR APPLE

A full palette of colors, including red and yellow—it's yours, thanks to double-high-resolution graphics, if you have an Apple IIc or a IIe with a Rev. B motherboard and an Extended 80-Column Card with a double-hi-res jumper installed.

Part I of this two-part article (December 1984) explained the technical aspects of double hi-res and gave you information about the hardware you need to take advantage of this new capability. In this part, we'll look at the software packages that generate double-hi-res graphics.

Apple computers' graphic modes, colors, shape-table commands, and extraordinary variety of graphics hardware and software have made them the most popular personal computers for graphics. Still, if you wanted to render the American flag in high-resolution graphics, you had to settle for Old Glory in orange, white, and electric blue. In fact, you couldn't even create the famous Apple logo on your Apple.

But now double hi-res is here, and your Apple's hi-res page can have a horizontal resolution of 560 pixels and a vertical resolution of 192 pixels in monochrome. With a horizontal resolution of 140 pixels and a vertical resolu-

tion of 192 pixels, you get 16 colors (actually only 15 different colors are visible—two appear to be the same gray but have different properties), instead of the 6 in standard hi-res. The hi-res colors include red, blue, and yellow, and you can "mix" them to create a full range of colors.

Software that gives you access to double-hi-res graphics falls into two categories. Nonprogrammers can choose from application programs that allow you to draw and paint on your Apple, using the double-hi-res enhancements. Programmers will be interested in programmers' utilities that give you access to double hi-res from within your own Applesoft programs.

PROGRAMMERS' UTILITIES

Cat Graphics by Penguin Software and HGR6 by ALF use two different approaches to adding double-hi-res commands to Applesoft BASIC. To use either of them, you must be able to program in Applesoft.

Cat Graphics

Cat Graphics from Penguin Software uses the ampersand feature of Applesoft (see box on page 68 and "Rescue Squad," page 193) to add new graphics commands to your Apple. When you install Cat Graphics, you get an enhanced Applesoft language with 55 new, useful commands, including commands to generate points, lines, circles, and boxes. Other commands let you manipulate colors on the screen, slide an image around on the screen, copy a portion of the screen to another screen, and so on. With Cat Graphics you have access to the 16 double-hi-res colors, in addition to Penguin Software's 256 "blended color patterns."

Standard Apple hi-res gives you room for four lines of text below the screen image, but Cat Graphics lets you

use as much text as can fit, anywhere you like on the screen, in one of three sizes: large, 20-column text; normal, 40-column text; and small, 80-column text. Be careful! When you reach the bottom line of the screen, the entire screen—graphics and all—slowly scrolls upward and away forever. If you have worked with the DOS Toolkit Character Generator or Higher Text, you're familiar with the effect.

Cat Graphics does not respond to standard Apple Escape-key editing. To edit a line, you must return to the text page by issuing the commands &UNHOOK:&MODE,9, edit your program, and then return to the graphics screen with &REHOOK:&MODE,0.

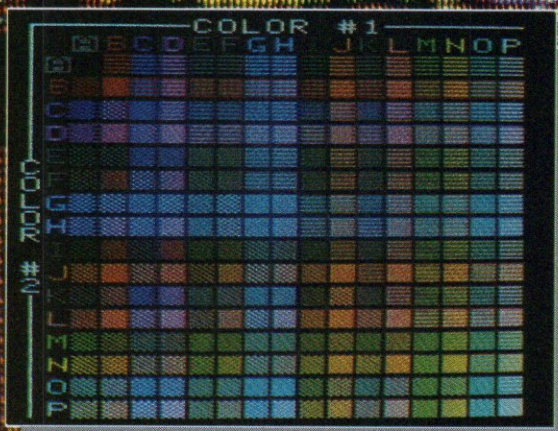
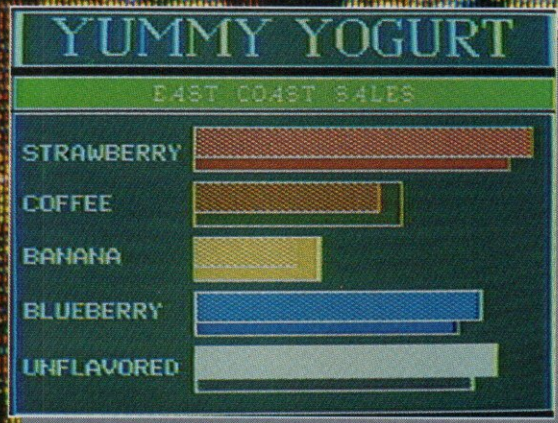
A double-hi-res picture occupies twice as much memory as a regular hi-res picture does. Cat Graphics has a command that compresses images so they take up less room on your disks, though. Loading compressed pictures places information that creates the full image in an unused area of memory. The program uses this information to form the full-size image on the graphics page.

In addition to the ampersand routines, Cat Graphics provides a shape/font editor, a sound editor, and an excellent demonstration program.

Cat Graphics is unprotected, so you can copy the routines to your work disk. The documentation is sufficient for programmers, but beginners will have difficulty learning how to use the program. If you are intimidated by the thought of having to learn new commands and syntax, you might prefer the next software package, which, although not as powerful, is easier to learn.

HGR6

HGR6, by ALF, uses standard Applesoft BASIC commands. In Apple-

soft you use the commands HGR and HGR2 to display and initialize the first or second graphics page, respectively. With HGR6, you have four additional commands: HGR3, HGR4, HGR5, and HGR6. HGR3 and HGR4 are like HGR and HGR2, except that the HPlot command can work with values ranging from 0 to 559 pixels on the x-axis rather than 0 to 279 pixels in standard hi-res. The HCOLOR command can generate 16 colors.

The HGR5 and HGR6 modes provide the same extra colors, but with the standard 279-pixel horizontal resolution. You may be wondering why anyone would want the 279-pixel resolution when there is an option to

clear and well produced.

Beginning programmers who want double hi-res can use HGR6 without additional study or struggles with complex syntax. If you are comfortable with Applesoft graphics commands, you will be comfortable with this program.

Doublestuff and Doublestuff Plus

Like HGR6, Doublestuff, from Doublestuff Software, uses standard Applesoft commands, adding double-hi-res capabilities. Once you have booted the Doublestuff master disk, you will see a new prompt, }, in place of the Applesoft bracket, [. To get Applesoft, just type FP; to return to Doublestuff BASIC (a modified version of Applesoft BASIC), type DFP. When you see the } prompt, HGR will enter the Double-Hi-Res mode. The HCOLOR command still selects the hi-res color, but now the choice is 0-15 instead of 0-7. GR gives you the double-low-res mode. You don't have to learn any commands with this program.

Doublestuff is so simple to use that the four-page manual and quick-reference card are sufficient.

Doublestuff Plus places double-hi-res utilities at your fingertips, without making you do any programming. It consists of six programs: two drawing utilities, a shape editor, a character-set editor, a shape shuffler, and Doublestuff BASIC. The program is menu-oriented and relatively easy to use. In the Super Drawing mode you can use a joystick, KoalaPad, or keyboard to draw lines, draw freehand, or draw rays (a series of lines emanating from one point) with your choice of 20 "brushes."

Drawing with a joystick is always cumbersome, but in this program I found that the KoalaPad was not much better. The cursor jumped around the screen, plotting at random points, which was probably due to the software, not the KoalaPad. I was disappointed to find that the program did not accept input from the Apple mouse, until I got in touch with Louis Bonfiglio, author of the program, who informed me that the mouse worked in the Super Drawing mode.

To access the mode, I was supposed to boot the disk, select the Super Draw mode, and then press the Delete key. I tried this method a few times without success. In a final attempt, I pressed all the keys on the keyboard at random, when I was suddenly rewarded with the cursor and excellent mouse control. I have been able to repeat this trick a few times, but I have not yet deciphered

which key or which order of key presses does the trick.

When you press C to select a color, a list of the colors, with number assignments, appears at the bottom of the screen. The list does not include samples of the colors or the color mixtures. You also select brushes by number. The program lacks a fill option. To add text or shapes to your image, you must return to the main menu and select the Draw mode, which allows you to use joystick, paddles, or a KoalaPad for input. Be sure to save your picture before returning to the main menu, for the screen clears when you select the Draw mode.

Originally, Doublestuff and Double-

double it, but this mode can be useful in certain applications. The HGR6 plotting coordinates are the same as those in standard hi-res, so you can easily modify any programs you have already keyed in to run in the HGR6 modes. All you have to change is the HGR statements.

Since HGR6 numbers colors from 0 to 23 (the first eight, colors 0 to 7, are identical to normal hi-res colors and the last 16, 8 to 23, are the new double-hi-res colors), you won't run into a color conflict in the modified program. In addition, you can easily access the new colors by changing the numbers in your HCOLOR statements. Applesoft shape commands work normally with HGR6.

HGR6 provides double-low-resolution graphics with 80×48 pixels, rather than 40×48 pixels. Like the hi-res commands, all the normal low-res commands are modified in HGR6 to accept the larger plotting values.

HGR6 includes picture compression/expansion routines to alleviate the disk-space problem that double hi-res creates and also provides a slide-show utility.

ALF ships DOS 3.3 and ProDOS versions of the program; neither is copy-protected. The documentation is

stuff Plus were compatible only with the Apple IIe, but the programs have been partially upgraded to work with the Apple IIc. I say partially because the double-low-resolution commands still do not work on the Apple IIc, and the documentation refers only to the Apple IIe.

Beagle Graphics with Double Plot

Beagle Graphics, like Cat Graphics, uses the ampersand feature, and with it you get 25 new commands to create boxes, circles, fills, and numerous other useful graphics effects. In addition, eight new low-resolution commands let you program with double-low-res graphics.

Beagle Bros. software has a new look—its plastic-bag packaging has been replaced by boxes—but all the extras that Beagle Bros. is known for are still included. The package includes a decal of the Beagle Bros. logo, a Beagle Bros. Peeks and Pokes chart (expanded to include double-hi-res information and a double-hi-res color chart on the reverse side), and two easy-reference color cards of commands, as well as a 100-page manual. The manual contains several utilities that allow you, among other things, to convert existing hi-res graphics to double-hi-res graphics, cut

and paste sections of pictures, pack and unpack (compress and decompress) pictures for disk-storage purposes, change colors in pictures, and so on. The documentation is thorough and clear.

Beagle Graphics includes a font editor and slide-show program, as well as an application program called Double Plot. Double Plot is supposed to accept almost all available input devices, including the AppleMouse II, Apple Graphics Tablet, joystick, paddles, touch tablet, and keyboard. The Graphics Tablet is normally the best choice for input, but it does not work with Double Plot. According to Beagle Bros., the firm doesn't know yet what

to position. Fortunately, the disk is unprotected, and with the help of the documentation, you can modify the program to change the cursor shapes.

Graphics Magician Picture Painter

Picture Painter, by Penguin Software, is the double-hi-res version of The Graphics Magician's Picture Object Editor. Picture Painter allows you to draw and paint in double hi-res, but, unlike the other programs in this review, this program saves in a text file the moves you make as you create an image, rather than saving the finished image.

When you want to see your picture, you watch the program redrawing it on the screen—an instant replay of your artistic efforts. You can elect to save your sequential picture as a standard double-hi-res image, but the advantage of saving the drawing moves instead is that you can save a picture in a fraction of the disk space that would otherwise be necessary. This savings is significant when you work with double hi-res, since a single image saved in the standard way requires 66–68 sectors of disk space, which limits you to seven pictures per disk. A Picture Painter file, depending upon the complexity of the image, takes up only 5–16 sectors. Another benefit of Picture Painter is that you can manipulate your drawing moves to get animation effects in your picture.

The May 1984 issue of *A+* included a review of the standard hi-res version of Graphics Magician. The double-hi-res version of this program works exactly like its predecessor, with the bonus of double horizontal resolution and the extra colors (including the Penguin "blends" that bring your color choices up to 256). You can use any of the 256 colors and patterns as fill, and you can also use them in the Brush mode. The Picture Painter works with the following input devices: joystick, mouse, paddles, KoalaPad, trackball, Apple Graphics Tablet, or Houston Instruments HiPad.

If you've been using the old Graphics Magician and are bemoaning the fact that you did not have double hi-res at the time, take heart. You can load sequential pictures that you created with the older package into the new version's editor, convert them to double hi-res with a couple of keystrokes, and then edit and recolor them with the new palette.

By single-stepping through your picture, changing just the color commands, you can convert all of your

SPCs (sequential pictures) into DPCs (double-hi-res sequential pictures). It's worth the effort.

The Picture Painter, which is not copy-protected, comes with complete documentation for creating images and using them in your own Applesoft programs.

HOW THEY STACK UP

Cat Graphics is a graphics utility that lets you do things in Applesoft programs that you could not have done before without recourse to assembly language. I recommend this program to those of you who have some programming experience in Applesoft BASIC.

HGR6 does not offer as many enhancements to BASIC as Cat Graphics

the problem is, but it's working on it.

From the main menu of Double Plot you can select boxes, circles, lines, and the Freehand Draw, Fill (which allows you to fill an area with one of 256 fill colors and patterns), Paint (with 16 brushes), Text, Mode, and Edit options. When you select Paint, you get samples of the brush choices, and when you select Fill, you see a color chart of the 16 color choices. You can also opt to see the 256 color patterns.

Unfortunately, you can use the extra 240 color patterns only in the Fill mode. The program would be significantly enhanced if you could use the paintbrush with these wonderful color mixtures. Edit allows you to cut and paste portions of your image, invert a selected area, flip an area horizontally or vertically, move an area, save an area into memory, and paste it onto another picture. Mode lets you change your picture back and forth among four modes that vary in horizontal resolution.

Most of the modes have a distinctive cursor. When you are in the Draw or Line mode, your cursor is pencil-shaped. In the Edit mode, your cursor is a pair of scissors for cutting and a pointing finger for pasting. I found these cursors distracting and difficult

does, but it gives you access to double-hi-res graphics, and it is easy enough for beginning programmers to use.

Doublestuff with Doublestuff Plus allows you to take advantage of double-hi-res graphics without having to program at all, as does Beagle Graphics. So, if you just want to be able to draw and paint with double hi-res, these are the packages to consider. Both give you double hi-res, whichever way you want it—as a programming utility or an artists' tool.

Both packages would benefit from less keyboard interaction, however. Working with an input device such as a KoalaPad or mouse is slow and frustrating when you must constantly return to the keyboard to select brushes, colors, and modes.

Doublestuff Software deserves kudos for publishing the first double-hi-res software, but neither of these programs has as many capabilities as the newer packages do, nor are they as polished.

With Beagle Graphics, you can program and paint in double hi-res. Add to this dual ability the excellent utilities and charts, and you have a complete graphics package.

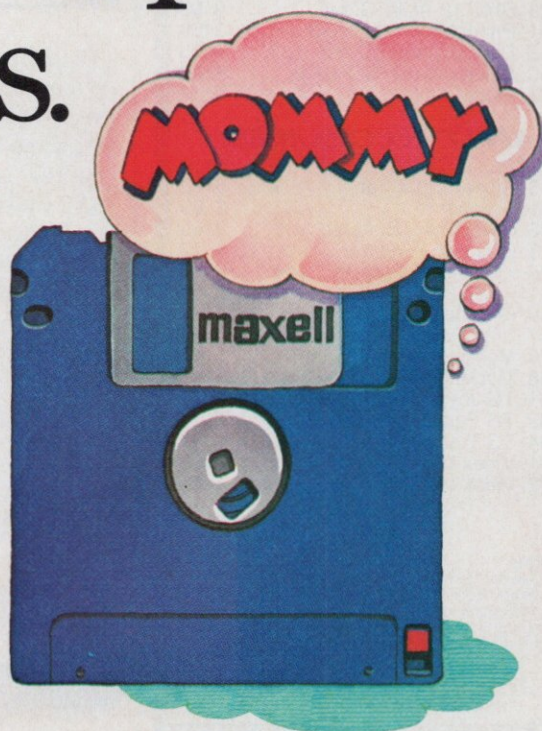

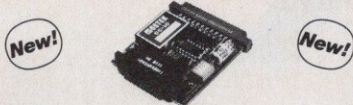


The ampersand (&) is a unique Applesoft command that causes Applesoft to jump to a user-defined machine-language subroutine whose address is stored in locations \$3F5-\$3F6 (hexadecimal).

Under normal conditions, there is a return instruction in this location, and nothing happens. When you install a program such as Cat Graphics (with the BRUN command), however, the ampersand takes on a different meaning, depending on the arguments you send it. For example, &RES,0 places you in the Double Hi-Res mode, and &CIRCLE,50,50,50 draws a circle at x,y coordinates 50,50 with a radius of 50. (See the Applesoft manual for more information.)

PUBLIC-DOMAIN SOFTWARE IS FREE FOR THE ASKING.

Let's face it, computing is expensive. Like most personal-computer owners, I got a loan to pay for my first system, an Apple IIe with a printer and one word-processing package. Planning my budget, I figured that after my new loan payment every month, I'd have just enough money left over to buy the electricity I needed to keep my Apple going. That didn't leave a lot of money for exploring the world of software. I kept the current flowing but soon found my computer needed more than power to perform all its miracles. It needed software, and lots of it.

That's when I discovered a constantly growing, easily accessible source of free programs—public-domain software. This software, which you can find at Apple users' groups, in libraries, and on electronic bulletin boards throughout the country, is free to anyone willing to spend the time and energy to seek it out.

Public-domain software can be a valuable resource for any Apple user. Just ask Bill Budge. When the creator of Raster Blaster and the Pinball Construction Set bought his first Apple II in 1978, he started using public-domain software. "I made \$4000 that year and spent \$2000 on my computer. I borrowed money from my dad," says Budge. "The only problem was, there was no software. Everything was public domain."

Budge started by using public-domain games and utilities and put them to good use. He put the Pinball Construction Set together with Ted/asm, a free assembler; and Apple users are circulating disks of games they've created with the Set in the public domain, a development that encourages the programmer.

The Right of Public Domain

Public-domain software has been

around for a long time. It's accessible, but you probably won't find it in your local computer store; it's plentiful, but no one knows exactly how many free Apple programs exist. What is public-domain software? How do you find it, and what can you expect it to do for you? What about the quality? If someone writes a program and gives it away, can it really be any good?

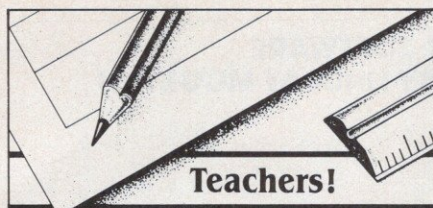

"I think you get far more than you pay for with public-domain software. You pay on the order of 10¢ or 20¢ apiece for public-domain software, and it is probably the best value in the computer industry today," says Dick Hubert, president of CALL A.P.P.L.E., a 20,000-member Apple users' group based in Seattle. The group maintains a library of more than 300 disks of public-domain software for its members. "It is also one of the reasons that Apple computers are a very good buy, even though the Apple's price is high, compared to a lot of other things. There is a lot of public-domain software available."

When a piece of software is not copyrighted, it belongs to everyone, and no one exclusively. It is in the public domain. Copyrighted software can also be part of the public domain. Some programmers write software, copyright it, and then grant the public permission to copy and use it at no charge. They copyright the software to keep others from reselling it for profit. When you use public-domain software, you can copy it, change it, or incorporate part or all of it into one of your programs. You can even copyright any additions or revisions you make, but not the original public-domain program itself.

Occasionally, a manufacturer releases some software into the public domain if it is no longer profitable, but for the most part, public-domain software is written by computer users for other computer users. There are terrible and excellent programs in the public domain—and everything in between.

One thing all public-domain software has in common is that it's free. It's great for computer lovers with youngsters who regularly demand a fresh supply of games, programmers out to refine their techniques or find utilities,

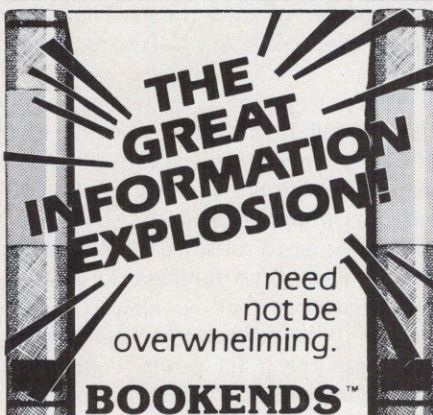

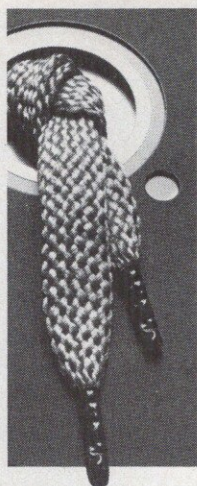

or people who want to explore all of the Apple's abilities without spending a lot of money.

Although the software itself is free, expect to spend a little money acquiring it. A users' group may require you to join before letting you loose in its library or charge you a fee for public-domain disks. The diskettes that contain the free software can cost from \$3 to \$10 apiece. If you gather public-domain gems from electronic bulletin-board services (BBS) with a modem, expect to spend significantly more on telephone charges. Bulletin boards with Apple software are springing up all over the country. If you live in San Francisco and feel compelled to download all the programs on a BBS in New York City, a cozy evening at the terminal could cost plenty. One Apple user spent so much money downloading programs from various systems that he finally swore off it and sold his modem.

You can keep the cost of acquiring public-domain software under control, though. The modest fees you may pay a users' group or library for this "free" software will keep those organizations alive and able to bring you more public-domain programs.

The best place to start your search for public-domain software is with users' groups. Apple users' groups exist all over the world, and most maintain libraries of public-domain software. Group sizes vary—the Washington, D.C., Apple Pie boasts 4000 members, while the Huge Apple Club of Simsbury, Connecticut, has 200—so you can join a large or small crowd of enthusiasts to share software and information about Apples.

To find out about users' groups in your area, talk to your local dealer or check out the phone book for pertinent information.

What if you don't have time to belong to a users' group but still want the support and public-domain software they offer? Don't despair. You're not alone. According to recent market research from the International Apple Core (IAC), an association of Apple users headquartered in Santa Clara, California, only 20% of all Apple purchasers join a users' organization. Users' groups are undergoing changes to try to reach the other 80%.

Until recently, the IAC functioned as a support organization for over 400 users' groups in the United States and 33 other nations. In that capacity, it reached about 60,000 users. To reach even more people, IAC began offering membership to individuals, too.

Now individuals can receive the same support IAC gives its users' groups, including access to a large library of public-domain software. Individual IAC memberships cost \$30 annually. An additional \$30 provides a member a six-month subscription to IAC's Disk of the Month (DOM). This service provides members with a new disk of IAC public-domain software each month. The DOM is available only to members.

"We've been changing," says Ken Silverman, IAC executive director. "Originally, our public-domain software or Disk of the Month was for one purpose. We'd get it to the member clubs so they'd have the chance to look at the program, tear it apart, play with it, and list it on the screen. Everybody was a hacker or a hobbyist," Silverman explains, adding that club members made improvements to public-domain software. "We don't have anybody doing that anymore, but now we've got better public-domain software, and we can say, 'Here is something you can actually use.'"

Members and nonmembers can take advantage of the large stock of public-domain software that IAC sells. Disks cost \$8 for members and \$10 for nonmembers.

Offerings for Apple II computers include Attach-BIOS, a software package donated to the public domain by Apple Computer for Pascal application writers. The package includes a step-by-step Applesoft tutorial; and a machine-language tutorial, including an editor.

One education disk has a program called Voice Print designed for the hearing-impaired. With a microphone connected to the Apple's cassette port, a user can generate graphic voice prints

on the screen, and the hearing-impaired person can practice enunciation by trying to reproduce the visual image.

IAC will soon begin marketing an Interrupt Pak that will allow users to change the ROM and put true interrupts in the Apple. The software, which used to be available commercially, was donated to the public domain by Southwestern Data Systems of Santee, California.

Available for the Apple III is a DOS-SOS converter, an RS-232 slot-selective driver that, in combination with an Apple II Super Serial Card, gives the III another serial port. Another popular public-domain program is File Cabinet III, a small database-management system that sorts, produces reports, and makes labels.

Recently, IAC introduced 3-PAKS, software packages with three disks of thematically grouped public-domain software. IAC currently offers Education, Logo, and Financial 3-PAKS at a price of \$20 for members and \$25 for nonmembers.

At these prices, public-domain software probably looks like a great deal. It is, but you pay a price, even beyond the expenses we've already looked at. When you buy public-domain software, you rarely get documentation or a guarantee that the software works correctly.

"We don't support public-domain software technically or in any other way. We do guarantee that the disk works, and we do guarantee that the software on it will run," says Silverman, "but we don't guarantee that any of the software will do what you think it does."

Although using public-domain software involves an element of risk, more and more people are trying it and enjoying what they find.

"We've also had stores that buy the Disk of the Month and put it in their library; when customers come in, they say, 'If you buy this Apple today, you can have access to a copy of anything in that library for free.' We think that's great."

Software Libraries and Exchanges

If you're the kind of person who likes to go to the library and leaf through the newest releases, keep your eyes open. You may be able to browse through mystery novels and public-domain software during your next visit.

Libraries throughout the U.S. are collecting public-domain programs and offering them to their patrons. In many areas you can copy programs at a library, take them out to use on your own

computer, or order them by mail.

"There is a great demand for public-access software," says Patrick Dewey, librarian in charge of the Chicago Public Library's collection of Apple software. The software is available at no cost to anyone who wants to copy it at the library. "People will come in and typically copy all 50 diskettes. It doesn't seem to make much difference what it is; they'll just copy it all."

The North Central Regional Library, a rural library in central Washington State serving 150,000 people in five counties, maintains a library of 2500 Apple public-domain programs. The library district, which serves much of the state's rural population, offers the software through a mail-order service center in Wenatchee.

North Central was one of the first rural libraries in the U.S. to replace bookmobiles with direct-mail library service. "We became the Sears Roebuck of libraries," says Dean Marney, director of mail services. "It was immediately successful and allowed us to serve rural pockets."

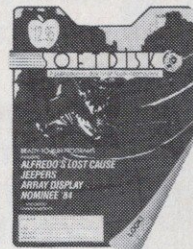
The library began offering public-domain software by mail at the suggestion of a computer consultant who installed an Apple at the center. The collection is now one of the library's most popular attractions.

The North Central Regional Library is considering setting up an electronic database of public-domain software. Creating a public-domain-software library, says Marney, has been an education for library employees and patrons alike.

"When we started the software service, I had to send a note out to the branches telling them what we were doing, and one of the branch librarians called up and asked, 'Is this anything like Tupperware?' She was very upset.

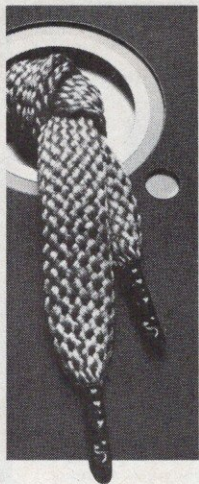

She didn't know what software was," he says.

Software exchanges like Softswap in San Mateo, California, are another valuable resource for public-domain-software enthusiasts. These organizations exist only to distribute software. No meetings, dues, or membership are required.

Softswap, a part of the San Mateo County Office of Education, is a software exchange for educators. The group distributes instructional software for a variety of microcomputers, including 150 programs for the Apple.

Although bound by law to serve the county's educators and public first, this educational foundation does welcome others into its office to copy disks of software, by appointment. Visitors can come to the center and copy programs onto their own disks, can order disks by mail, or can contribute an original program and receive any diskette from the center's catalog, in trade.

California educators need not travel to San Mateo to copy Softswap's disks. The collection has been distributed to 15 other County Offices of Education throughout the state.

Selling the Software

Some people have taken it upon themselves to assemble libraries of public-domain software and make them available to the public. The Apple Avocation Alliance of Cheyenne, Wyoming, manages one such library.

AAA isn't a group of hackers, madly writing games. It's one person, Ron Maleika. Maleika bought an Apple II Plus in 1980, began using public-domain software, and decided it would be fun to trade with other users. He asked a friend with a CB radio to spread the word.

Maleika received so much software that he decided to organize a library for

users. He edited programs, arranged them by subject, and began offering disks at cost to those with nothing to trade. Today, the AAA features a library of 217 public-domain disks full of programs for Apple users.

"A lot of this stuff is quite good; a lot of it is mediocre, but all of it is valuable for people who want to learn to use their Apple," says Maleika.

The most popular software AAA offers is the Eamon Adventure series, a text adventure said to rival Dungeons and Dragons. AAA disks are available for \$3 apiece (\$2.47 apiece if you order ten or more disks). A library catalog is available for \$2. Maleika trades for new programs and gives a free disk to any user who takes a disk and improves its programs.

In December 1982, Maleika opened a store, 3A Computer Products, to sell products for a variety of computers, including the Apple. The people depending on Maleika for software advice began to want his help buying monitors, other peripherals, and commercial software.

Freeloader Library

The American Software Publishing Company offers Apple users the Freeloader 500 Library, a collection of over 3800 programs for the Apple. Arranged by subject, the whole library costs \$600.

Of course, you don't have to buy the entire collection. It is divided into nine subject binders: Business and Finance, Utilities, Graphics and Sound, Education, Home, Games, Adventures, Pascal, and CP/M. Individual binders are available for \$75 apiece. A free catalog detailing all the library's programs and the club is available.

The Freeloader collection features all kinds of software, from a label maker for the Epson printer and a Morse code practice program, to sacred software. Although the quality of the public-domain software varies, says Sheryl Nutting, president of the company, it's an essential resource for people who want to learn more about using and programming their Apples.

Bulletin Boards

If you're willing to invest in a modem and some long-distance phone calls, you can download public-domain software from many computer bulletin boards across the country. Unlike services such as The Source or CompuServe, bulletin boards charge you nothing.

Bulletin boards are usually run by individuals or groups with a specific in-

terest, such as dating, computer music, science fiction, programming in a specific language, or using a special operating system. Many of them offer public-domain programs. One of the best ways to find out about electronic bulletin boards is to call the People's Message System in Santee, California, at (619) 561-7277. This bulletin board maintains a list of over 600 bulletin boards currently in operation. Boards tend to come and go, so the list is updated regularly.

Some bulletin boards do last, though. The Computer Systems of Marin BBS, (415) 383-0473, in Marin County, California, offers Apple users a variety of public-domain CP/M programs.

The bulletin board, which has been in operation for four years, is available from 5 P.M. to 8:30 A.M. Pacific Time on weekdays and 24 hours a day on weekends. It is based in a retail store, Computer Systems of Marin. Jim Ayers, the store's owner and system operator, is an Apple owner and head of a CP/M users' group that meets in the store twice a month.

The group maintains a library of CP/M public-domain software that includes 170 disks specially reformatted for Apples; some of the software is available on the bulletin board. You can purchase diskettes with the programs directly from the group.

CP/M is a sophisticated operating system, says Ayers, and the public-domain software developed under it is of very good quality.

"I got an Apple and one of the early Microsoft Z80 cards, because I was used to CP/M and wanted to convert some of the programs that were available over to the Apple. I seldom use DOS on the Apple," he says.

The bulletin board averages 18 calls a

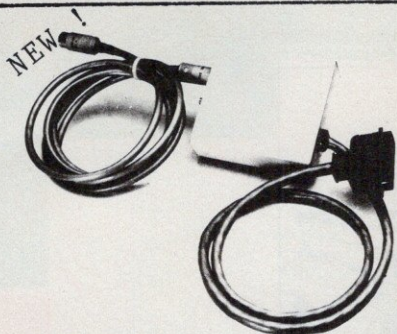

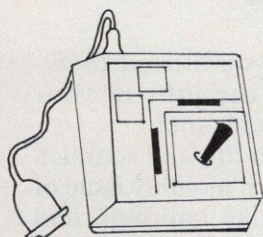

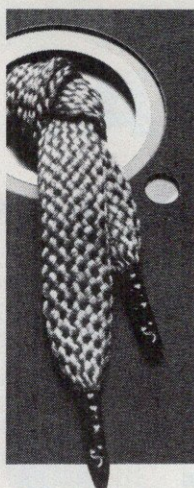

day from such far-flung places as Texas, Florida, and New York. The users' group maintains a library that includes some popular programs such as ZCPR.COM, a Z80 overlay for the CP/M operating system, and DU.COM, a popular and flexible disk utility.

Ayers encourages callers to contribute programs but says 90% of all activity on the system is downloading (copying programs from the bulletin board). "These bulletin-board systems are not only for downloading; they're also for uploading" (sending programs to the bulletin board).

Another bulletin board of interest to Apple users is the International Apple Core's People's Message System, (312) 295-6926, located in the Chicago area. The bulletin board allows callers to leave and retrieve messages, download and upload programs, and more.

No End in Sight

Once you start, chances are you'll never stop exploring the world of public-domain software. Using it is a great way to learn about all your Apple's capabilities without spending a lot of money.

The production of public-domain software doesn't seem to be slowing down, either. As long as programmers who love to work on Apple computers share their work with others, there will always be more public-domain software for you to explore.

"There's a fellow here in San Francisco, Dan Dugan, who released a database program to me on his 39th birthday. It was his present to the computing community," says Ayers. "That's the way most of this stuff was developed."

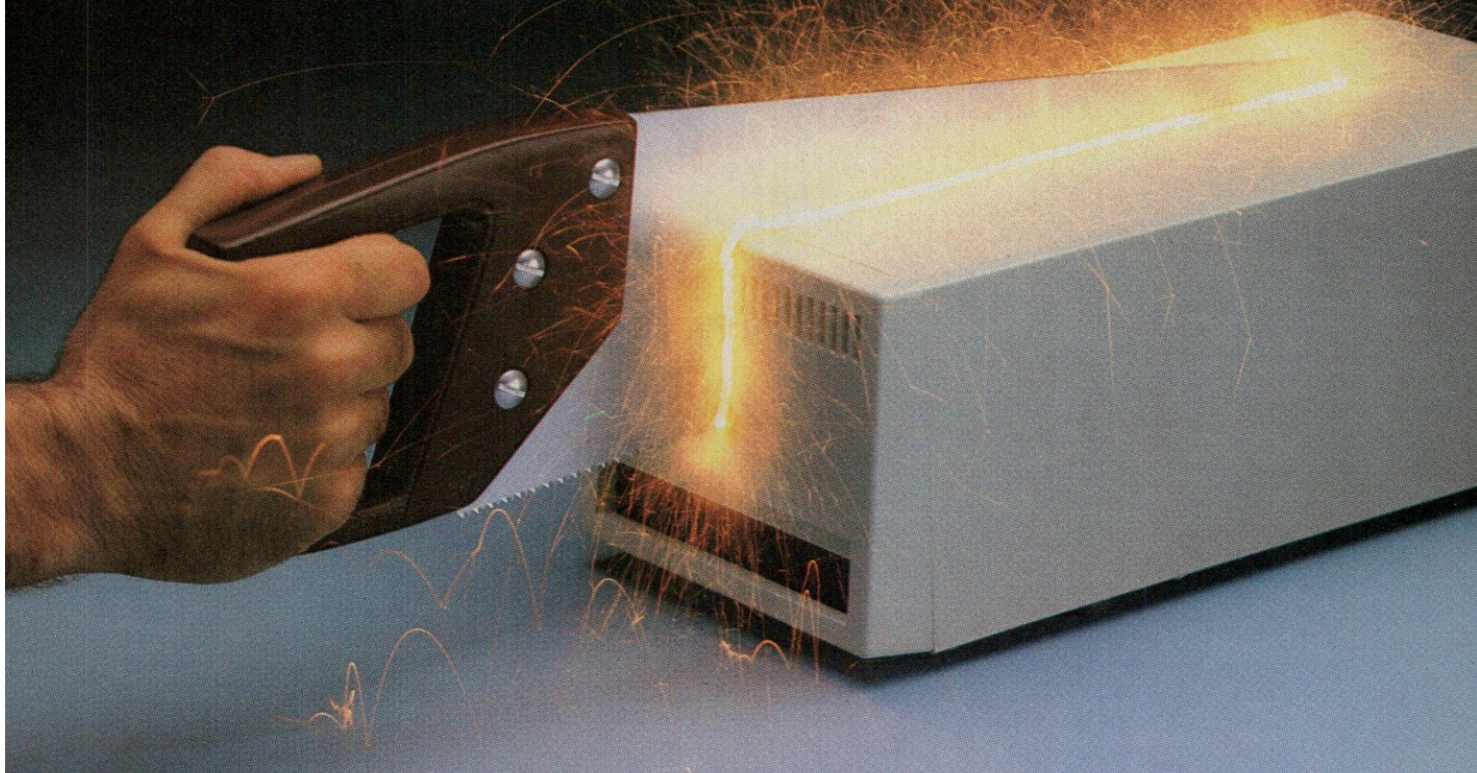

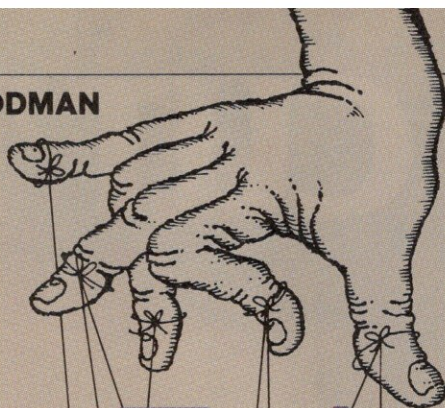

Trying out integrated software

I am holding auditions for a very demanding role on the Apple IIc stage. The winner must offer the versatility of three or more productivity applications without making me switch program disks to get to each of them; allow me to swap information among the applications at will and with the least fuss; make easy the operation of the entire system by employing a consistent command structure among all the applications; and demonstrate that each module of the program can stand alone as a legitimate productivity tool, since not all of my work requires moving information around. In other words, the program that gets the part will have to turn in the most convincing performance as an integrated software package. I'm providing all the props—an Apple IIc; a second disk drive; and a mouse, if needed.

Three aspiring programs are here for the tryout. One, the Magic Office System by Artsci, offers its interpretation of a word-processing/spelling-checker/spreadsheet/graphics combination. The other two—Apple Computer Inc.'s AppleWorks and Arktronics' Jane—demonstrate their abilities to combine word processing, financial modeling (spreadsheet), and database (file) management into a single environment. Let's see how they perform.

Magic File Drawers

Magic Office's conceptual environment is a file-drawer metaphor. When

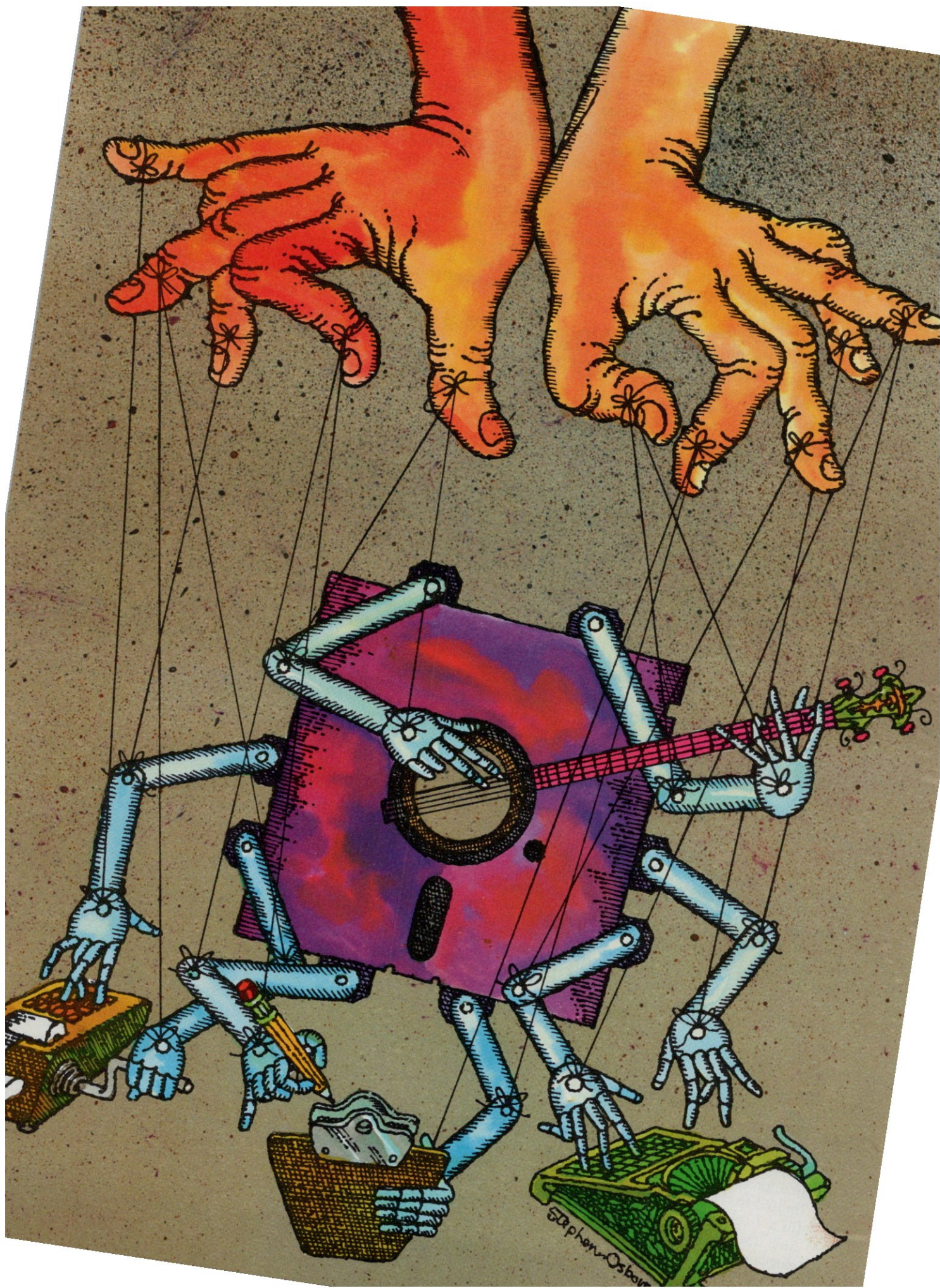
you load the program, the screen displays a file drawer bearing the name of the program disk. Storage disks, each with a unique name you specify when you "create" a new storage disk, are displayed as other file drawers. The program refers to these drawer pictures on screen as *volumes*—the proper terminology for the filing structure on the disk, but ruinous to the metaphor. The display can accommodate one program disk and up to three storage volumes, but each displayed volume must have its own disk drive—possible only with Apple models other than the IIc.

To open a volume ("pulling out" a drawer on the screen) and the documents therein (documents look like file folders in the opened drawer), you use the arrow keys to place a highlighted marker over the desired name and press Enter. To start work on a new document, you must "tear off" a sheet from the word-processing, spreadsheet, or graphics "pads" on the storage disk by highlighting the pad name and pressing Enter. These pads and the spelling-checker dictionary must be manually copied from the program disk to the storage disk each time you create a new storage disk.

The word-processing module, called

OfficeWrite, is Magic Office's weakest unit, and it includes a few bugs that prove frustrating. Although the information line at the top of the screen provides page, line, column, and free-space indications, it is easy to accidentally scroll the cursor above page 1, line 1, and throw off the page count. Second, if you fill up the document memory space—about ten pages—you reach a *Catch-22* mode in which an error condition won't let you scroll through the document or delete sections of it to make it more manageable. Your work becomes trapped on the disk.

Among the desirable word-processing features OfficeWrite lacks are multiple margin settings and other formats within a document (such as the ability to indent single-spaced quotations), automatic paragraph indentation, automatic reformatting if you insert or delete words (in fact, if you manually reformat more than one paragraph at a time, all end-of-paragraph and blank-line carriage returns are erased—linking the paragraphs together in one monster paragraph), block moves, and many others. Perhaps as a short (i.e., less than one page) memo processor, this module would be sufficient. But to call it word processing stretches it a bit.

The spelling checker, however, operates quickly and efficiently. For checking standard, everyday words, the 14,000-word dictionary zips through a document, stopping when it doesn't find a match and allowing you to make an immediate correction or mark it for later correction.

Unfortunately, the marker that the program places at the word is an inverse @, which you cannot search for within OfficeWrite. Therefore, you must carefully scroll through a marked document looking for instances where that marker occurs. As the spelling checker encounters words it doesn't recognize, you can add them to your own dictionary. This user dictionary remains only on the current storage volume, however. When you fill that disk up and create a new volume, you'll have to stop and add the same old words to the new disk's dictionary when they're encountered in new documents.


Further annoyances include the fact that OfficeWrite doesn't use the Delete key as a backspace key. Instead, you must use the left-arrow key to retrace your steps. Finally, there is no on-screen help of any kind for the Control and open-apple-key commands. Artsci supplies a four-color reference card that I find confusing and incomplete, and the manual, which contains a good tutorial, lacks an index for finding answers to questions that come up later.

Magic Office's spreadsheet module, OfficeCalc, is clearly this program's strong point. It is a full-featured spreadsheet with powers similar to those of VisiCalc. The spreadsheet extends to 63 columns by 254 rows, an adequate size for Apple II use. The function library lists 28 @ functions, including Net Present Value, Pi, Round, and several conditional logic functions. Using slash commands (e.g., /A), familiar to spreadsheet users, you have access to most basic formatting and editing commands. You can set individual column widths, divide the screen into two windows, freeze titles in place, and replicate ranges of cells. About the only basic function missing is the ability automatically to center a label in a cell.

OfficeGraph, the graphics module, presents itself on screen initially as a smaller version of OfficeCalc. You are limited to the amount of data that can fill a 7-column by 23-row grid (but, as we'll see in a minute, this orientation can cause problems when you start integrating OfficeGraph and OfficeCalc). From the data in the minispreadsheet,

OfficeGraph produces either a bar graph or pie chart, whichever you select. Once you've seen the graphic on the screen, you can print it out on a graphics printer. Graphics print inside a 3 $\frac{3}{8}$ × 2 $\frac{5}{8}$ -inch box, which the ImageWriter places about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches off center on the page. Also, some extraneous characters consistently appear at the lower right corner of all graphics.

Integration of three major modules is not very elegant, because of the many menu steps involved. To transfer a piece

of a spreadsheet to a word-processing document or the graphics worksheet, you must first copy the desired section to a clipboard and return it to the main Magic Office file-drawer display (after saving the original file). Then you open the second document and paste the figures from the clipboard. You cannot, however, swap data between two different storage disks, which is, to me, a significant flaw.

The problem I mentioned earlier about going from OfficeCalc to OfficeGraph involves the traditional way most users set up monthly columns of figures, with the months extending along the top row of labels. Since OfficeGraph allows only 7 labels across the top, you can't copy monthly data like this from an OfficeCalc spreadsheet and immediately paste it into the OfficeGraph spreadsheet without restructuring the way you do your regular spreadsheets.

The more I work with Magic Office the less I feel that its modules are truly integrated. About the only keyboard commands they have in common are those involving cursor movement. Even the quick-reference cards for OfficeWrite and OfficeCalc (OfficeGraph has none) are separate formats and look as if they were originally designed for distinct programs and later merged into an environment with similar menus and cursor commands.

Thank you for coming, Magic Office System. Don't call us, we'll call you.

Mousing Around with Jane

The Xerox Star, the Lisa, and the Macintosh have spawned a genre of mouse-driven software that makes ex-

tensive use of screen icons to simplify the communication between user and computer. Jane employs such a scheme for the Apple II. In fact, a mouse is essential when you run Jane on the IIc; other Apple II computers require an AppleMouse II, KoalaPad, or joystick controller.

When you load the program, a row of icons appears across the top of the screen. These same icons appear for every step of the program, thus meeting an important criterion of consistent user interface. Additional icons, specific to a particular application, appear along the bottom of the screen while that program module is running. To select an icon, you use the mouse to move the on-screen pointer to the icon, and then you press the mouse button. You don't need quick-reference cards or memorization of commands, since everything is on the screen.

Every document in Jane appears in a screen window. As with Macintosh windows, you can adjust the size and location of a window on the screen. Moreover, you can have more than one window from more than one application on the screen at one time, although only one of the windows is active at any moment. But if you want to look at some spreadsheet figures while writing an analysis of them, you can have both the figures and your memo on the screen at once.

Unfortunately, the individual modules in Jane are not up to professional productivity quality. The Janewrite word-processing module, for example, is too slow to respond to the keystrokes of a moderately proficient typist. Characters are frequently lost when typing speed exceeds display speed. The version of Jane present at this audition does not support 80-column text, but a menu window opened from the terminal-configuration icon lets me change the character size to small in order to display 60 characters across the screen. Reformatting text after changing margins on the screen ruler or selecting a different justification must be done manually, and only one paragraph at a time, or else multiple paragraphs are unceremoniously condensed into one glob of sentences. Also, Janewrite limits your selection of text blocks for cutting and copying to only as much text as appears in a window at a given moment. This makes for cumbersome editing when you need to substantially rearrange a document.

Janecalc is likewise crippled, compared to other simple spreadsheet pro-

grams. The Janecalc spreadsheet is only 20 rows by 24 columns—not something you're likely to use for a budget review for your boss. Scrolling around the small sheet with the mouse and easy-to-use scrolling arrows at the window edges is a s-l-o-w process. Screen writing time is snail-like. Entering labels takes an ergonomically inefficient movement of the mouse pointer to the desired cell before you type the label. Wherever you place the pointer is precisely where the first label character will appear.

Without an on-screen grid or cell cursor to help you locate the desired cell location, it's easy to get labels in the wrong cell. Editing cell entries is inconsistent with Janewrite editing, which admirably uses the Delete key as a backspace key.


Math functions for Janecalc are very few, but because you choose them with the mouse, they are probably the easiest to select and import of any spreadsheet I've seen. At the bottom of the Janecalc window is a list of the five preprogrammed functions—Sum, Average, Count, Minimum, and Maximum. You can also build cell formulas (formulas that depend on values in other cells) by pointing to arithmetic symbols on the bottom icon row and to the cells comprising the formula.

Janelist is the program's database-management module. As its name implies, it is best suited for keeping simple lists. Each record is the equivalent of an index card of information. Janelist offers two predefined list formats—a business and a personal mailing list—and a user-defined list, which cannot exceed 10 items of 25 characters each. Creating a customized list is easy, since you just fill in blanks for each of the item names you want and use the mouse to increase or decrease an adjacent number corresponding to the number of characters each item holds.

Once you set up your list form and type in information for several cards, you can search for a single card, search for all cards meeting several search criteria, and sort them according to any item you want. You can also customize a report and mailing-label printout format by pointing to item names in special prompt windows and dragging them to a miniaturized replica of the printed output. The mouse environment greatly simplifies the procedure.

It's too bad that Jane's modules are so constricted. The program's consistent icon and mouse interface and its ability to display documents from dif-

ferent modules simultaneously makes it easy to use and swap data, after going over the quick tutorial in the four-color manual. I'd be hard-pressed to put this program to work in a business environment, however. Depth and versatility seem to have been sacrificed for the sake of ease of use. In a home, where spreadsheet calculations aren't very complex and where word processing is

used for little more than simple letters and an occasional book report, Jane may be acceptable. If you're used to more powerful, dedicated programs on the Apple or other computers, however, you'll feel that Jane is only a clever toy.

Thank you, Jane. Leave your number at the door.

The Works of AppleWorks

The last software package to audition is AppleWorks, a descendant of a program originally designed for the Apple III. It requires 128K RAM and, like the other two programs, works best with two disk drives. AppleWorks comes as a two-sided "flippy" diskette. One side contains a start-up routine, and the other side contains the various program modules for regular operation. You must copy the two sides onto blank disks before you can use the program (thus preserving your original disks).

AppleWorks' user environment is an on-screen file-folder metaphor, each folder containing either a menu or a list of files to choose from. Moreover, an invisible desktop contains as many documents as you can open at one time. Actually, this desktop is the available memory in the system—55 kilobytes. As you fill up the desktop with documents, the available memory decreases. This desktop arrangement allows you to have several documents on tap at any moment, only a couple of keystrokes away from the one you're in, regardless of which application they rely on—word processing, spreadsheet, or database management.

The AppleWorks word-processing module competes well against free-standing word-processing programs. A wide assortment of text-formatting and appearance features are available from

a submenu, making possible elaborately formatted reports. Although it takes several keystrokes to achieve a particular function (for instance, pressing open-apple-O, BB, and Return to start boldface print), these sequences soon become second nature (just ask WordStar aficionados how easily this happens), and you ignore all the prompting that helps the beginner. Text is automatically, and instantly, reformatted when you make changes to the text or formatting instructions. Page breaks are clearly marked, but a document requires manual repagination when you enter or edit text.

Over on the spreadsheet module, the available commands and built-in math functions are similar to the VisiCalc level of program. A blank sheet is a rather larger 127 columns by 999 rows—plenty of room for even heavy-business spreadsheets, which link together several related spreadsheets on one large worksheet. Unlike other spreadsheets in this category, this one does not respond to slash commands. Rather, it adheres to the open-apple command structure of the other AppleWorks program modules, using a significant number of similar mnemonic commands, which make it relatively easy to master in a short time.

As with the other modules, a catalog of commands is available on help screens, which you can access by pressing open apple-?. One function I miss, however, is the ability to change the width of individual columns. The program makes up for it somewhat by automatically subdividing the text of long labels into multiple cells. But this still takes planning on your part, because you may later add a longer label that encroaches on an established column to the right.

The database section of AppleWorks is remarkably simple to use and is as flexible as Software Publishing's PFS filing programs. You can create a blank form into which you enter information, record after record. You can then select items from the forms to create customized on-screen and printed reports of your data. You also have the full range of sorting and searching capabilities you would expect from a database program.

Shifting information from one document to another involves using the clipboard metaphor (copy or cut text from one document to the clipboard, bring the second document to the screen, and paste the text into it). Having several documents in memory at once speeds

the procedure, since each document is only a couple of keystrokes distant from another.

AppleWorks is the only one of the three integrated programs present at this audition that seems to pay attention to the real world of computing—a world in which you want to see how much space is left on your storage disk before you embark on a project, and one in which you may want to take spreadsheet data and use it with a graphics program from another supplier. AppleWorks lets you load and store information in the Data Interchange Format (DIF), which many other programs recognize. Thus, you could convert a VisiCalc spreadsheet (stored as a DIF file) to an AppleWorks spreadsheet. Or you could graph data from an AppleWorks spreadsheet on VisiPlot or other graphics program that accepts DIF files.

Word-processing texts can be stored as straight ASCII files for transmission by a modem. It is also the only program to come with a separate tutorial manual. The reference manual is superb, offering graphic representations of the data-transfer capabilities of the program.

In an era of integrated software,

when it is commonplace to see one module shine above others, it is refreshing to see a program such as AppleWorks whose individual modules function well on their own yet share a common command structure and a simple way of shifting information around, even to different storage disks.

AppleWorks, the part is yours. Be here at 8 A.M. tomorrow for rehearsal. +

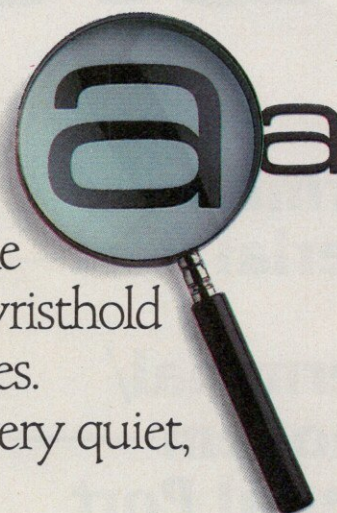

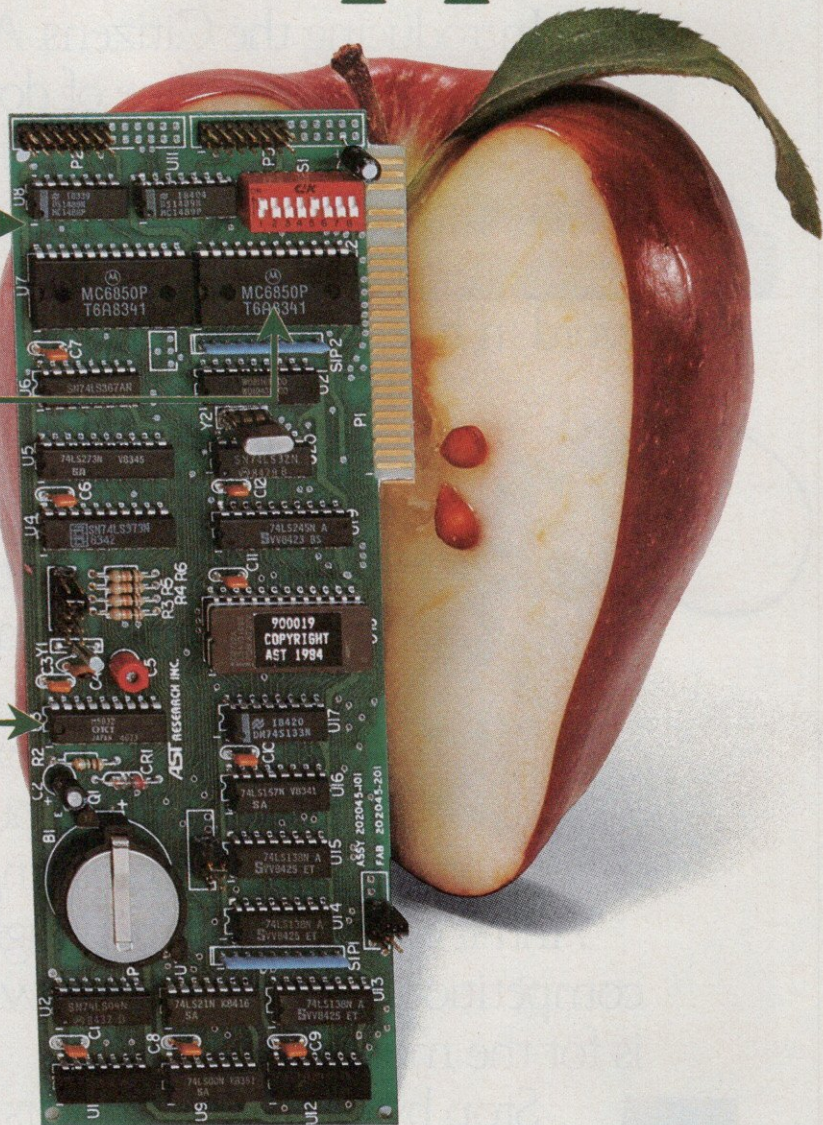

DOING THE TAX DANCE

Happy New Year! At 12:01 A.M., January 1, 1985, only 20 days remain till the Super Bowl; 98 days till the opening of baseball season; and 105 days till April 15, 1985, the opening of the 1985 (tax year 1984) tax season! Football and baseball are spectator sports—you watch. Taxes are participative—you file, they audit.

Every year you go through the same drill—step 1, get the records in order; step 2, prepare the return. A perfect cadence. One that you must keep, or else...

Once you have completed step 1, it's time to gather all the proper forms and schedules. Then begins the calculating and recalculating of your income, expenses, allocations, and so on. Finally, when you are all through with the mechanics of getting your return prepared, you begin to wonder if you forgot something, and then you go through it all again.

If you don't look forward to confining yourself in a room for a weekend—possibly even a week—then you probably agree that there must be a better way.

Your Money, or Less of It

You can hire an accountant to do everything, or you can use the power housed in that beige box with an apple

on it. Retaining an accountant has its pluses and minuses. On the plus side, it's easier than doing the taxes yourself, and the fees are tax-deductible next year. On the minus side, accountants charge fees for their services.

Too many people hire accountants to act as bookkeepers rather than as tax advisers. If all your accountant is doing is preparing your return, you're not getting your money's worth. An accountant should offer counsel on the tax implications of your particular financial situation. Your accountant should be giving you tax advice, not just tax services.

Your other option is to use your Apple and a good piece of tax-preparation software. The software is also deductible, it works when you want it to work, and you don't have to wait for it to return telephone calls.

Whose Computer?

Chances are your accountant uses a computer to prepare your return, so why shouldn't you? Many software packages are designed to help individuals, partnerships, and even corporations prepare their taxes. Several packages on the market do a good job

of helping individuals prepare their tax returns on Apple II-series computers. The best known of these packages is Tax Preparer from HowardSoft. One that I like best is Tax Manager, which is the package I'll use here as an example.

Tax Manager does more than most other tax packages. It helps you pick the forms you need to do your taxes, prepares them, and then helps you check to make sure you didn't miss a deduction or take one you shouldn't have.

The Right Forms

When you begin to prepare your return, the first of many perplexing questions arises—What forms and schedules do I use?

Tax Manager has a program that, based on your answers to a series of questions, tells you the forms and schedules you need. The whole operation takes just three minutes. One small problem, though—you have to write down the list Tax Manager gives you, because, at this point, the program can't print it out.

You are now ready to prepare your return, but you must first tell the tax-preparation section of Tax Manager which schedules and forms you need. Tax Manager then puts them in any order you choose.

Number Plugging

Whether or not you use Tax Manager, you will spend most of your preparation time from this point on doing the arithmetic needed to complete your return. For example, if your family has three sources of income—your full-time job, your part-time job, and your spouse's full-time job—you have to sum all three together and enter the resulting total on your return.

Tax Manager does the arithmetic for you. You key in a description of the source of income and the amount from the W-2 form, and Tax Manager does the rest. It can store up to 200 descriptions and dollar amounts, add them together, and then plug them into Form 1040.

To make sure you've entered everything correctly, you can scan the entries on the screen, but again you can't print them out.

Each time you make an entry into Tax Manager, it automatically calculates up to line 40 of Form 1040—total tax—and displays it in the bottom right-hand corner of the screen. If you want to try some what-if assumptions, this process enables you to do so.

For certain forms and schedules—

tax credits, alternative minimum tax, and Social Security self-employment tax—Tax Manager needs to do recalculations, which take a few minutes.

To complete your return, you continue entering the numbers the program requests. When you reach the end, your total tax liability, your refund, or the amount you owe the government will be displayed on the screen.

Your Wife's or Mother's Birthday

Nobody is perfect. We all forget things. As far as I know, however, the course of history is affected only if you

forget one of the following: your wife's birthday (if you're married), your mother's birthday, or a tax deduction that you're entitled to. You're on your own when it comes to birthdays. On your taxes, though, Tax Manager can lend a hand through the Tax Checklist.

The Tax Checklist lists the deductible items you can claim on your taxes, in the following categories: taxable income items, business or professional deductions, farm deductions, deductions toward adjusted gross income, investment tax-credit properties, energy tax credits, and itemized deductions. The checklist also tells you many of the items you cannot deduct.

You can ask questions in two different ways. Tax Manager can search its library based on a keyword that you supply, or it can print out everything it knows in a particular category. In either case, it tells you what you can deduct and stops you from deducting things you can't.

When you're finished, Tax Manager saves your tax return to disk (you can also tell it to save information intermittently along the way to protect yourself from mistakes, power failures, and so on) and prints out facsimiles of all the forms and schedules you need.

Then it's just a matter of copying your information onto IRS forms and schedules, signing them, and mailing them in.

Never Leave for Tomorrow...

If you can't seem to find the time or

motivation to prepare your returns before April 15, 1985, the Internal Revenue Service will let you extend your filing period until August 15.

If you still can't get motivated, you can apply for another extension, which runs to October 15. Be advised, though, if you have an individual retirement account (IRA) you must deposit the money before April 15, no matter how long you extend.

Even though Tax Manager doesn't have to return telephone calls, it is a little slow. You can remedy this problem if you have a compiler, but Micro Lab really should correct it.

Now that your records are in order and you have prepared your taxes, relax. From April 15, 1985, there are 260 days left until 1986, when the whole process starts over again.

Next month we'll examine ways to save some money on your taxes. +

GRAPHICS BY ROBERTA SCHWARTZ AND MICHAEL CALLERY

The New Year ushers in a new bimonthly column on the latest in graphics.

GRAPHICALLY SPEAKING

It's hard to imagine an Apple computer without graphics. From that first homebrew Apple I to the Macintosh, Apple computers have allowed users to display information with pictures as well as with words. Whether your needs are for simple black-and-white charts and graphs, full-color illustrations, or dynamic animations, you'll be able to find an Apple that offers those capabilities.

What We're About

A large gap lies between a computer's ability to produce graphics and the actual creation of graphics by users. The popularity of Apple computers has led to an immense cornucopia of graphics software and hardware products that narrow the gap. Unfortunately, this cornucopia can also lead to confusion because of the huge number of products. One of the things we will be focusing on in this column is graphics software and hardware.

As graphic artists, we are constantly in touch with manufacturers and publishers. We'll keep you up to date by reporting on products in the developmental stage, but we'll wait until we've used each item before offering our evaluation. As teachers of graphics on the Apple computer, we know where new users stumble. We'll answer the questions our students—and readers—most often ask.

As programmers, we develop techniques and often create custom routines for special effects or to make our programs more efficient in terms of length

and/or execution speed. We'll share some of these techniques and programs with you. Let's get started with a new paint program.

Blazing Paddles

Paint programs let you create high-resolution screens. A good paint program should let you paint freely instead of bogging you down with menus or command keystrokes. It should offer a variety of options, such as freehand

drawing, lines, boxes, ovals, color and pattern fills, block moves ("stamping"), text capabilities, and a magnification mode.

Blazing Paddles offers all of these options, and you select from an icon menu that is similar to, but better organized than, Koala Technologies' Micro-Illustrator menu. (See *A+*, April 1984, pages 82-96, for a review of Micro-Illustrator and several other paint programs.)

Most paint programs offer at least

one unique feature. Whatever makes a program unique usually determines whether or not you will select that particular program rather than another. Blazing Paddles has several special features. One of them, a clever color-mixing formula, provides a selection of "textured hues" that are quite different from what other programs offer and are attractive and useful. Another feature loads a standard Apple shape table and stamps the shapes anywhere on the screen. The best of the special features is the Zoom mode.

In the Zoom mode, the hi-res screen is magnified, and you have complete control of every pixel on the screen. Blazing Paddles' Zoom mode has a window that overlays part of your picture, so you can see the effects of your pixel manipulation on the normal-size picture, as you work.

MacPaint (and MousePaint) require you to select a hand symbol to push an image around to reveal portions of it that are not visible in the window, and other paint programs make you return to the normal-size image to choose another zoom window. In Blazing Paddles, when you move the cursor out of the window, the window scrolls around the screen. Baudville's zooming method is simple and elegant.

Blazing Paddles can work with a variety of input devices, including joysticks, touch tablets, graphics tablets, and the like, and with the AppleMouse II, it is what MousePaint should have

been. Recognizing that the Apple II cannot totally emulate the Macintosh, Baudville has provided functionality without slavish imitation.


Blazing Paddles is a joy to use. We recommend it highly.

Up and Coming

We're currently playing with Computer Colorwork's Flying Colors and Digital Paintbrush System. We'll report on these products soon.

Solutions

One of the great mysteries our stu-

dents encounter is the incompatibility between pictures created by different Apple paint programs. One program frequently can't load an image created by another. Isn't an Apple screen image an Apple screen image? Yes, but the problem is in the way the image is saved to the disk.

The most common reason for picture incompatibility is the filename. Most graphics software appends a prefix or suffix to the filename you type in. You'll see this appendage only if you catalog your disk under DOS. Baudville software products require picture files that begin with the prefix PI, whereas Penguin Software products require picture files with the suffix .PIC. Koala appends PICTR., and yet other software requires PIC. in front of the filename.

The best way to deal with this filename incompatibility is to become familiar with DOS's Rename command. Use Rename to change the filename of a picture made with one package to fit the filename requirements of the other package you want to use.

Another reason for incompatibility is picture compression. To save disk space, some programs compact or "pack" the screen image. A typical Apple graphic image requires 8K bytes of memory. Fourteen of these 8K pictures can fit on one Apple disk. Picture packers save data that represents repeated bytes of information. Instead of saving the information as black dot, black dot, black dot . . . , it saves it as five bytes of black, four of white, one of green, and

so on. Packed pictures take up varying amounts of disk space—the more detailed or complicated the image, the larger the file.

Compression is fine if you are sticking with one graphics program, but if you want to use an image with another program or want to use it in your own program, you'll probably want the full 8K image. A good paint program should give you the option of saving a packed version of your picture or the original normal 8K image. Penguin Software offers this choice. If a program saves only packed versions, it should provide a utility for converting the compressed image to its normal form. If it doesn't, don't use it.

Different software products may load or save pictures to different pages of memory. Since Apple II computers have two hi-res graphics screens or pages, you cannot assume that a screen image has been created on page 1 or page 2. You can't tell easily which page the program expects the picture to be on, except by experimentation. Try this simple program:

Change the filenames in lines 20 and 40 to include the filename suffix or prefix your commercial paint program expects; then try to load the pictures you just created with this program into that paint program.

If your program loads only PAGE1.PIC, it uses page 1; if your program loads only PAGE2.PIC, it uses page 2; and if it accepts both, you have no problem.

The final reason for picture incompatibility is file length. Some graphics programs (Koala's Micro-Illustrator, for example) accept files only of a certain length. Although a full 8K is assigned to the Apple hi-res graphics screen, not all of this memory is displayed. Under DOS 3.3, you can save a whole sector (256 bytes) of disk space by not saving some of this nonvisible memory. Thus, you can save a hi-res graphic as a 33- or 34-sector file. Your picture will look the same, but your catalog will show the difference in the

file-size column. Try this:

This program creates two picture files, BIGPIX at 34 sectors and SMALLPIX at 33 sectors, yet when you view the image, you can't tell the difference. After saving a picture made with your paint program, catalog the disk to determine if it saves images as 33- or 34-sector files.

A Sector Saved Is a Sector Earned

When using programs that create 34-sector pictures, we usually convert them to 33 sectors. To do this, boot DOS and put your picture disk into the drive. Substitute the name of your picture for NAME and run the following program. Be sure to include the 2 next to your filename in line 30.

Now that you have saved a 33-sector version of your picture to disk, delete the original 34-sector file. If you save a sector on each of the 14 pictures, you'll be able to save an extra picture on the disk.

If you own a Macintosh, you're probably familiar with the virtues and limitations of the word-processing program MacWrite. If you're considering buying a Mac mainly to do word processing, you're probably waiting for more software to appear.

Of the more than 200 Macintosh products available in November, only two of them, MacWrite and Microsoft Word, were word-processing applications. Several more are on the way, but, in the meantime, I'd like to examine the first alternative to MacWrite. Before giving you the word about Microsoft Word, I'll start with a few tips about evaluating word-processing software.

Although many people contend that you can't really understand a software application until after you're familiar with it (it's like choosing a college), you should keep some key things in mind when selecting one. The first factor you need to consider is the kind of work you do. How long are your documents? Would you like to be able to paste in graphics? Do you create form letters?

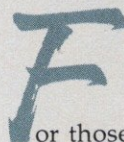
Next, you need to get some idea of what the software does. All word-processing packages perform the basic functions of entering text; inserting, deleting, and rearranging things; and formatting and printing

what you've created. Beyond that, features vary. Since Microsoft Word is loaded with features, it's a good candidate for an examination of just what word processors can do.

A final consideration is the ease of getting the program to do what you want it to do. *Easy* is a relative term, and the ease of using a program depends in part on your skills and computer experience. Using a pull-down menu and a couple of mouse clicks to create a footnote, for example, is easier than typing 14 keystrokes to accomplish the same task. A closer look at what Word does will give you not only an introduction to Word, but also some ideas about things to consider when buying any word-processing package.

Learning Word

The Word documentation includes a five-chapter tutorial that teaches you the basics in a relatively painless fashion. The instructions are concise, complete, and easy to follow.



For those of us who insist on figuring it out ourselves, Microsoft points out that the tutorial is designed for people who have never used a word processor; the rest of us

can skip it. Even if you're familiar with word processing, though, you should browse through the tutorial just to find out what's new and different about Word.

By the time you've finished the tutorial (a beginner should be able to do it in about 45 minutes), you'll have performed all the basic functions necessary to start doing your own work. Even though you may have tried some things only once, the mouse, menus, and dialog boxes really shine here. You'll probably be able to remember most of what you've done, without further review.

Learning the other things Word can do requires digging through the "Using Word" section of the manual. I found this section to be less clear than the tutorial and sometimes overloaded with weighty explanations. For example, the passage that tells you how to use the Go To command begins with a seven-line explanation of the pagination process. Fortunately, the instructions to "choose the Go To command, type the page number you want to see, and click OK" are set off from the rest of the text. Thus, you can distinguish the information you want from other material you may not need at the time.

Microsoft also provides an on-screen Help feature that includes quite a bit of information. I found it much easier to use than the manual, but disk space does limit the amount of information it contains.

To use the Help feature, you type Command-?. The pointer on your screen turns into a question mark, and you can choose the topic with which you need help from the menus. Figure 1 (page 102) shows the Help screen for setting tabs. Learning how to perform any particular operation with Word is fairly easy, because the program makes excellent use of the Macintosh user interface, mice, and menus. Since Word contains so many features, however, there is a lot to learn.

Working with Word

Word includes the kinds of features we've come to expect from a

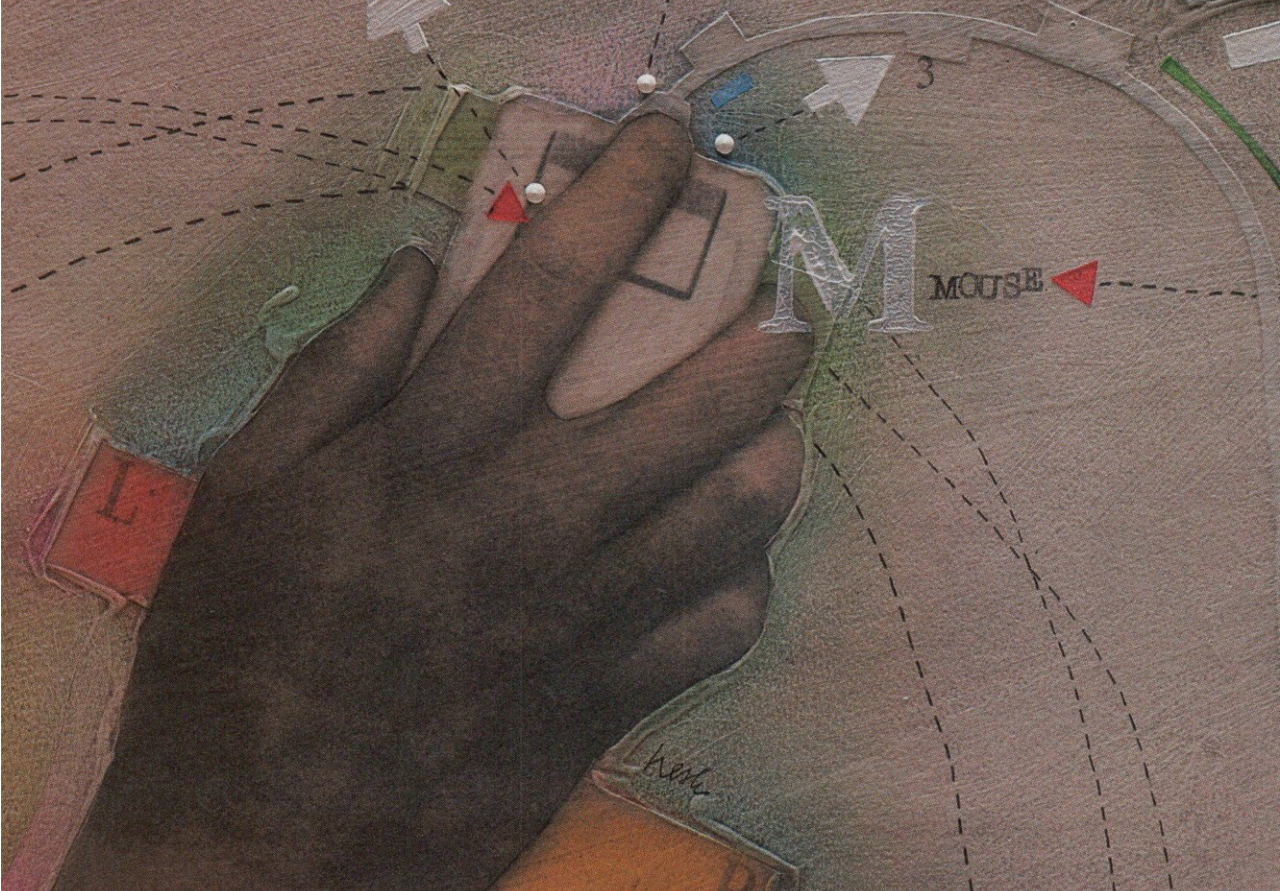

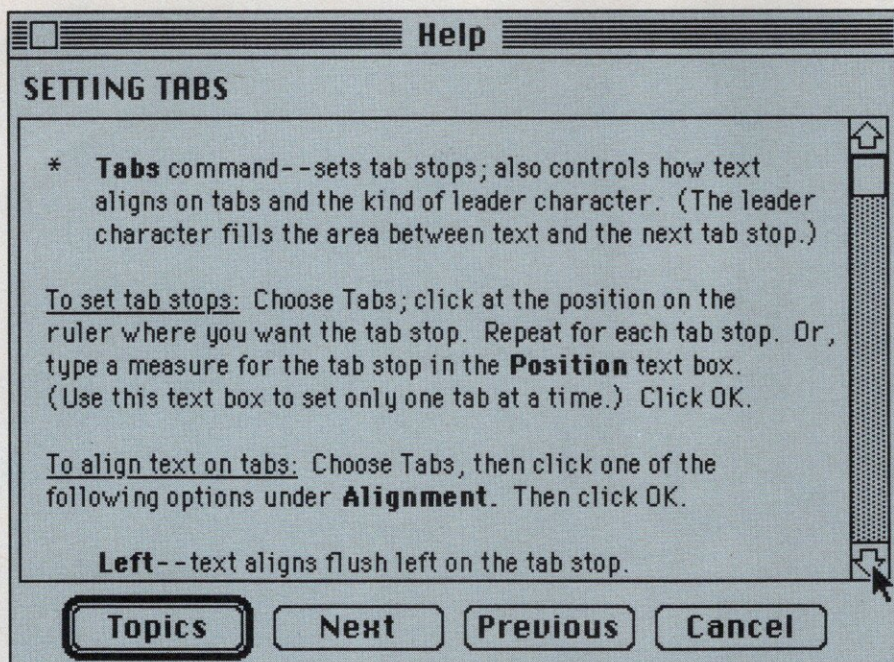


Figure 1: Word provides on-screen help for more than 20 key functions.

program for the Macintosh. Various type fonts and styles, boldface type, underlining, and subscripts and superscripts are features you can see on the screen, and their creation requires no embedded commands. What you see on your screen will be what you get from your printer. Although you

perform most of the operations with the mouse, menus, and dialog boxes, additional keystroke commands are often necessary because the program offers so many functions. At first, these extra commands appear intimidating, but I found them well worth the trouble it took to learn them.

For the most part, whatever the feature, Word does *more*. So you'll have an idea of what I mean, let's look at some common word-processing functions and how you perform them with Word. To set tabs, for example, you can choose from a couple of methods. You can select **Show Ruler** and simply click on the position where you want a typical left-aligned tab. The ruler, by the way, takes up only the space of about two lines on the screen.

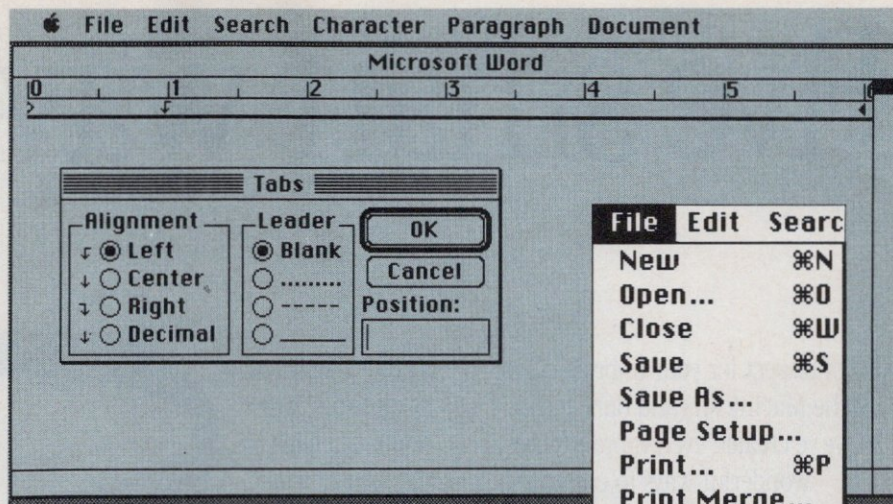


Figure 2 (above): The dialog box for setting tabs lets you click on a variety of choices. Figure 3 (inset, right): Microsoft has added optional keyboard commands to the File menu.

You can also set tabs by opening a dialog box (figure 2), choosing how you want the material aligned in relation to the tab, and then choosing the type of "leader" you want. This option fills the space between the text and the tab position with periods, hyphens, underscores, or blank space. You can also set a tab at a specified position (say 3½ inches) on the ruler, by typing that number in the **Position** box. Click **OK**, and you're done.

The choice of simply clicking to set tabs, or opening and using the dialog box, is typical of the way Word has been designed. Clicking on the ruler is a simple and intuitive action. Using the dialog box, although it may seem complex at first, provides you with

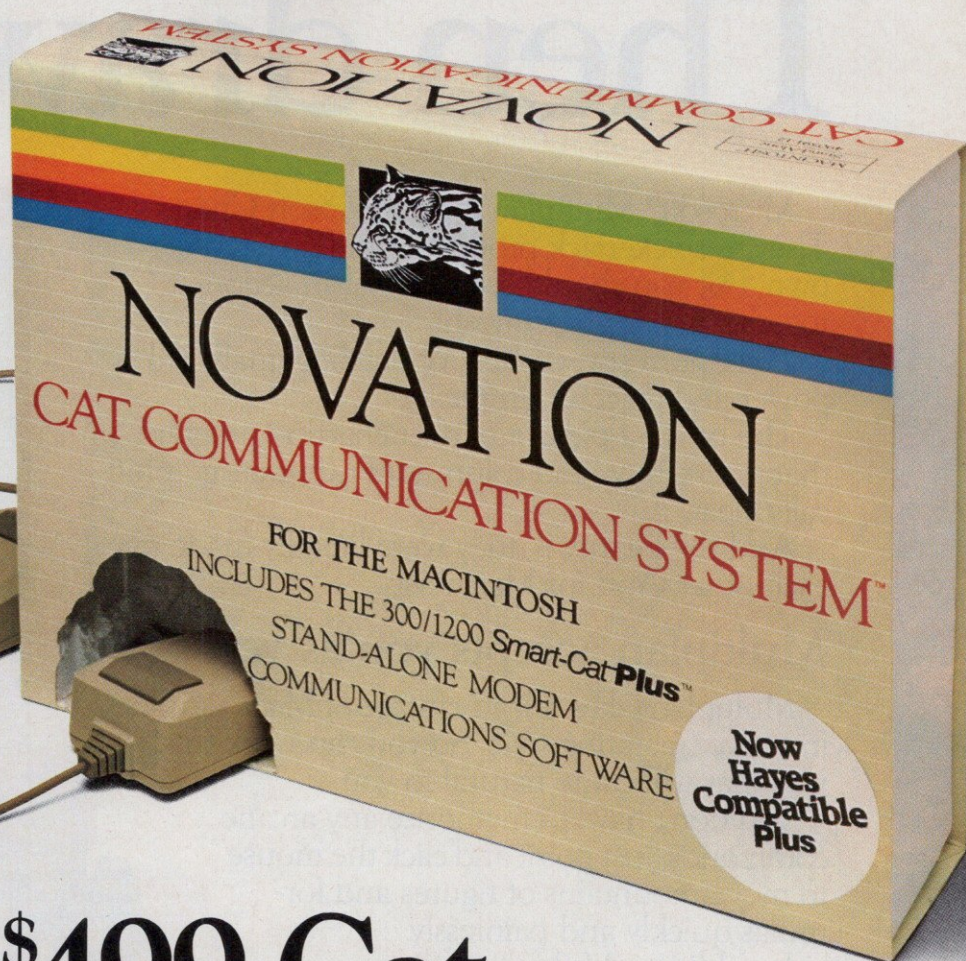

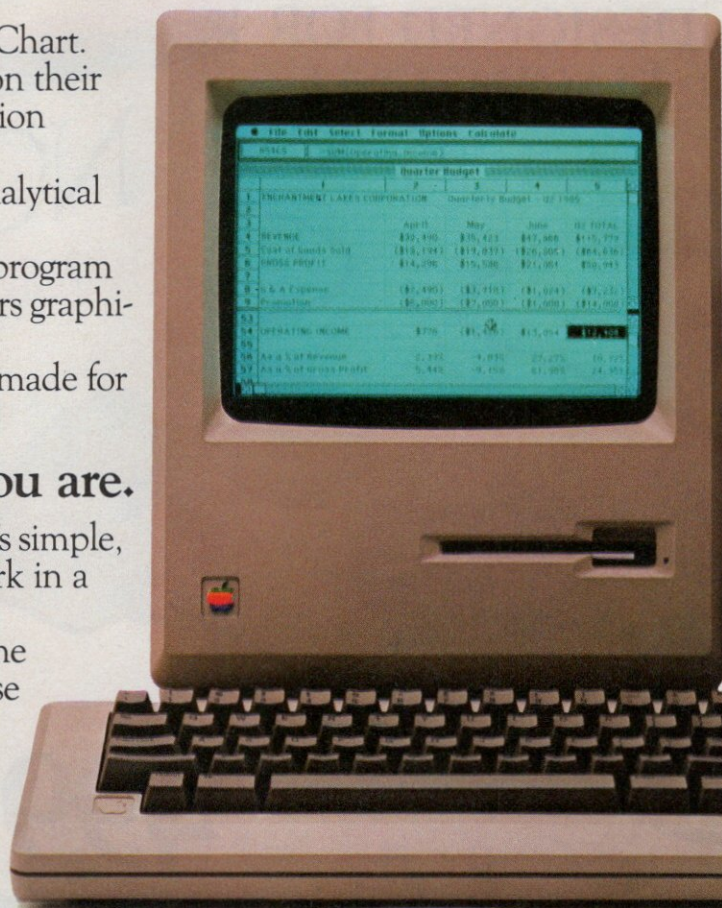

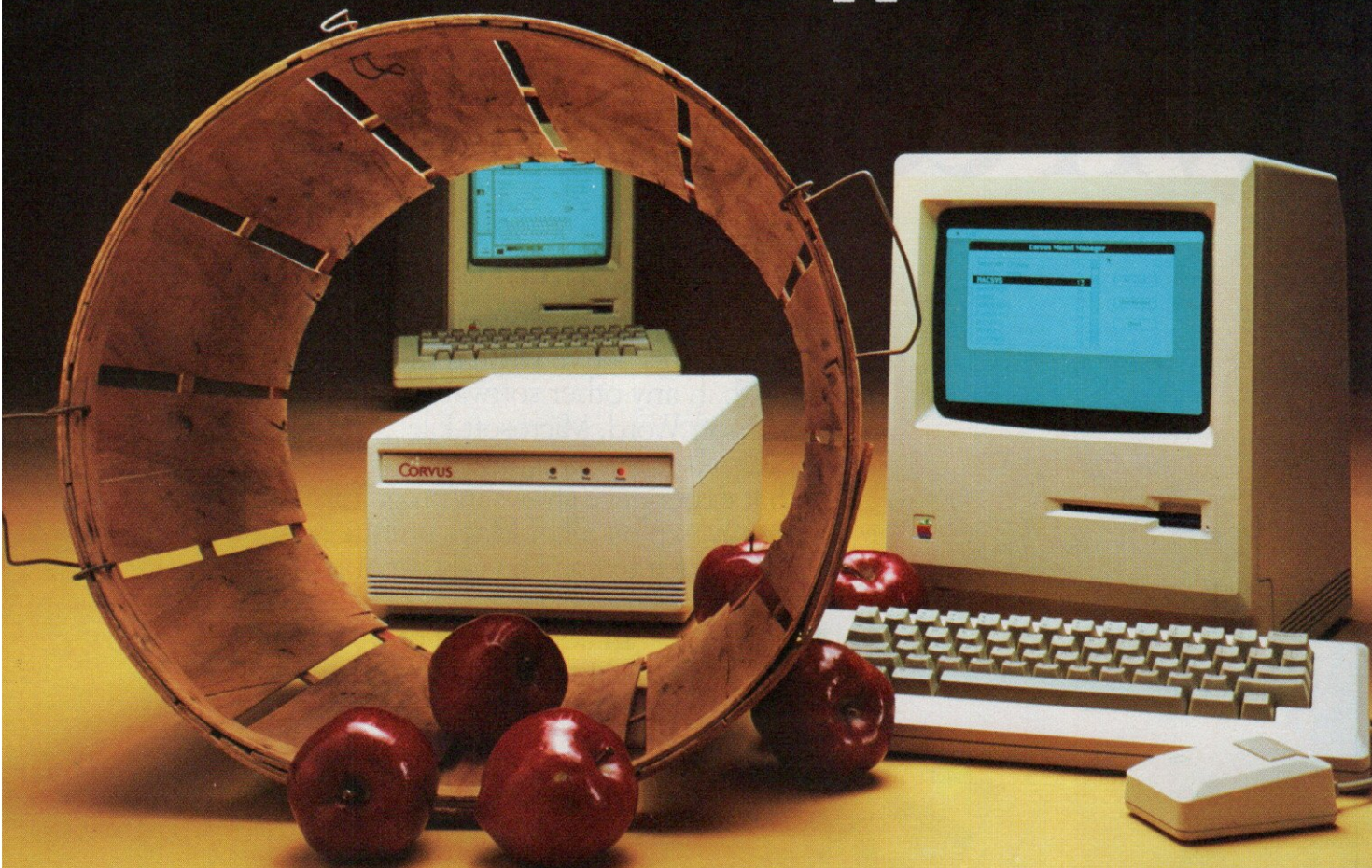

four different kinds of alignment, four different kinds of leaders, and your choice of clicking or naming the tab position—and you can do all of this without having to learn any commands at all.

Microsoft has included optional keystroke sequences for the commands in the File menu (figure 3), which is a feature that is missing from many Macintosh applications. Here again, you have a choice: you can use the mouse and the menu, or, if you're violently opposed to removing your fingers from the keyboard, you can simply type the commands. These commands are not hard to learn: Command-N opens a new document, and Command-S saves your document, for instance.

Word has about 40 "key sequences" or "mouse and key sequences." At first glance, you may suspect that we've left behind the world of mice and menus for those arcane commands, but, again, these commands allow you to do interesting, complicated things. For example, Word provides a variety of ways to select text. You can always drag across it, as you can in all Macintosh applications. In addition, double-

clicking selects a word, pressing the **⌘** key while clicking the mouse selects the entire sentence, clicking in the invisible selection bar on the left of the screen allows you to select an entire line, and double-clicking in the selection bar selects an entire paragraph. Although it may take you a while to learn these commands, you can always drag the mouse until you master them.

The ability to recover from mistakes is an important aspect of software. Word's Undo command not only lets you retrieve copy you have deleted with the Cut command, but it also allows you to recover text you have deleted by selecting the text and pressing the backspace key. Word writes this deleted material to the clipboard, so if you need to get it back, it's there.

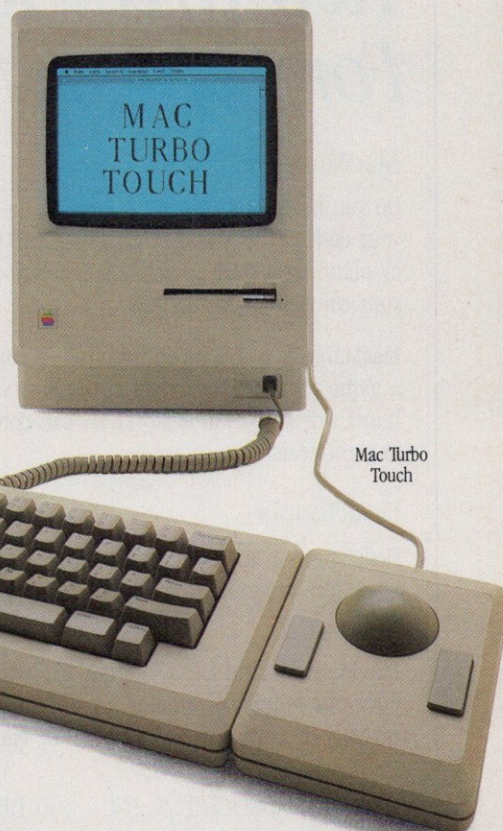

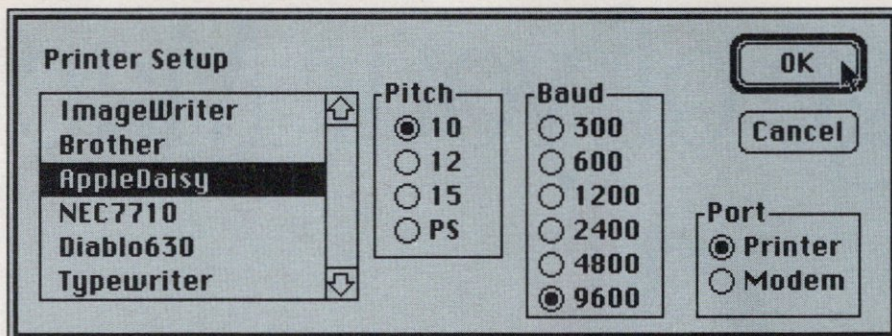


Figure 4: Printer drivers that come with Word support daisy-wheel printers.

With Word, you can have up to four document windows open on the screen at one time. Given the size of the Macintosh screen, you probably won't want to open four at once, but you may want to refer to notes while working on a manuscript, or you may want to copy and move text between documents, without things disappearing into the clipboard. Since you can create lengthy documents, the ability to split the screen so that you can compare page 1 with page 50 is convenient.

As usual, you can resize and move windows on the screen. You can also double-click in the size box or on the title bar to make a window full size,

or to return to a smaller size. Printer drivers, which allow your Mac to communicate with daisy-wheel printers, come with Word. The Printer Setup dialog box (figure 4) lets you select the driver, pitch, and transmission rate appropriate for your printer. If you have both an Imagewriter and a daisy-wheel printer, you can plug the latter into the modem port and the former into the printer port and then click to select the proper port. If you do have a daisy-wheel printer, you'll probably need to buy a cable, but you won't have to get a separate software package to drive the printer.

Word has far more state-of-the-art word-processing features than I can

tell you about here, but now that you have an idea of how to go about using Word, let's look at a few of them.

Glossaries let you store and enter frequently used text without having to retype it each time. Typical glossary entries may include your company name and address, or a standard clause in a contract. You first create and save the text in a glossary. When you want to insert this text, you type in the glossary name and ⌘-backspace to enter the text. The amount of text you can include in a glossary is limited only by disk space.

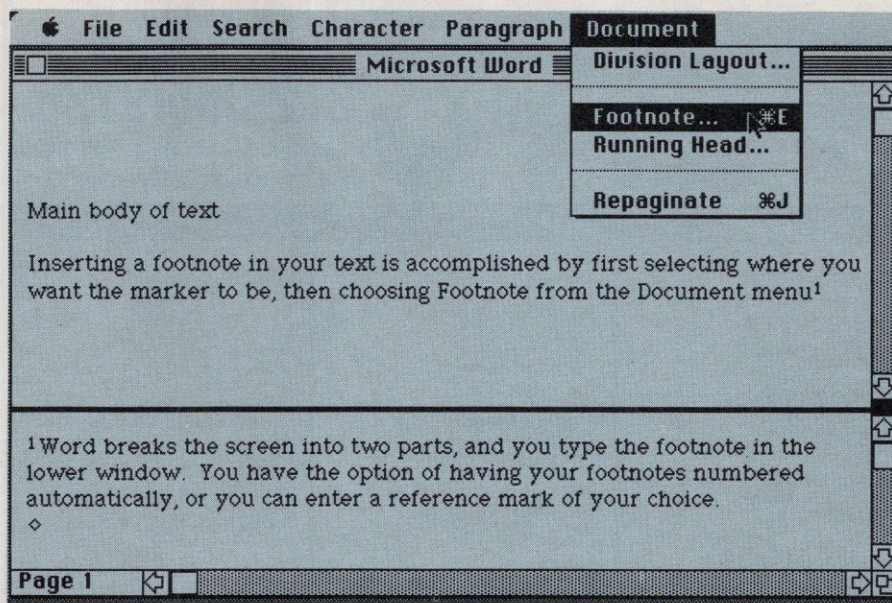


Figure 5: State-of-the-art automatic footnote capability

Word's automatic footnote feature lets you enter a symbol or a number in the text, type your footnote text in another window, and have it printed either at the bottom of the page or at the end of a division (such as a chapter). The program can number the footnotes, if you like, and rennumbers them if you insert a new footnote between existing ones. Figure 5 shows you how it's done.

The Print Merge function lets you print multiple versions of a form document—a form letter, a main document with certain inserted text, or a merge document that compiles data from other documents or programs—

with each version containing variable information. You make a main document with your "standard text" and a merged document with text that varies from one copy to the next. You enter field names, such as Name, Address, and Salary, in the main document. The appropriate information replaces them when you print out the merged document.

You can also type instructions in the main document to tell Word where to look for the information to be inserted and how to handle it. Instructions can also be conditional. For example, IF lottery number=123456789, INCLUDE, "Your certified check for \$4,000,000 is enclosed" instructs the program to inform the winner that the check is in the mail.

Limitations and Problems

One feature Microsoft Word lacks is a spelling checker. I suppose, given the formidable size of the program, there simply wasn't room to include a spelling checker or dictionary. Nevertheless, if spelling is the bane of your existence, you may rule out Word because of this omission. If you've used Word's style sheets on other systems, you'll notice their absence as well.

Limited disk space presents another problem. Microsoft recommends that you use Word with a two-drive system. The text copy I received had only 18K of available memory, and Microsoft suggests that you always leave 10K free for running the program. Obviously, this amount of space is not sufficient for creating and

printing a long document, much less designing a form letter and merging it with a large mailing list. If you remove nonessential files such as tutorial files and printer drivers, you'll have enough space for 50 to 60 pages of text on your disk. If you want to work with large quantities of information, however, you'll definitely

need to have a second drive.

Speaking of disks, Microsoft Word is copy-protected. Although you can make as many copies of the programs as you wish, you have to insert the master disk whenever you boot your system. Because the program is disk-based, and thus frequently reading and writing to disk, the program works much more slowly than if the entire document were in memory.

W

ord is a state-of-the-art product that contains almost all of the special features designed for word processors to date. Your decision to buy it will probably depend on whether or not you need all these functions—some of us never write form letters or use footnotes.

As for ease of use, I think Microsoft Word on the Macintosh is the easiest full-featured word processor around. I particularly like its command flexibility. The text-selection commands, for example, can be ignored at the beginning and used later when you work your way up to them. I think they're worth the trouble. If you're thinking of buying, you should know that Word can read and work with your MacWrite files without any modifications or additional instructions.

Microsoft Word may be the answer to your word-processing dreams, or it may be beyond the scope of your work. Coping with its complexity may be difficult for some, but experienced users of word-processing programs shouldn't have any trouble. If you're new to word processing but would like to be able to do the kinds of things Word can do, tackling Word will be well worth the effort. +

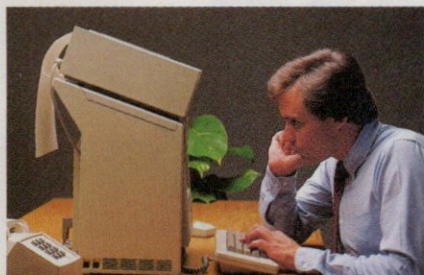

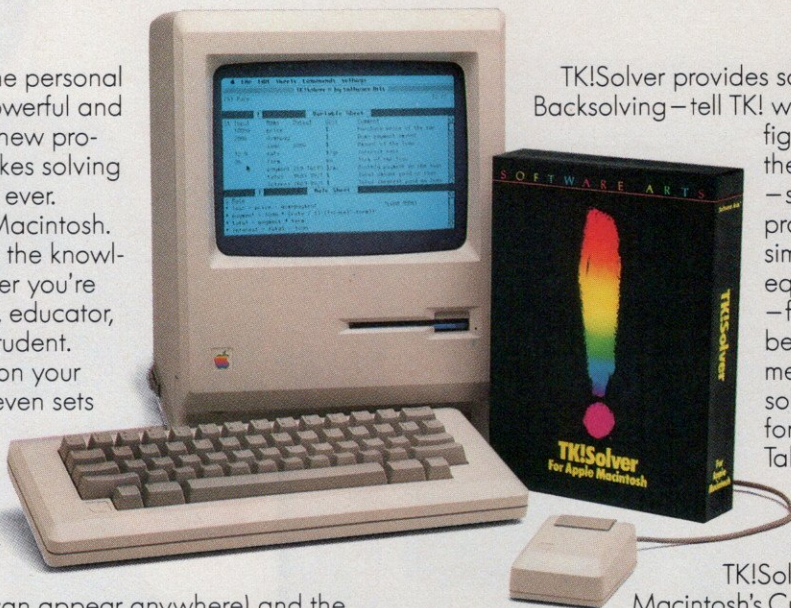

TO MS-BASIC

If you have made the step up from an Apple II to a Macintosh, chances are you want to convert some of your present Applesoft programs to run on the Macintosh. Besides having to modify the Applesoft commands and syntax to meet Macintosh requirements, you also have to type the programs in, a chore you can happily avoid by downloading them from the Apple II to the Macintosh through a serial-interface card.

In addition to the two computers, the serial-interface process has other requirements. Foremost among these is a serial-interface card that plugs into the Apple II. I used a California Computer Systems model 7710 serial-interface card, but similar cards should work as well. To hold down expenses, I used the Macintosh's Imagewriter printer cable. One end of the cable attaches to the Mac's modem port, the other to an adapter. Since the serial port in the Apple II and the Macintosh have the same configuration, an adapter reroutes the signals in the cable to the appropriate connections.

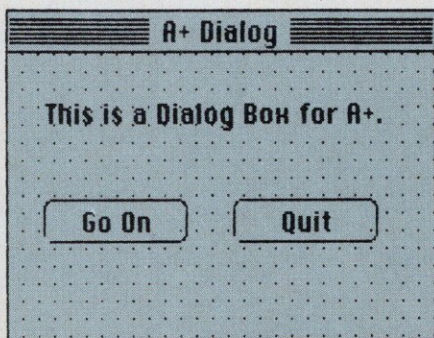
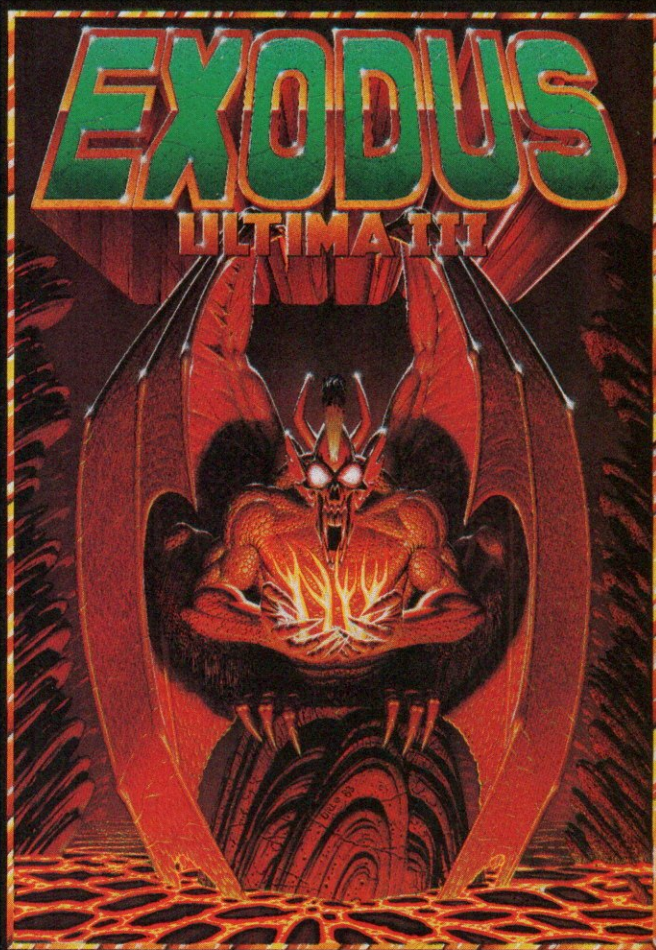


Figure 1: Displaying a dialog box

The adapter consists of two stan-

dard RS-232 connectors with a few leads soldered between them (see figure 1). In Radio Shack adapters, the DB-25P male connector is part number 276-1547, and the DB-25S female connector is part number 276-1548. The rather slow BASIC program limits the maximum transfer speed to about 300 bps (bits per second).

The program, to avoid errors, strips out lone carriage returns in the transferred program. Microsoft BASIC does not permit immediate commands in a program it is loading. Since it interprets a carriage return as an immediate command, a program that has a lone carriage return results in the error message DIRECT STATEMENT IN FILE.

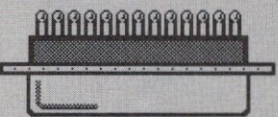
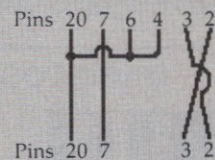
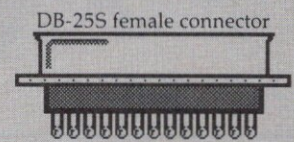
An outline of the operations involved in the transfer follows:

1. Type the BASIC program in the listing that begins below into the Mac and save it. Type RUN to start the program, and some information about the program should appear on the screen. During execution, the program converts the Macintosh into a terminal so that whatever you type on the keyboard goes serially out of

the modem port, and data coming into the modem port appears on the Macintosh's screen.

2. Type PR#2 and then IN#2 (assuming the serial-interface card is in slot 2) on the Apple II keyboard. This action disables the Apple II's keyboard and display and routes all input and output through the serial-

interface card.

3. At this point, the Apple II should respond to immediate commands—such as CATALOG, LOAD, LIST, and so on—that you type on the Macintosh.

4. When you first click the mouse in the Output window, the Macintosh asks for the name of the Applesoft program you want to transfer. After you enter the name of the program, the Macintosh gives commands to the Apple II to load and list the program. During the listing of the program, the Macintosh saves the individual lines in its memory. If an unexpected error occurs—such as getting a FILE NOT FOUND message from the Apple II because of an incorrect program

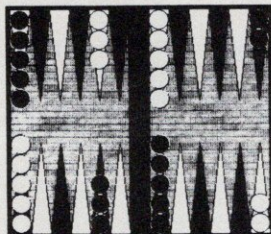

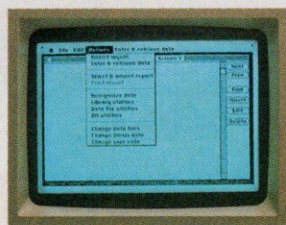

Programming for the Rest of Us

*Macintosh software
development
one year later*

Well, it's been one year since I first laid eyes on an Apple Macintosh.

When I first signed up as a book author to write about how to program the Macintosh, I received assurances that Apple would do everything in its power to speed me through my task. We talked about the book appearing in the spring of 1984. Boy, did we figure wrong.

Now, with two assemblers, at least three versions of the C language and two of Forth appearing, I can finally stop using my Lisa for Macintosh program development and at last introduce you Mac owners to a bit of programming. That's what we're about to do together: programming for the rest of us.

If you've followed previous columns, you'll probably remember that I spent a lot of time discussing the concept of resources. You're about to find out why.

Taking the Plunge

Our first programming project is a simple one, but space limitations mean that I have to split it into two parts. This month we'll tackle the resource file and the overall structure (flow of control) of the program; next month we'll examine the nitty-gritty details and look at the final code. We'll be doing our programming in assembly language this time, but I promise to keep it simple.

The program we'll be developing is extremely simple: We're going to

display a dialog box with two buttons on it (see figure 1). Depending on which button you click your mouse in, another dialog box will appear. Eventually we'll add other features to this program, such as its own menu bars, some doodling space for you graphic types, and perhaps a bit of text manipulation.

Seems pretty simple, doesn't it? Consider how many steps you'd have to go through if you didn't have the Macintosh's toolbox at your disposal, though. (1) You'd have to draw all the boxes a line at a time, meaning you'd have to know every corner location; (2) you'd have to draw a button around the text that was to appear inside it; (3) you'd have to preserve the background area that the dialog box covered so that you could restore it later; (4) you'd have to write routines that let you move the dialog box by dragging its title bar across the display; and (5) you'd have to change

the area being preserved and restore portions of the background as the dialog box moved.

Each of these operations is a minor programming feat in itself. The steps involving box movement would require particular attention if the user wanted to have a feeling of control over the movement.

Indeed, the Mac's toolbox routines for dragging objects such as a dialog box involve critical timing interrupts for the video-display refresh (the video-refresh rate is the time it takes for the electron beam that creates the display to get from the lower right corner to the top left corner of the display to start a new trace line). I doubt that many potential Macintosh programmers are ready to deal with such details; I know I'm not.

Instead of making you go through all of these troublesome steps, the Macintosh can reduce your programming task to two steps: (1) Determine the size and location of the dialog box and prepare the text that is to appear in it and (2) write the program.

Reducing our task to this two-step process may seem like an oversimplification, but it really is that easy. Let's look at each step more closely.

Our first step is to determine all as-

pects of the dialog box we're going to create. The upper left corner of the Macintosh screen is called position 0,0. Position numbers increase 1 pixel horizontally and vertically until we reach the maximum (512 horizontal and 342 vertical pixels). Actually, we'll eventually learn that the "potential" Macintosh screen is much larger than this.

If we want a dialog box to take up about one-third of the screen vertically and one-third horizontally and to be located approximately in the center, the upper left corner is at position 114 vertically and 170 horizontally, and the lower right corner is at 228,340.

Good,

we're almost done with step 1. Now all we have to do is determine what text goes in the box, where it goes, and where our two buttons are going to be placed. Figure 2 is a resource file that fully defines our dialog box. Create this file with the editor that came with the assembler; then run it through the

RMaker program to create something our program can use. (Note: The last portion of the resource file is kind of cryptic; for now, let's just say that it puts the eventual program code into the resource file so that we generate only one file for our program, instead of two.)

Preview

Step 2 is to create our program. We'll deal with that step in detail in next month's installment, but for now let me summarize what's ahead:

1. Initializing the toolbox managers we're going to be using.
2. Opening the dialog box we just created and displaying it.
3. Looking at the mouse's position to determine whether it is in the menu bar, in the title bar, or in either of the buttons.
4. If the mouse is in one of the above locations and the button is down, performing the appropriate action.

That's all we have room for this month. Stay tuned for part 2, only 30 days away. **+**

MS-BASIC FONT SIZE

Microsoft BASIC allows you to select the font type and size in the output window with Textfont and Textsize. Unfortunately, you have no control on the type used in the List and Command windows—it is always Geneva 12 (New York 12 if you have the original System).

Why would you want to use a different font? First, Geneva is a proportional font, so the spacing and column alignment of text in PRINT statements is different from the way they will appear when you print them on the Imagewriter. Second, with three windows on the screen, I find Geneva 12 clear but bulky. Monaco 9 displays more text and enables you to use and edit longer lines. You can change the font and size in all three windows to Monaco 9 with a single short command:

`POKE &H985,4:POKE &H987,9`

&H985 is the system global location ApFontID and defines the current "application font," in this case 4 for Monaco. &H987 is FMDefaultSize, the default font size for everything, in this case 9 for 9 point.

Be careful, though. These pokes change the default type size for *everything*—including the window titles, menu items, and dialog boxes—and, unfortunately, Chicago looks terrible when it is scaled down to 9 point. These poke locations work with the May 2 version of the system on a 128K Macintosh, but they don't necessarily work with anything else.

SCRAPBOOK LIBRARY

You can build a library of Scrapbook files arranged by type and topic.

If you are anything like me, you build files heedlessly, without much thought about where to put them. After the fact, you find, scattered around in various diskettes, useful text and pictorial items that should be available and handy, but aren't. Moreover, if you think about it a bit, you have various themes and/or types of items that you could group together. Perhaps you've even begun to assemble them on various data diskettes or in the Scrapbook.

Accessing Scrapbook items on the Mac is not particularly quick, though, and scrolling through a large Scrapbook filled with miscellaneous material is an annoying procedure.

A better approach is to build up some topical Scrapbook files. First, remove all items from a Scrapbook to a disk that has a relatively empty Scrapbook. Then exit to the desktop and open the System folder. Go to the File menu and duplicate (with Command-D) the now empty Scrapbook file. Rename it something descriptive, such as EmptyScrapbook.

Now you can fill the working Scrapbook file with



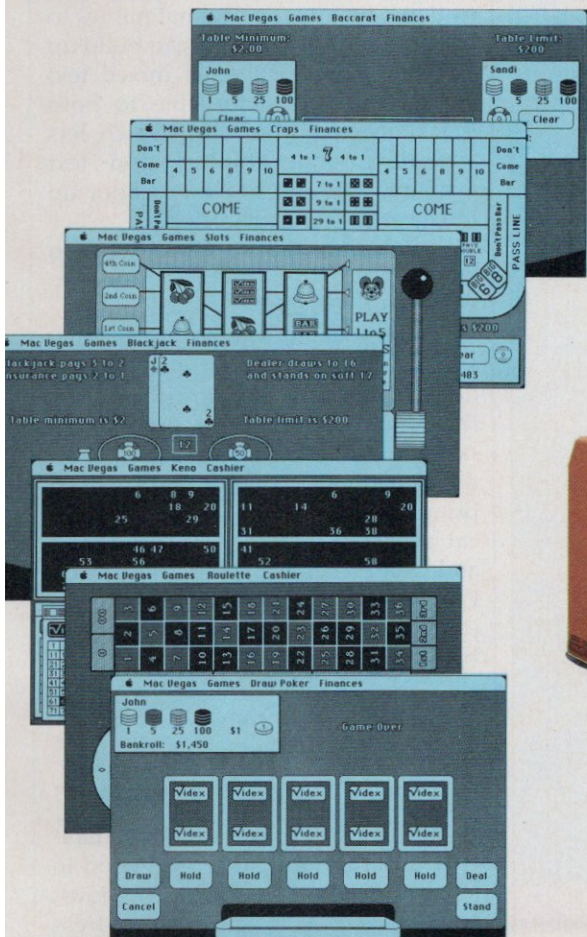

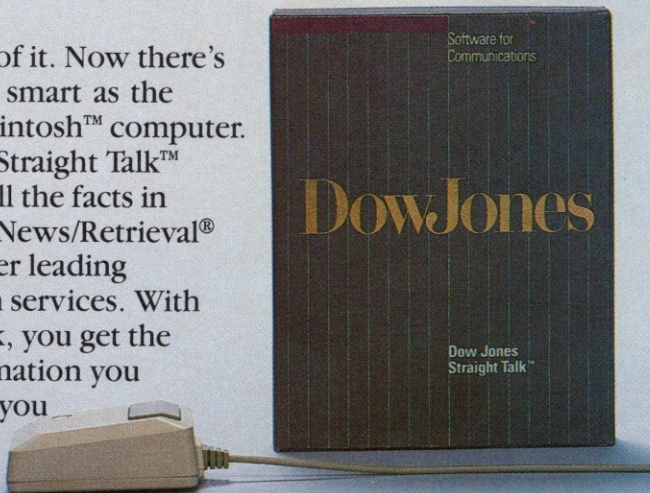

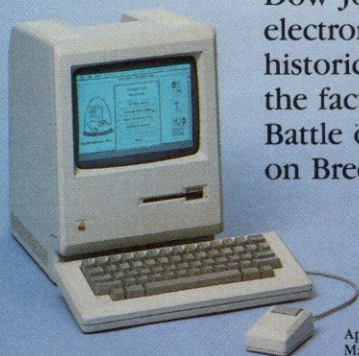

topical or theme items at your leisure. When it is large enough or has everything you wish to include on that theme, exit to the desktop. This time, rename the Scrapbook file according to its contents—Letterheads, for example.

Again duplicate the EmptyScrapbook file and name it Scrapbook. At this point, you have three system Scrapbook files on hand: one, now empty, called Scrapbook; one full, called Letterheads; and the last, still empty, called EmptyScrapbook. Using this process, you can build up many files filled with useful pictures and text and named according to your own system of classification. Accessing the files is as simple as renaming two files on the Desktop. Simply rename the current Scrapbook something to remind you that it is the working Scrapbook, perhaps SB.WORKFILE, and rename the file you wish to access temporarily as Scrapbook.

You can then go in and copy and cut to your heart's content. When you exit, just restore the original names to the files. In this way, you can build up quite a useful archive of mixed text and pictures, all accessible to both MacWrite and MacPaint, which lets you have both graphics and text available without having to boot up the appropriate application.

Then, holding down the Shift key, click on the document icon that you want to print next. Continue on in hierarchical order. Pull down the file menu and release the mouse button on Print. The selected documents will print in the order they are selected, without user intervention.

For those who don't yet have a database program, the Search function in MacWrite gives all the power most people need, at least for an address

file. First, set up your file just as you want it to look. To find a specific entry, position the cursor at the beginning of the text; pull down the Search menu; select Find; and enter, for example, a first name. MacWrite searches for a match and, when it finds it, shows it in the middle of the screen. If that entry isn't the right one, just press Return and MacWrite searches for another match. If no match is found by the end of the file, MacWrite displays a dialog box with that information.

FILE-SEARCH FEATURE

When an open dialog box in such programs as MacWrite, MacPaint, and Multiplan invites you to select a file, you normally have to scroll through the box looking for the file you want. If you already know the name of the file or the first letter, however, you can go directly to the files that begin with that letter by simply touching the appropriate key on the keyboard. Touching K when the open dialog box is on the screen, for example, highlights the first filename that starts with K. Pressing the Tab or Backspace key takes you to the beginning of the file list.

TAKING YOUR IIc TO EUROPE?

*Not without
some changes.*

The bags were packed, the tickets and passports were in order, the family was ready, and the cab was waiting outside the door. In just a few minutes, Byron Gumblatt and family would begin The Great Gumblatt Tour of Europe: Summer of 84.

Just before leaving the house, Byron grabbed his one allowed piece of carry-on airline luggage. Securely nested in its charcoal-gray case was his virtually new Apple IIc, and it was going along to Europe because Byron had managed to convince the Gumblatt clan of its potential usefulness.

A few of the kids' favorite games were tucked away, and so were three productivity programs. One was for word processing (for Byron's intended diary), one was a database (to catalog Byron's photos as he took them), and the final one was for keeping track of daily expenses. When Byron Gumblatt got back in 21 days, he told all those who would listen, he'd have the most thorough record of a family vacation since Herodotus set out to record the wonders of the ancient world.

"Byron Gumblatt," he'd remarked to himself, "you're a genius for having thought it out," and Apple, of course, was a genius for developing the machine to carry out his plans.

Foiled

Byron had unfortunately failed to ask one crucial question: Would his American-made Apple IIc actually work once he got to Europe?

As the Gumblatt family boarded its flight, Byron was still in sweet, ignorant bliss. Little did he know that he was headed for computer heartache on the far side of the Atlantic.

Can an American-made Apple IIc work in Europe? Simply put, the answer is no—without some changes.

Geographical Restrictions

Despite its compact size, light weight, and overall portability, the Apple IIc can travel (with ease) only within the boundaries of the United States. If you take it outside those boundaries, inherent, unavoidable differences will make the IIc 7½ pounds (3.4 kilos) of inoperable computer sophistication.

The most basic of these differences is the energy that runs the IIc. Not only is the currency different throughout Europe, but so is the electrical current.

In the United States the AC (wall-plug) current for most standard household appliances is 120 volts. In Great Britain, however, that current is 240 volts and on the European continent, house current is rated at 220 volts.

Even the plugs and outlets in Europe are different. In the U.S. plugs are usually flat-pronged affairs that come in pairs. In Europe, although plugs also come in twos, they're usually round and, as we all know so well, you can't fit an essentially square peg into a round hole.

A simple and widely used method of getting around differing voltages is to use transformers and plug adapters. The first approach allows you to convert one voltage to another, and the other actually allows you to use the incompatible plug.

To achieve the miracle of voltage

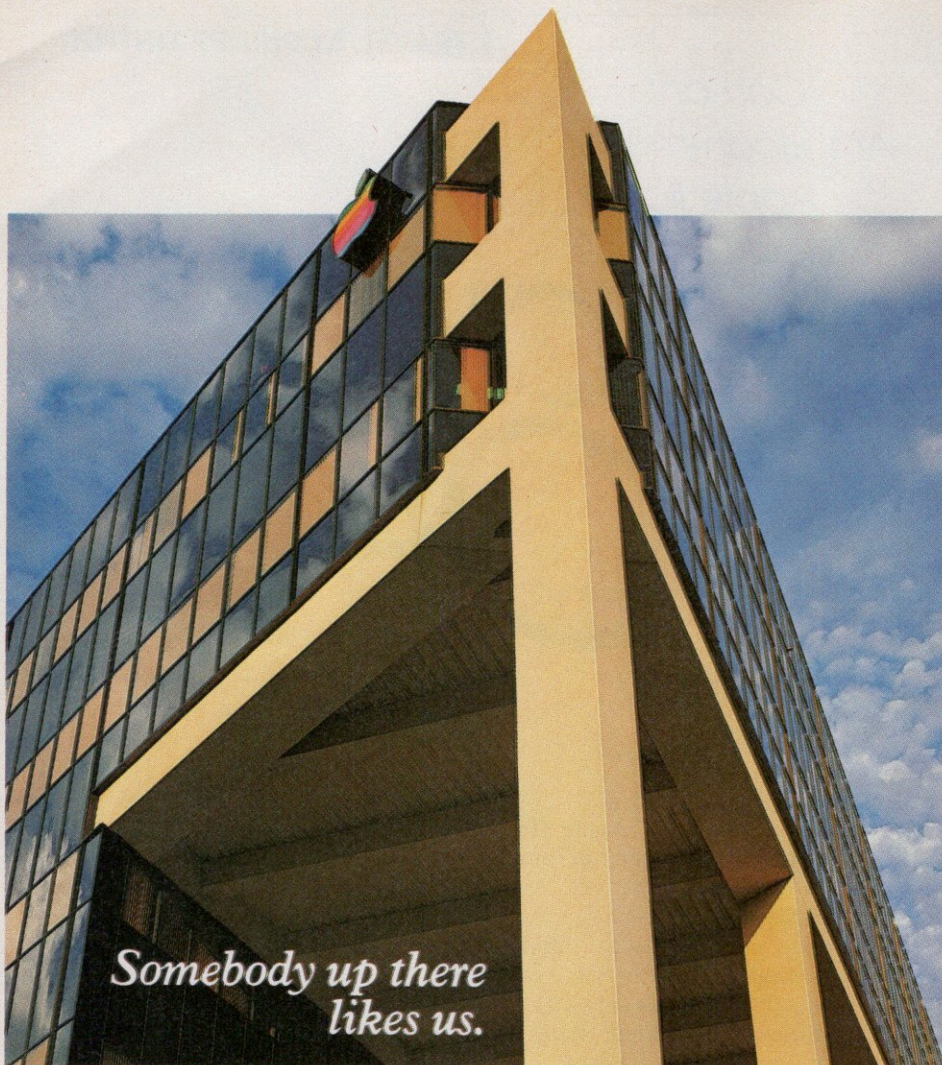
transformation, Apple suggests, you should use its European power supply instead of the power supply that comes with the U.S. version of the IIc. The European power supply works with 220 or 240 volts.

TV Troubles

The problems of differing voltage are easy to overcome, compared to the next problem. This next problem is virtually impossible to overcome, and it's the principle reason why you can't use an Apple IIc outside the United States unless you take along your own display unit. The obstacle is the differences that exist among the world's television standards.

Roughly speaking, the world's television standards fall into three different and incompatible groups. The standards are known by their initials: NTSC (National Television Standards Committee), PAL (Phase Alteration Line), and SECAM (Sequential Color with Memory). NTSC is the television standard used in the United States, one variation of PAL is used in Britain, another (incompatible) variation of PAL is used in continental Europe, and two forms of SECAM (also incompatible with each other) are used in France, the Soviet Union, and most East Bloc nations.

In practical day-to-day computer use, what these technical differences add up to is that if you hook up a IIc to the antenna terminals of a European television (or the IIc's video output to a European monitor), the result will be a scrolling image devoid of both sound and color—and the scrolling can be impossible to stop. Are you getting the picture? You won't if you don't have

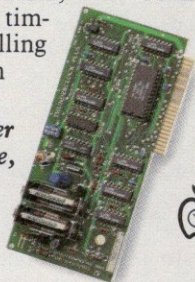

your own TV or monitor.

Computers are married to the specific television system of the country in which they're sold. When you buy an Apple IIc in Los Angeles, what you are essentially buying is an Apple IIc NTSC computer. If you buy it in Vienna, Austria, you're buying an Apple IIc PAL computer.

Can you overcome these differences in TV systems? In theory, yes; in practice, no.

A Question of Chips

What makes a IIc operate with each of the different TV systems is actually quite basic and amounts to an internal difference of only one or two chips, at most. In theory, you can change these

chips to suit any TV system anywhere in the world. Only Apple itself can make these changes, however, and doing so is a moderately costly proposition. Apple, in fact, recommends that any such change be complete replacement of the IIc's motherboard.

In addition, unless you're planning to emigrate permanently, any chip changes will need reversing once you get back to the United States. You could, in other words, end up with a pocket full of chips and very little spare change once the process was said and done.

Nonetheless, a practical and simple solution to this complicated problem is on the horizon. Shortly (if not already) the flat-screen display unit developed specifically for the IIc will become generally available. With this unit, a IIc European power supply and a set of plug adapters, the IIc will become a truly international portable computer. Another way around the problem is to take a small portable television along when you go overseas.

The Obstacles

These, then, are the major obstacles: the differences in voltages, the shape and size of electrical outlets and plugs, and the differences in TV systems.

Some minor hurdles also bear mentioning. One of these is in the all-important area of software.

As Europeans become more and more a part of the personal-computer generation, more European-based software developers will emerge. These developers will, understandably, produce programs in their native tongues. English-speaking computer users in continental Europe will be out of luck.

The point here is as simple as Ä, ß, ç: You shouldn't count on being able to buy programs in English anywhere you happen to be in Europe. A help screen is little help in German, after all, if your command of the language doesn't go beyond the word *kindergarten*.

Foreign Service

Finally, as sad as it is to contemplate, things do go wrong from time to time, and when you're in a foreign country, things that go wrong seem catastrophic—even if they aren't really.

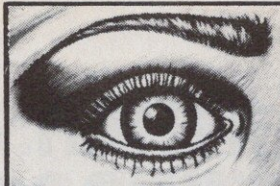
Fortunately, Apple is a well-established international company represented in almost any country you care to name. Service, advice, and (yes) repair are readily available, as long as you don't stray too far from the beaten track.

If, however, your IIc should need service abroad, you'll run into one major drawback: The warranty on any Apple computer or other Apple product is valid only in the country of purchase. In other words, if your travel budget is finely tuned, repairs may have to wait until you get back home.

Unfortunately, the preceding discussion of the Apple IIc abroad is purely academic for Byron Gumblatt who, on touchdown in Frankfurt, quickly realized he was in big trouble. For the next 20 days, in fact, Byron carried his Apple IIc slung over his shoulder (still securely nestled in its carrying case) as though it were an albatross around his neck.

All joking aside, however, the Apple IIc is, as advertised, a compact, lightweight, and highly sophisticated computer. If users fail to comprehend the current limits of that portability, they must be forgiven this shortcoming, as Apple must be forgiven the oversight in not making those limits perfectly clear. +

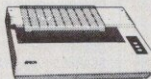

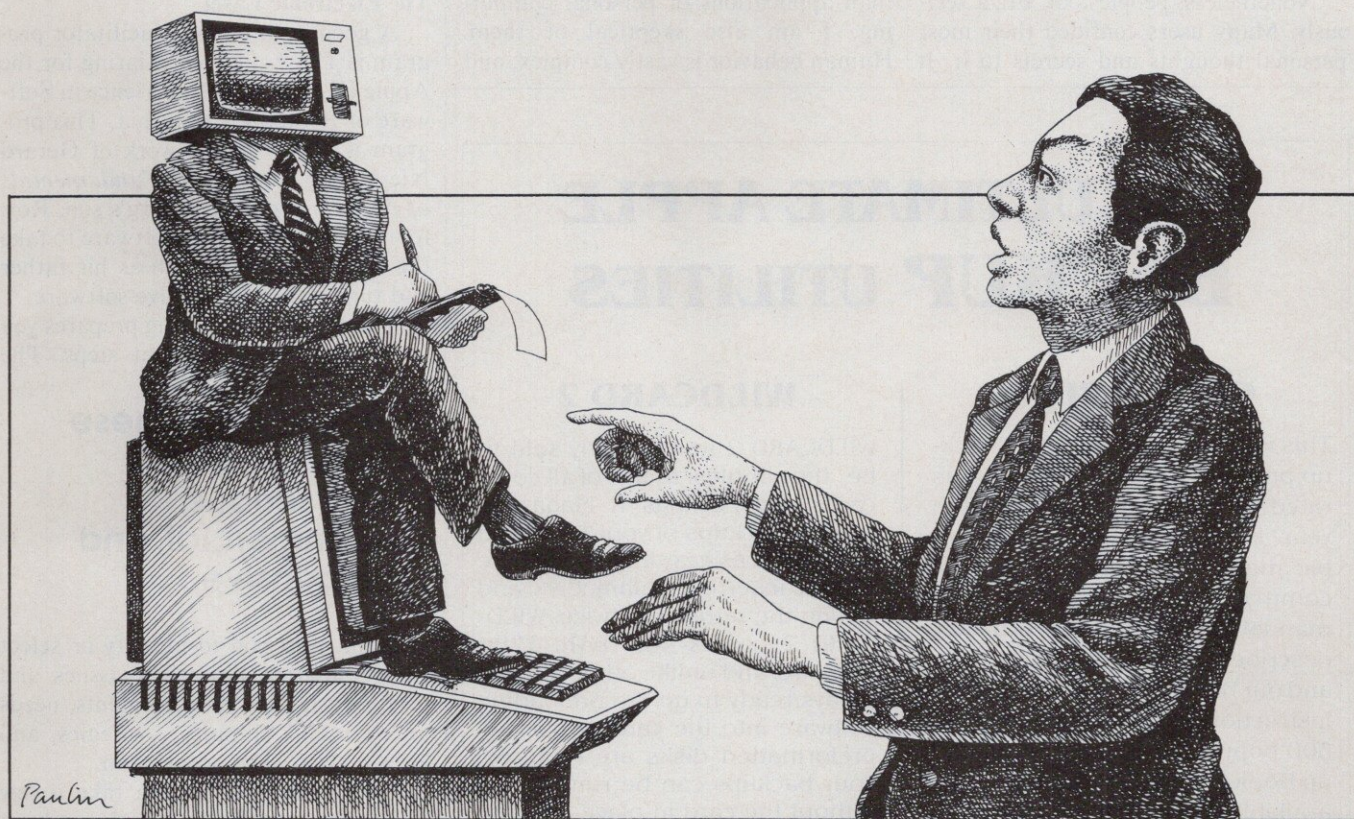

Computers won't
replace therapists—yet



WEIGHING COMPUTER ADVICE

I used to be a psychologist in a previous life (five years ago), so I've been intrigued by the recent emergence of software that claims to help you solve problems, develop skills, and get along with others.

The first psychological computer program was probably Eliza, created by Joseph Weizenbaum of MIT in the mid-60s. Weizenbaum taught Eliza to play the role of a nondirective psychotherapist. In this sample interaction between Eliza and a young woman, the computer's responses are printed in capital letters.

Men are all alike.

IN WHAT WAY

They're always bugging us about something or other.

CAN YOU THINK OF A SPECIFIC EXAMPLE

Well, my boyfriend made me come here.

YOUR BOYFRIEND MADE YOU COME HERE

He says I'm depressed much of the time.

I AM SORRY TO HEAR YOU ARE DEPRESSED

It's true. I am unhappy.

DO YOU THINK COMING HERE WILL HELP YOU NOT TO BE UNHAPPY

I need some help, that much seems certain.

WHAT WOULD IT MEAN TO YOU IF YOU GOT SOME HELP

Perhaps I could learn to get along with my mother.

TELL ME MORE ABOUT YOUR FAMILY

... You are like my father in some ways.

WHAT RESEMBLANCE DO YOU SEE

... You are afraid of me.

DOES IT PLEASE YOU TO BELIEVE I AM AFRAID OF YOU

My father is afraid of everybody.

WHAT ELSE COMES TO MIND WHEN YOU THINK OF YOUR FATHER

Bullies.

DOES THAT HAVE ANYTHING TO DO WITH THE FACT THAT YOUR BOYFRIEND MADE YOU COME HERE

Despite such insights, Weizenbaum's program was more of a linguistic breakthrough than a psychological one. Eliza had about as much psychological knowledge as a toaster and didn't know a superego from a supernova.

Eliza was programmed to analyze, and parrot back in slightly transformed ways, what was said to it. Had the woman typed, "You are tuba of pickles," Eliza would have responded, "DOES IT PLEASE YOU TO BELIEVE I AM TUBA OF PICKLES." Weizenbaum named his program after Eliza Doolittle, who could be taught to talk like an aristocrat but not necessarily to be one.

Nonetheless, people took Eliza seriously. Many users confided their most personal thoughts and secrets to it. It

seemed that people were ready and willing to enlist computers to help solve their personal problems.

That lesson has not been lost on software developers, who have released several psychological-software packages in the last year. Unlike Eliza, which was simply an academic exercise, these new programs are serious, commercial, and expensive.

Although I welcome these more human applications of personal computing, I am also skeptical of them. Human behavior is vastly complex, and

much of our knowledge of it is tentative. It seems premature to expect a computer to understand enough about people to give good advice.

Today's psychological software has two main approaches. Some programs act as *facilitators*, helping users generate, analyze, and implement solutions of their own. Others act as *advisers*, generating the strategies and solutions themselves.

The Electronic Easel

A good example of a facilitator program is The Art of Negotiating for the Apple III (\$495) by Experience in Software of Berkeley, California. This program is based on the work of Gerard Nierenberg, author of *Fundamentals of Negotiating*. Nierenberg's son, Roy, founded Experience in Software to take the work of experts such as his father and turn it into interactive software.

The Art of Negotiating prepares you for a negotiation in eight steps. The

program asks you to identify or select subject matter, objectives, issues and positions, factual disagreements, needs and gambits, climates, strategies, and an agenda for the negotiation.

The whole process can take a few hours, and its effectiveness depends on whether you can structure your own situation in the program's terms. When I applied it to an upcoming negotiation of my own, it stimulated my thinking, steered me to some interesting insights, and suggested some general strategies that might be useful.

I could have gotten the same benefit from reading Nierenberg's \$14.95 book, however. The program serves mainly as an electronic easel, remembering your answers and making sure you don't skip steps. I wanted it to do more, save me some work, draw some conclusions, be intelligent. But it seemed to step back and say, "Hey, this is your problem, you do the work."

For example, after I'd listed the objectives of both sides, the program asked me to choose those that were conflicting. I thought it would suggest ways of resolving these conflicts, but it didn't. Instead, it glibly reminded me that the remaining, nonconflicting ones might be "harmonious objectives that

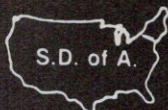

you can point out as areas of shared interests."

Similarly, after I'd identified the two issues to be decided, I was asked to rate their importance to both parties. One was more important to me, the other to my opponent. I hoped the program would suggest a compromise in which both parties won their most important issue, but it didn't.

Focusing on Personalities

If facilitator programs sometimes shrink from drawing conclusions, adviser programs do not. I prepared for the same negotiation with The Negotiation Edge for the Apple II, III, and Macintosh (\$295) by Human Edge Software of Palo Alto, California. This program, along with similar programs for sales, management, and communication, are based on personality research directed by company founder and psychologist James Johnson.

The Negotiation Edge takes half an hour or less to run, and it doesn't view negotiation as a clash of objectives, issues, positions, gambits, climates, or strategies. This program views negotiation as a clash of *personalities*.

Thus, to use The Negotiation Edge, you answer 90 brief questions about yourself. The questionnaire asks you to

agree or disagree with such statements as "I usually arrive early for an appointment" and "I would rather have money than power."

Next, you answer another 90 questions about your counterpart or opponent, deciding, for instance, whether he is "ruthless" and "approval-seeking." Finally, you are asked to agree or dis-

agree with 21 statements about the negotiation itself, including, "The power to control the proceedings is equally divided between us."

From these two questionnaires, the program produces an eight-page "strategy report." Since you have not been asked to identify the issues, the report cannot tell you how to resolve them (a

future version may include this feature). It does contain detailed advice on how to approach the negotiation, however. Here are some samples:

WATCH FOR SNOW-JOBS. Be careful when you begin to hear too much from your counterpart. He may try to overwhelm you with information. He is extremely verbal and can talk his way into or out of many situations.

TURN QUESTIONS BACK TO SIDE-STEP PRESSURE. If your counterpart asks questions designed to intimidate you into making the deal, turn the question back to him. For example, turn back "When are you going to make up your mind" by asking him, "When do you need a decision?"

As they come out of the printer, these suggestions are impressive. "This program is smart!" you may say. "This advice really rings true!"

The problem is that general advice may appear deceptively individual. In one study, college students were given two brief personality tests. A week later

You have a strong need for other people to like you and for them to admire you. You have a tendency to be critical of yourself. You have a great deal of unused capacity which you have not turned to your advantage. . . . Your sexual adjustment has presented some problems for you. Disciplined and controlled on the outside, you tend to be worrisome and insecure inside. . . . At times you are extroverted, affable, so-

Human Edge has tried to avoid the Polonius pitfall by individualizing its advice on the basis of the questionnaires. For example, a common axiom of salesmanship is to "put some excitement in your presentation." But this is good advice, according to Johnson, only if both the seller and the buyer are extroverted. An introverted seller may be unable to carry it off, and an introverted buyer may be disturbed rather than excited by it.

The Human Edge questionnaires are based on traditional principles of personality-test construction, but within the field of psychology, a good deal of controversy has arisen about whether personality tests have much relevance to behavior. Suppose you have a test that measures whether a person considers himself, or whether others consider him, extroverted or introverted. The question remains, does it predict anything about how he will behave or how you should negotiate with him?

In my mind, and in the minds of many psychologists, this question is unresolved. Human Edge is planning controlled testing to confirm whether its advice is valid.

The Best Advice

Even so, using either of these programs to prepare for a negotiation is probably better than no preparation at all. If they have no other benefit than encouraging people to think about the issues and their opponent, the programs may still serve their purpose.

The best advice is probably to be skeptical of all advice. If you use these programs, don't accept and follow their suggestions blindly. Weigh them, try them on for size, and don't be afraid to dismiss them. Even if you're on the couch, the computer is a tool, not a master. Human beings are still the best judges of human behavior. +

To control your movements, you use a standard array of one and two-word

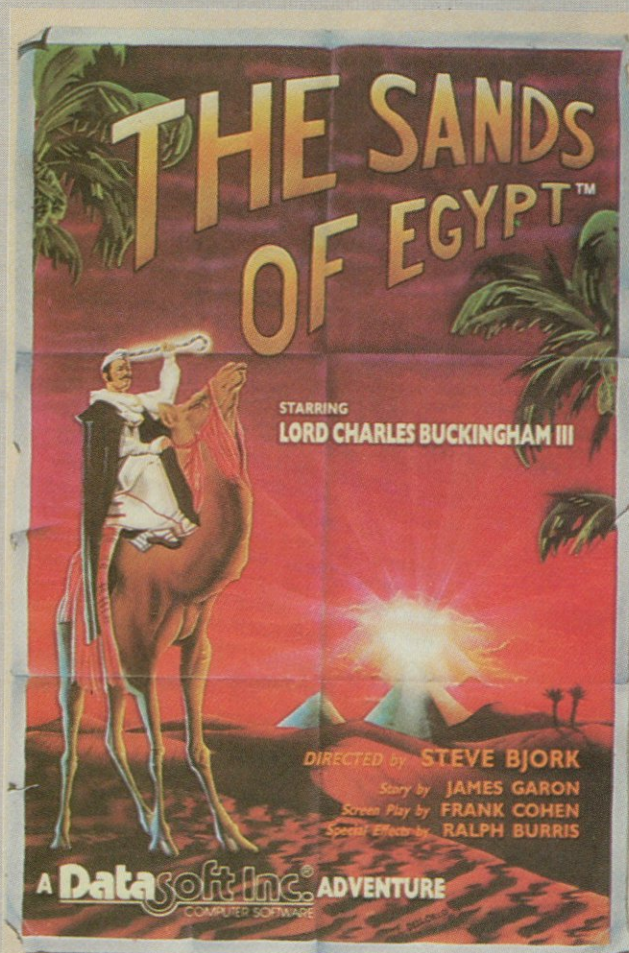
commands. For instance, typing LOOK provides a text description of what you can see. Some of the words, mostly compass points, may be abbreviated. For example, typing N is the same as typing NORTH.

Group Effort

Sands of Egypt seems to be a group effort. Designer James Garon has created an intriguing situation and puzzling brain teaser. You can't just follow your nose

and walk away with the treasure. You must explore the desert and pick up a few necessary items—such as water. Then you must figure out how to use the items to accomplish a task.

Special-effects whiz Ralph Burris, with help from Garon, provides brilliant graphics. The desert scenes are so vivid your mouth starts drying out. The stubborn camel possesses a know-it-all smirk



and, even worse, winks at you.

If you die, you receive a shallow grave with a tombstone marked R.I.P. Programmer Brian Mountford has developed a game that performs flawlessly.

Sands of Egypt comes with two pages of documentation, which gives you background information and some hints on strategy. If you really get stuck, you can call Datasoft for assistance.

Another Indiana Jones

As I played the game, the theme from *Raiders of the Lost Ark* kept going through my head. I'm afraid I began to think more like Indiana Jones than Lord Charles Buckingham III.

You'll sink quickly into Sands of Egypt as its baffling puzzles test your deductive reasoning and occasional wild hunch. It combines all the necessary elements of an adventure game—intriguing scenario, helpful items, vexing problems, and a dash of humor—with spectacular, semianimated graphics. Sands of Egypt is so captivating you may end up adventuring until the sands of time run out.

Off to the Pyramids

I say, old chap, smashing chatting with you, but I must be off to the pyramids. There's a bloody treasure for the taking, and I've got the scepter and an idea. Tally ho!

Grant Wood's *American Gothic*, and Georges Seurat's *La Grande Jatte*.

After you select a puzzle, Jig-saw displays the whole picture, complete with caption and borders, on the screen. You may study it as long as you like. After you press the space bar, the picture disappears from view, to be replaced with 24 numbered squares arranged in six horizontal rows by four vertical columns.

One piece of the puzzle appears in the bottom right corner of the screen. You decide where that particular piece should go and type a number between 1 and 24. The program automatically moves the piece to that numbered square, whether the piece actually belongs

there or not.

If the piece is indeed misplaced, Jig-saw sounds a harsh buzz, but continues to display pieces in the bottom right corner of the screen.



Eventually, you'll see the misplaced piece reappear, and you can try a new location.

Jig-saw does not contain much in the way of sound effects. In fact, the program emits a harsh buzz only when you misplace a puzzle piece.

If you become adept at placing 24 pieces in 24 moves, you'll be able to play Jig-saw in silence, except for the hum of the Apple itself.

Jig-saw is a colorful game, and some of the puzzles are difficult to solve. Bear in mind that each puzzle contains 24 pieces and takes a minimum of 24 moves to complete. Seurat's *La Grande Jatte* took 60 moves to reassemble, although subsequent efforts lowered my move number to less than 30.

The Thrill Is Gone

Jig-saw's individual pieces are all square, all right side up, and all presented one at a time, effectively eliminating most of the appeal of a real jigsaw

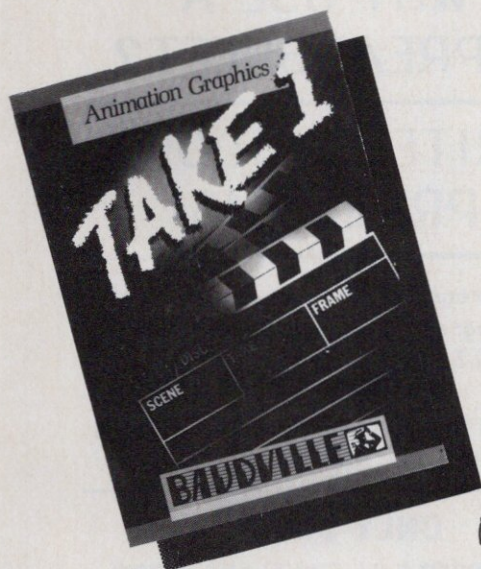
puzzle. You can't match two pieces independently of the main puzzle or experience the thrill of attaching a group of pieces to an edge piece.

Finally, completing one of Jig-saw's 24-piece puzzles is not nearly as satisfying as squeezing in the last piece—with all its pod-like extensions—of a 2500-piece puzzle.

Jig-saw brings colorful scenes before your eyes, but the limited number of pieces and puzzles challenges you for only a half a day or so. The program's graphics are very good, but can never convey the full intensity of an art masterpiece or the idyllic beauty of a picturesque scene. Puzzle enthusiasts will find regular

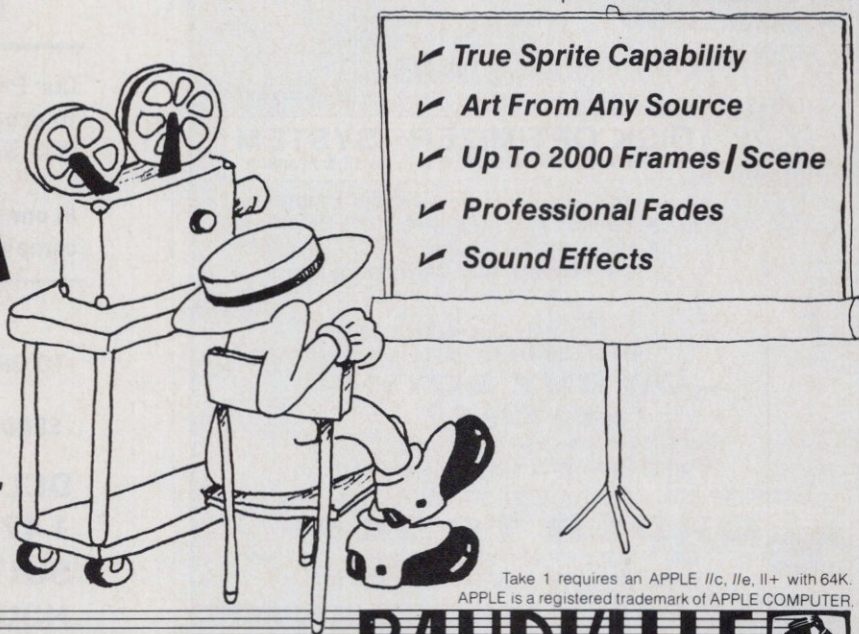

Legionnaire, an exceptional strategy war game, brings the glory that was Rome to your Apple. You are Gaius Julius Caesar, Governor of

Gaul, in command of up to ten legions. Your goal is simple: crush the rebellion and restore Rome's power over an area comprising present-day France and Belgium.

Your eight infantry and two cavalry legions represent the best and worst that Rome has to offer. Caesar's favorite, the veteran tenth legion, is a crack force of elite legionnaires who march fast and attack with deadly efficiency. On the other hand, the 14th infantry legion under Quintus Tiberius Sabinus moves slowly, fights poorly, and cracks easily.

Overall, the quality of most legions is closer to the 10th than the 14th. The two cavalry legions, under La-

bienus and Publius Licinius Crassus, move faster than the infantry legions do and are best used for attack, not defense.

Swords and Horse Heads

The screen displays infantry legions and tribes as swords and cavalry units as horse heads. An eagle represents Caesar and his 10th legion. The Roman legions are supposed to be imperial red, but they turn out to be imperial orange—at least on an Amdek monitor. Likewise, the Gallic tribes are supposed to be barbarian blue, but turn out to be purple.

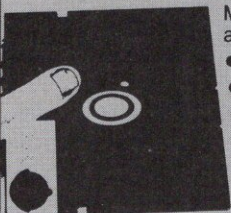
Moving the legions is as easy as positioning an oversized cursor over the unit and ordering it to move north, south, east, and west

by using Control-I, Control-M, Control-K, and Control-J, respectively. An arrow indicates the direction the unit will move, and up to eight orders can be entered in sequence. In reaction to changing battlefield conditions, you can delete orders at any time.

While the cursor is over a unit, Roman or Gallic, the name of the legion or tribe appears on the screen, along with its manpower rating and sword strength.

The terrain plays an important role in movement and in combat. Scrolling the map of Gaul across the screen reveals two types of terrain—the green trees of forests and the blue, purple, orange, and green contour lines of hills. You cannot

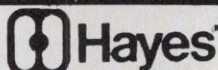

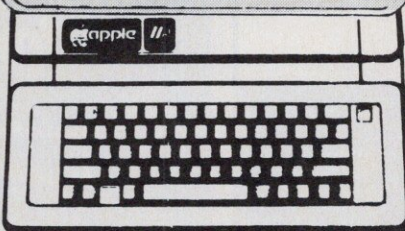

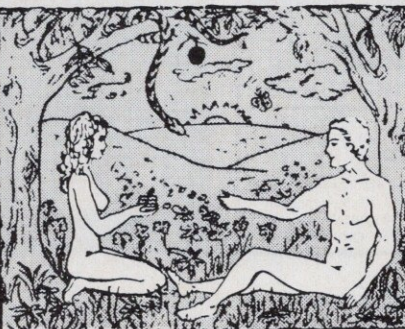

march legions through forests, and moving uphill is slower than moving downhill.

In combat, the forests tend to fragment the Gallic tribes and funnel their attacks. If you are a skilled tactician, you can pin the barbarians and then attack them from the flank.

The hills confer decisive advantages, but only to those forces on top. Units that attack uphill suffer heavy losses, which helps the defending unit successfully counterattack downhill.

The real trick is to balance your attack and defense. One effective tactic is to march to the top of a hill and await the Gallic attack. The legions are well rested,

but the tribes are not; and the tribes must attack uphill. Still, some Gallic tribes are quite capable of throwing you off the hilltop, pursuing you down the hill, and finishing you off in the valley.



suing you down the hill, and finishing you off in the valley.

Legionnaire's graphics are somewhat lackluster, although the top of the screen contains an interesting frieze of a legion attacking a tribe. In combat, the defending unit flashes bright-

ly as the strength of the attacker and defender declines.

Bleeping Barbarians

The sound effects are worse than the graphics, however. A couple of mediocre bloops and beeps are supposed to represent thousands of barbarians tramping through the fields and the ring of swords clashing in battle. Well, the fan on the Apple makes better battle sounds. If a legion or tribe is completely destroyed, you'll hear a high-pitched death squeal.

Legionnaire is a historical war game, not an arcade game, so it challenges your wits instead of your wrist. Although not academically precise in military detail, it nevertheless recreates an

accurate simulation of ancient military campaigns—complete with terrain effects and fatigue and morale problems. Despite its lackluster graphics and pitiful sound effects, Legionnaire captures your imagination and attention and truly tests the strategy and tactics of even veteran Caesars.

Questions from our readers



► STRING SPACES

Q. *When I edit a line containing a string, I frequently find extra spaces. Where did they come from, and how can I get rid of them?*

A. You put the spaces in the string by tracing blanks on the screen; Applesoft put the blank spaces on the screen to provide a readable listing format. The spaces do increase readability, but at what price? The only easy way to eliminate these accidental spaces is to retype the string from scratch. Experienced users sometimes go back to the Escape mode and skip the spaces, but you'll need a bit of practice to perfect this technique.

There is a better way to eliminate these spurious blanks in your listing: On a 40-column screen, type POKE 33,33—on the 80-column screen, type POKE 33,73. The 80-column POKE works reliably only with the Apple 80-column cards. These commands narrow the screen to 33 or 73 characters and inhibit the padding. The listing won't be as readable as before, but you'll find it eminently editable. To restore the screen to its normal width, type TEXT.

If you have extensive editing needs, you may want to invest in a commercial editing program. Global Program Line

Editor (GPLE) from Beagle Brothers is probably the most popular of these enhancements. GPLE and other similar programs provide more powerful editing capabilities, including Insert and Delete modes, string substitutions throughout the entire program, and so on.

Using one of these programs, you can easily remove extra spaces from program lines and write or edit program lines without inadvertently adding extra spaces.

Q. *Many features are missing from Applesoft, including PRINT USING and LINE INPUT. Furthermore, some of the existing commands and functions (such as RND and WAIT) don't work as expected. Can I buy a better BASIC for my Apple?*

A. Yes and no. Several more powerful versions of BASIC are available, including MBASIC from Microsoft and CBASIC from Digital Research. To use these languages, however, you must have a Z80 card, master a new operating system—CP/M—and lose compatibility with normal DOS 3.3 or ProDOS programs or data files.

Another way to gain new features is to extend Applesoft. Applesoft provides three ways to add new commands:

CALL, USR, and the "ampersand hook." When Applesoft finds one of these in a program, it looks for an assembly-language subroutine.

For a variety of reasons, using the ampersand command is the most common method of extending Applesoft. If you have not installed a subroutine and connected it to the ampersand command, nothing will happen. When you have installed an ampersand routine, using it is as simple as including something like

```
&PRINT USING >"$0000.00 ";A
or
&WAIT 30
```

in your program.

Writing subroutines to use the ampersand hook is not a trivial task, but most enhancements you may require are already available in commercial packages. One such package is The Routine Machine from Roger Wagner Software. Another source for ampersand routines and information about how to create your own is *All About Applesoft*, edited by Val Golding and available from CALL A.P.P.L.E. If you have a 128K Apple IIe or an Apple IIc, both Cat Graphics (Penguin Software) and Beagle Graphics (Beagle Bros.) provide ampersand routines to let you easily use the double-high-resolution capabilities of your computer (see "Seeing Double" on page 62 of this issue).

► APPLESOFT EDITING

Q. *I am new to Applesoft programming and am having trouble editing programs on my Apple IIc. After moving the cursor, I sometimes end up with a partial line, sometimes I end up with line 0 containing my edited line, and*

sometimes I just get a beep and a SYNTAX ERROR message. What am I doing wrong?

A. The Edit mode of the Apple has long been mysterious to new users. To start editing, you simply press the Escape key, but to *successfully* edit a program line, you must observe a simple rule for editing on the Apple: Trace the *whole* line. When you press the Escape key, you are moved into the Escape mode. In this mode, the program interprets some of your keystrokes as commands. (See figure 1 for a list of the valid com-

the right-arrow key. At the end of the line, press Return.

If you get a SYNTAX ERROR message, you didn't get out of the Edit mode soon enough. The Apple caught only part of the line.

If you get a partial line when you List the program, you pressed the Return key before the end of the line.

If you get a new program line (frequently line 0) and the old line didn't change, you didn't trace the whole line number.

mands.) The Escape mode lasts until you press a key that is not a valid command. You can enter program text only when you are in the normal nonescape mode.

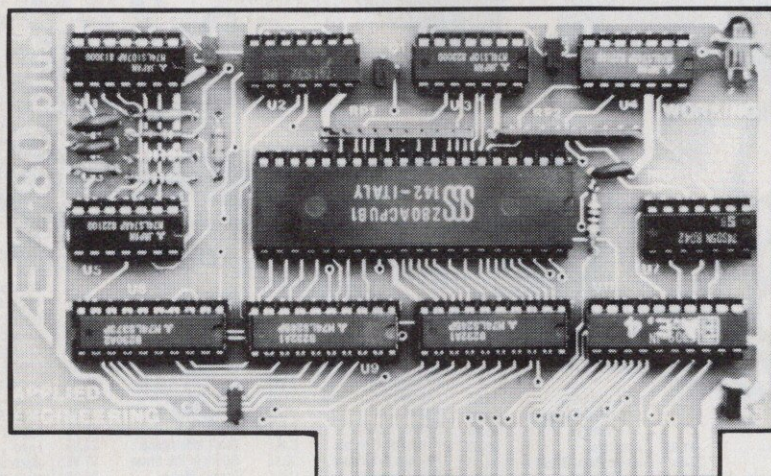
To edit a program, enter the Escape mode by pressing the Escape key; move the cursor to the start of the line to be edited—the first digit of the line number—get out of the Escape mode by pressing a noncommand key such as the space bar; and trace the whole line, using the right-arrow key. When you get to the spot you want to change, type the changes and then continue tracing with

column card, you should activate the card with a PR#3 to enjoy the benefits of the Escape mode cursor, an inverse plus sign. This way, you'll know when you are in the Escape mode and when you are in the normal text-entry mode. Apple IIc owners will see the Escape cursor whether they activate the 80-column card or not. Apple II or II Plus users are stuck with a plain, flashing cursor at all times. +

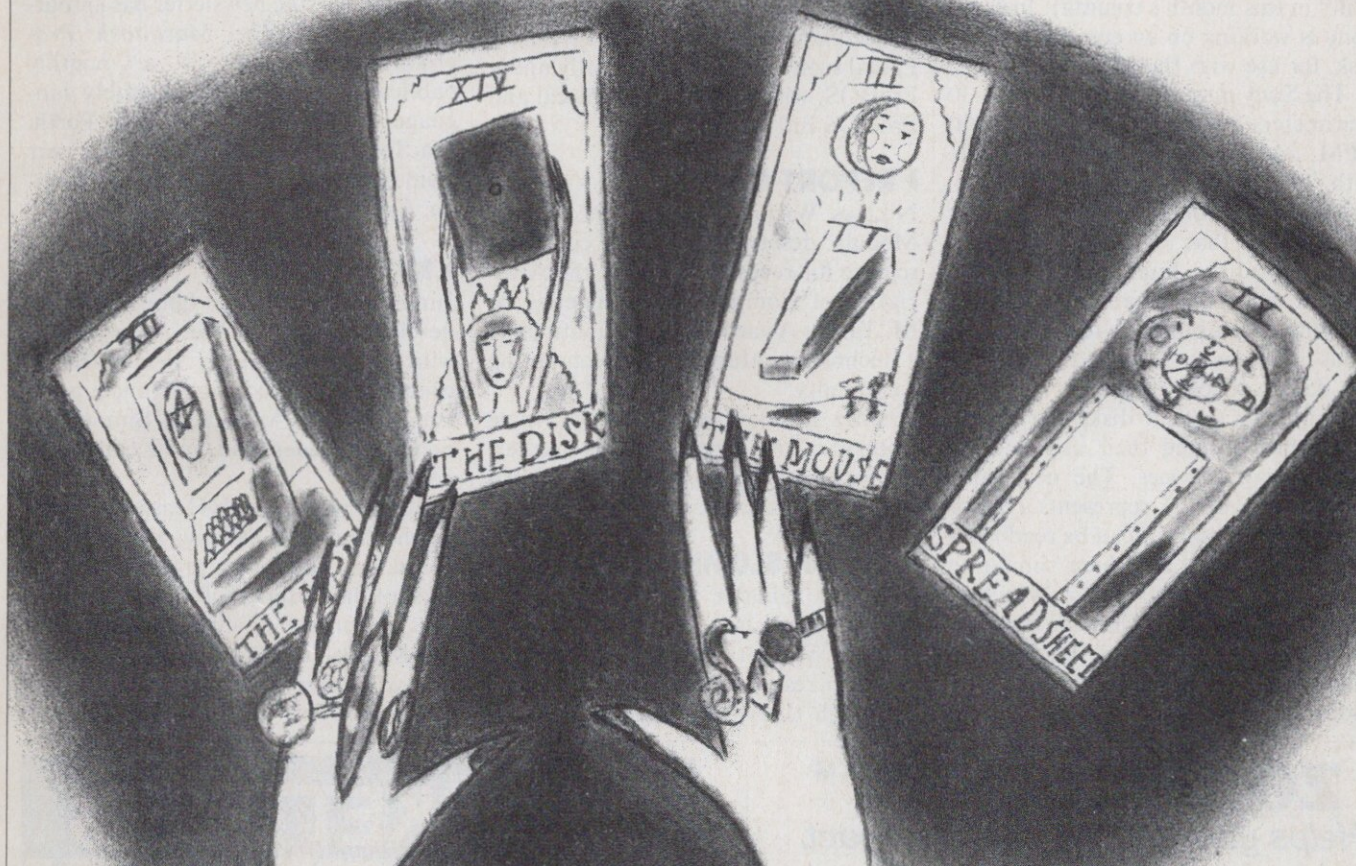

LOOKING FORWARD

What's ahead for Apple in 1985? A look into my crystal apple should provide some revealing hints. First, to set the mood, let me put on my bandanna, play some ethereal music, and pull down the shades. Ah, much better. Now let's get out the crystal and see what's in store for the coming year.

I see a rainbow arched over a large stadium. It looks like—yes, it is—Stanford Stadium here in Silicon Valley. The 1985 Super Bowl game, Apple's traditional kickoff for the new year is about to begin.

Now I see that the fans are taking seat cushions out from under their seats and holding them up. A voice in the distance intones, "...and now a word from our sponsor."

The image is changing. It's another surrealistic commercial poking fun at IBM. Now the image is fading.

Another image emerges—this time

of an auditorium. It's the Apple stockholders' meeting. A good mood prevails as talk about the just-introduced AppleBus network and laser printer swirls around the room.

A blur of images—what looks like Apple headquarters in Cupertino takes shape. Snippets of conversation float by: "We won't be introducing any new computers this year..." "...yeah, I'm new here. My job is to develop the next-generation home/educational computer for Apple. It'll be based on the 68000 and have a 3½-inch disk drive..." "Wow, that Turbo Mac is sure nice, with its snow-white look, its megabyte of RAM, and built-in 20-megabyte hard-disk drive. Too bad it won't be out for a while." "...and that strategy works well with the 3½-inch floppy for the Apple II."

The voices are getting so faint that I can't hear what they're saying any

longer. The blurred images are swirling around and around. All I can see is smoke and haze. Well, that must be all that my crystal apple is willing to reveal for now.

► PASCAL, FORTRAN, ASSEMBLER FOR MAC

SoftTech Microsystems has several programming tools available for developers of Macintosh software. The UCSD Pascal Development System allows Pascal programs for the Apple II series, Apple III, and IBM PC to be ported over to the Macintosh. The FORTRAN-77 Development System provides an ANSI-77 subset of FORTRAN, and the Advanced Development Tool Kit features a symbolic debugger, 68000 assembler, and a linker. ► OPTICAL DISK FOR MAC

In the September "News+," I mentioned that Sony and Apple had made an agreement to share hard-disk technology. It now looks as if Sony will not supply Apple's initial hard-disk offering for the Macintosh (see "The Rumor Mill" in this month's column). Instead, Sony is working on an erasable optical disk, for use with the Mac.

The Sony magneto-optical disk is 30 centimeters in diameter, rotates at 900 RPM, and has 43,750 tracks per side with 25 1-kilobyte sectors per track. The disk is made of the same acrylic material as that of Sony's compact audio laser disks. Each side of the disk offers a whopping gigabyte of storage. A gigabyte is a billion bytes, which is a thousand megabytes or about one million double-spaced pages!

Previously, optical disks were read-only, which limited their use as computer storage devices. The new Sony erasable optical disk represents a major breakthrough, since it can be read from and written to in a fashion similar to that of a traditional floppy or Winchester disk. Sony claims that the disk has an average access time of 100 milliseconds and a transfer rate of about 320 kilobytes per second.

► NEW PASCAL FOR PRODOS

Apple's Pascal version 1.2 currently supports the use of the ProFile hard disk, but the ProFile must first be formatted with the Pascal Filer. Even though Pascal 1.2 can access ProDOS files via the ProDOS I/O unit, the two operating systems are still separate. Apple plans to release a new version of Pascal soon that operates directly under ProDOS, which should give Pascal and ProDOS full compatibility.

► REPORT CARD

Niklaus Wirth, creator of Pascal and Modula, deserves an A+ in computer science for recently receiving the Association of Computing Machinery's A. M. Turing Award "for contributions of a technical nature to the computing community."

John Sculley, president of Apple Computer, Inc., gets an A+ in marketing for being chosen as *AdWeek's* 1984 Marketer of the Year.

► STOCK SLUMP

Just how valuable is John Sculley to Apple? Well, last fall a rumor went around Wall Street that Sculley was going to resign as president of Apple. Although the rumor was false, Apple

stock dropped almost 20% in just a few days. After Sculley made several vigorous denials, the stock went back up again as quickly as it had fallen.

► MAC DEVELOPER NEWSLETTER

Yet another Mac newsletter has sprouted. *MacTech, The Macintosh Programming Journal*, is a monthly publication that covers assembly language, BASIC, Pascal, C, and Forth. *MacTech* is available for \$24 a year from MacTech, P.O. Box 846, Placencia, CA 92670; (714) 993-9939.

► MUPPET MESS

Jim Henson of Muppet fame has let the development of Muppet software run wild. At this writing, four different companies are producing Muppet products—Henson Associates, Simon and Schuster, Brøderbund, and Koala Technologies.

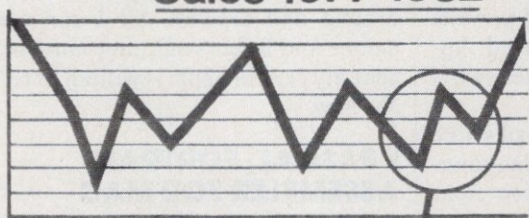
Koala worked with Henson to develop the Muppet Learning Keys, a keyboard for kids. The problem is that most of the Muppet software other vendors are producing does not work with the Muppet Learning Keys. More cooperation is needed among the Muppet developers. Are you listening, Kermit?

► APPLEBUS FOR IBM PCS

Tecmar, one of the leading producers of IBM peripheral products, has announced a plug-in board for the IBM PC, XT, and AT that would let these computers hook into the AppleBus low-cost network. This board will help create a new level of compatibility between IBM computers and Apple computers.

► APPLES OVERSEAS

Apple is doing a great amount of business overseas. This past fall, Apple's board of directors met with Mexico's Minister of Commerce and other top governmental officials to celebrate the opening of Apple de Mexico's new manufacturing facility in Mexico City. The plant will manufacture Apple IIe's for Mexico, Latin America, and the Caribbean. Mexico's Technical Institute of Monterrey plans to order 16,000 IIe's for delivery over the next three years.

Apple has also extended its collegiate ties to include Sweden's Lund University, which has already ordered 1000 Macintosh computers. It takes only about a week to adapt the Mac to a foreign language, by using the Resource Editor to modify the user interface. This gives the Mac a clear advantage over the IBM PC in the international market.

► THE RUMOR MILL

Apple to Restructure

The Apple organization may be going through yet another restructuring. The idea is to split the company into a business division (formerly the Mac and the Lisa divisions) and a home/educational division (formerly the Apple II and III divisions).

Although it makes some sense to divide the company into market-specific divisions, rather than product-specific divisions, the new strategy doesn't seem to take into account the fact that 40% of the Macintoshes being sold are going into the home/education market and that the Apple II series is the most popular computer in the small-business market.

New Drives for Apple II Family

As hinted earlier in this column, Apple may be planning to introduce the 400K Sony 3½-inch disk drive as an add-on for the Apple II family. This drive provides almost three times the amount of

storage that the current 5¼-inch drives provide, and it also opens up the possibility of some type of data compatibility with the Macintosh.

Apple's Japan Connection

Apple is definitely trying hard to be first in line for new high-tech computer parts from Japan. In addition to the disk drives from Sony and JVC, Apple is eyeing many other Japanese components for possible use in future Apple products.

In fact, rumor has it that Apple's Accessory Product Group is spending

more than \$150 million this year on samples of advanced Japanese electronic items, such as flat-panel displays, disk drives, IC chips, and other components.

Hard Disk for Mac

According to sources close to Japanese electronic giant JVC, Apple has expressed a keen interest in JVC's 3½-inch 10-megabyte Winchester drive. If the rumor is true, the Mac may someday have a sleek, compact hard-disk drive that measures 4 inches wide by 5 inches long by 1½ inches high. +
